DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Fez Club is a large two and one half story mansion on an elevated basement. It is superb Victorian example of the Chateauesque style. The building stands on two narrow lots on the northeast corner of Broadway and Washington. The property slopes gently upward to the north so that the basement is actually on grade at the front, or south end, of the building. The building almost fills the two lots, leaving on the east a very narrow side yard and on the west and south very small yards separated from the streets by a wrought iron fence. At the time the mansion was built, air pollution in Butte was so severe that grass would not grow, so the yards are covered with cobble stone.

A large circular tower at the southwest corner and a three-sided full-heigth bay at the north end of the west facade are the exceptions to an otherwise long rectangular plan. Both of these elements are three and one half stories on an elevated basement, the tower topped by a steep conical roof and the bay topped by a steep octagonal roof. Each floor is rather large, approximately 2600 square feet, and simple in plan. All circulation (halls, formal stairway, rear stairs) and many closets are along the east side of the mansion and all livable rooms are arranged along the west side.

The building is constructed of brick bearing walls in checkerboard and other patterns of light and dark red brick. The brick is enhanced by cut gray limestone window enframements, surrounds, and string courses, including a course in a battlement motif between the second and third stories of the tower and projecting bay. Lintels on the basement and second floor are flat while those of the main level are slightly arched. Several bays along the west facade and on the tower are unified vertically by the presence of the same limestone in the spandrels, with quions as the edge between brick and stone. Various windows feature stained glass panels and colored glass in diamond-shaped wood frames.

A hip roof covers the main mass of the mansion, pierced by dormers at the level of the third floor of the tower and three-sided bay. The roofs of the tower and bay, meanwhile, have gable dormers one floor above. All roof plains are very steep and are of slate. The octagonal roof of the bay is topped by a collar and pinnacle. Two very tall chimneys, serving seven fireplaces within, extend through the roof, capped in decorative corbelled stone.

The formal entrance to the Fez Club is through a one-story, square, projecting porch at basement level on the south facade, just east of the circular tower. The porch is enclosed and one enters through a wrought iron gate filling a semi-circular, arched opening. Once inside the porch, a short flight of stairs leads to the vestibule, beyond which is a reception hall and the curved formal staircase leading to the piano nobile.

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At the level of the dormers of the hip roof and the level of the third story of the tower, there is a ballroom. The other levels, including the basement, have been altered and redecorated to meet the needs of the Shriners and only two of the fireplaces are not operative. There are twenty-six rooms in the mansion plus numerous bathrooms. The floors and moldings are of fine hardwoods and there is mahogony panelling on the main floor. However, many of the fine woods have been painted white. A one-story frame garage has been added to the northwest corner of the building.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Fez Club is a unique architectural monument to the flamboyant history of copper and corruption for which early day Montana is renowned.

This mansion was built in 1898-9 for Charles W. Clark, oldest son of William A. Clark, one of the infamous "Copper Kings." Charles was born in November, 1871, and graduated from Yale in 1893. Although he then worked for the family companies (eventually assuming the position of vice-president of the Colusa-Parrot Mining and Smelting Co.), Charles' most valuable services for his father were rendered in the political rather than the corporate arena. Charles was censured for alleged acts of bribery connected with W. A. Clark's bid for the U. S. Senate in 1899. Three years later, in 1901, Charles found it expedient to leave the state after attempting to bribe a judge who had passed a ruling in favor of Clark's arch rival, F. Augustus Heinze.

Befitting his status as a member of the state's most illustrious family, Charlie's residence was to be one of the most elegant in Butte. In a frontier mining boom-town, most structures were designed and built by local craftsmen, many of whom were untrained. It is therefore significant that Clark was able to employ Will Aldrich as his architect. Aldrich received his degree from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1884. He was in Butte about 1898-1900 then returned to Boston and later moved to New York where he worked in the office of McKim, Mead and White. In 1910, Aldrich moved to St. Joseph, Missouri, as part of the firm Eckel and Aldrich, which was to design many notable buildings in Missouri. The Fez Club is the only known building designed by Aldrich in Montana.

According to romantic local legend, the design of the Fez Club is supposed to reflect a French chateau admired by Clark and his wife while honey-mooning in Europe. A more probable explanation for the French overtone of the design is that it reflects the influence of Aldrich's own studies in Europe on a Rotch Traveling Scholarship in the 1880's.
