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The Harvard House has had a long and interesting history. Built in about 1775, just before the outbreak of the Revolution, by Amos Otis for Dudley Uright, it stands on the site of the home of Wright's father, Joseph. Then it was built it was one of the largest and most impressive hones on the village green. Frisht's property extended to what is present-lay Main Street, and included what is now the Green, or Center Park. In addition to being a home, it also served as a store, for Captain right was a merchant among other things, a tavern; and the meeting place of the Meester Lodge of Masons. The latter met on the second floor, at the south end of which was a ballroom with hinred partitions which could be swamp up and bocked to the ceiling, converting two chambers into a large hall. In June, 1783, Dudley's dauchter Lydia Married Dr. John fatrous. The young couple moved into the house and occupied the second floor in place of the Masons. In 1793, bright, then seventy-six years old, deeded the preperty to his daughter, and continued to live there until he died in 1806.

Dr. John Richards Latrous was one of Colchester's most prominent and respected citizens. We was active in his profession, politics, philanthropic projects, and numerous business ventures. He was one of the organizers and early presidents of the Connecticut Fedical Society. Like many residents of the Center, he furnished board and Lodsing to out-of-town students of Bacon Academy. In 1823 another doctor joined the Touschold: Dr. Frederich Horgan, who married Caroline Matrous. They resided in the house after Dr. Matrous' death in 1842 until 1848 when they sold it to Methaniel Hayward.

Fornder and president of the Mayward Rubber Company which built a large plant in Colchester in 1847, Tathaniel was an inventor and industrialist. It was be who invented the process of vulcanization of rubber by treating it with sulphur. A patnet was issued in 1827 and assigned to Charles Goodycar,


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#8 Significance

Hayward's colleague. During the era of the Company's prosperity, the house became a focal point for the social life of the upper classes of the town. It was then that the porches and bay window were added, and the lawns, driveways, and stables built. It was Hayward who gave up the spacious front lawn, presenting it to the town for a park. The Rubber Company continued to flourish until 189h, when it was absorbed by the Rubber Trust; the plant in Colchester was closed and it eventually burned. The house remained in the Hayward family until the middle of the 20th century. It now houses an antique shop.
