## 45. Description and House Plan:

The first section of this multi-stage <u>house</u> is a single log pen, about 16' square. A small addition, also of log, was erected to the east of the first room. The chimney was subsequently moved from the west wall to the north wall, and the interior was restyled in Greek Revival: the window and door surrounds consist of simplified "pediments" atop battered vertical boards.


In about the 1850s (sometine after the 1843 sale) a second story was added to the log house and a two-story block with a stair-passage and corner double gallery was added to the south, both additions of frame construction. The new central passage featured a two-flight curving staircase and brilliant red and blue colored glass in the transom and sidelights of the front door; the very simple rear (west) door, beneath the stair landing, was lighted with a transom only. The opening surrounds in the interior of this addition, grained and colored in two tone, have 3/4-round trim and crossettes. The richly molded eclectic mantel in the parlor features flutec shafts imbedded in plain rectangular frames, said to have been the favorite device of the addition's carpenter-builder, named Rice.

To the north of the log section, a kitchen wing built in 1922 replaced an earlier kitchen-dinir room block and provided a second staircase to the upper level.

The house, which faces east, was sited on a narrow ridge running east-west, presumably because of the nearness of a spring downhill to the southwest. Between the house and the group of barn to the east are six outbuildings, all built before about 1915 and all in good condition, except the log "meal house," built possibly at the same time as the log house and in a ruined state. The two large <u>livestock-hay barns</u> were built mid-19th century and the nearby <u>corn crib</u> in the late 19th century. All the outbuildings, again excepting the log meal house, are gabled wood frame buildings roofed with standing seam tin and sheathed with vertical-board siding. county of this phenomenon. Also, this property is significant under criterion A as a good local example of a medium-sized farm in Boone County in the period 1820-1938. More than most historic farms identified in the county, this property illustrates the specialized agricultural uses of outbuildings in a diversified farm during this period. The farm has maintained good site integrity and effectively conveys the appearance and feeling of a medium-sized Boone County farm in this period.

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
