DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Marymont is one of the last large Classical Revival homes erected in Middle Tennessee prior to the Civil War. It consists of a large hall with two rooms on either side, a typical floor plan of the antebellum period.

The front facade of the brick structure consists of six bays, the central pair of which are occupied by the entrance and portico. The ground floor entrance has simple but bold Classical Revival framing with side lights and a full transom. The depth of the jamb and framing members is greater than usual. Above is a similar doorway which gives access to a small balcony protected by a cast iron railing. This balcony is supported on unusually large and elaborate scroll brackets in the Roman Revival manner.

The portico in front of these entrances is said to have been altered in the late 1870's when the monumental fluted Ionic coupled columns were added to either side. The deep entablature and raking entablature of the portico gable are punctuated with evenly spaced frieze brackets beneath the cornice. This same entablature is used throughout the building. S

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To either side of the portico there is a pair of six-over-six glazed windows on each floor. These windows have simple sills, shutters and elaborate projecting straight cornices in the "palazzo mode" popular in the late 1850's. The roof is a simple hipped structure with chimneys projecting above the side walls. There is an ell appended to the right rear of the structure containing various service facilities. Suitably elaborate interiors retaining much of their decoration from the 1860-61 construction are found in the house.

Also located on the grounds is a small ginger-bread Victorian cottage used as a doctor's office by a former owner.

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7. <u>DESCRIPTION</u> (cont.)

Marymont was built in 1860-1861 by Hiram Jenkins on land that had been in the family since the 1780's. In 1878 Nimmie Jenkins, niece of Hiram Jenkins, and her husband, Dr. J. J. Rucker, became the owners of the property, and family papers disclose that Dr. Rucker added the four Ionic columns and the bracketed cornice. The original appearance is not revealed in the papers and no known photograph exists. The ell, containing the kitchen, smokehouse, and servants' quarters is part of the original building. The office was built by Dr. Rucker shortly after he moved to Marymont.

Marymont represents the last blast of somewhat ostentatious homes built in Middle Tennessee prior to the outbreak of the Civil War. Additionally, it is a rare example, in its window cornices and front balcony, of the "Roman Revival" or "palazzo mode" introduced into the United States in the late 1840's and used for more elaborate commercial structures and houses until the hostilities of the 1860's.

The scale of the house is unusually large for regional houses. It is among the most interesting regional structures of the late 1850's and early 1860's existing. It can be said with little doubt that the house "speaks" for itself.

Marymont received its name from Mary Rucker, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Rucker. The property has remained in the family and has always been used as a residence. No nationally important people have been associated with the house, and the only locally important people involved would be Hiram Jenkins, the builder, who was a member of an early family in the area, and Dr. Rucker, a prominent local physician.
