Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Academy in Limington is a dignified and well-designed school building in the Greek Revival style, dating from 1854.

The 2-story building is of frame construction with gabled roof, two brick chimneys (internal against the rear wall), eight-sided cupola with bracketed cornice, clapboard siding, and granite foundation. The cupola is an addition of the 1870's.

The pedimented facade faces east and has two central bays flanked by freestanding square columns at the corners of the front. In each of the corners of the facade is an inset portico one bay wide and two bays deep. There is a balustrade and porch at second-floor level in each portico, and in each floor of the porticos are sidelighted doorways.

The sides of the building are 6 bays long, including the porticos. Fenestration throughout is 6/6, save for the rearmost bays which are 2/2.

Exterior trim is typical of the Greek Revival in Maine and consists of simple Doric pilasters on each exterior corner, an austere cornice, and entablatured lintels over all bays.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Limington Academy building of 1854 is an exceptionally strong and forthright semi-peripteral Greek Revival temple style structure which still serves its original purpose as an educational building within the community of Limington. Its splendid lines render it an outstanding landmark in an essentially rural setting.

Founded by subscription in 1848, sessions of Limington Academy were at first held in 1851 in the village district school house and later in the Masonic hall and other locations. In 1853 a lot was purchased and the following year the present building was erected at a cost of \$2,102.05. The by-laws of the Academy board state in part that its object was "to establish an institution for the promotion of Science and Literature and wherein youth may be instructed in the higher branches of education usually taught in the Academies of this state.

The first principal, William A. Lord, served the Academy for 43 years until 1894 and brought it to the height of its success and prosperity, when it drew large numbers of pupils from surrounding towns. In 1895 the trustees of the Academy voted to receive all qualified scholars of the town upon application and some years later the institution became a public high school. With a new school facility built next to it, the old building provides classroom space for elementary grades but is still in the ownership of the trustees.
