



This house is significant for its architecture and its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County, New Jersey area. It is a reasonably well preserved example of the Form/Plan Type as shown and more fully described herein. As such, it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey.

In 1791 James Christie sold one hundred acres of land for five hundred pounds to William P. Christie, the builder of the wing of the present house. The commissioners to divide the real estate of William P. Christie disposed of the dwelling house and forty acres of land to Abraham Cole in 1832 who sold two years later to another William Christie. This William Christie transferred the title in 1336 to Samuel Parsels who built the main house that same year. Samuel and his wife sold the property in 1860 to Charles Newcomb. Since that time there have been six transfers recorded [up until the time of the HABS]. The [then] present owners obtained posession in 1920.

The first of the Christie family James originally came from Scotland in 1685. He was one of the group that was stranded on the Jersey coast by the ship Caledonia. Early in the eighteenth century the family settled at Schraalenburgh. The builder of the wing was a descendant of this first Christie.

The Parsels family are of French origin and originally settled on Long Island sometime during the latter half of the seventeenth century. The first of the Parsels family to come to New Jersey was Nicholas who settled in Hackensack sometime during the first half of the eighteenth century. Samuel, a descendant of this family, was the builder of the "Big House". He owned and operated a saw mill located on the nearby stream.
