DESCRIPTION	ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION AND PRESENT CONDITION: Greek Revival Cottage; rectangular plan, one story, saltbox roof, stone and brick pier foundation infilled with cinder block; mortise and tenon construction with weatherboard siding, 4 exterior stuccoed brick chimneys, asphalt shingle roof; front facade is three bays wide with central trabeated entrance, sidelights and transom have mullions of bent wood and are divided by fluted pilasters, door flanked by tongue and groove sheathing, one 9/9 double hung sash window on either side of the entrance; interior has central hall/six room plan; front porch re- placed with screened in porch; landscaping consists of native flowering flora around

	III. HISTORY	HISTORICAL NARRATIVE (FROM ORIGINS TO PRESENT): Stoddard Rockwell was awarded the property on which this house sits in 1837. The house was probably built soon afterward because this was considered his established residence throughout his lifetime. Rockwell was a grocer in Lumpkin. He served on the Board of Commissioners of the Poor School Fund, and opened his home to female boarders of the Masonic Female Academy. He died in 1855 but the property remained in the family untill 1888. It was then sold to the Singer family, who in turn sold it to Q.E.Worthington. Worthington sold it to the present owners, the Shepards.

	IV. SIGNIFICANCE	STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL): Architecture: This house in- corporates the saltbox type roofline into its Greek Revival plan. Highly crafted front door (one of the finest in town) has sidelights and transom decorated with bentwood formed in an elliptical pattern in the sidelights and transom. The interior has simple Greek Revival design which show the early settlers were aware of current styles. Local <u>History</u> : This house is significant to the history of Lumpkin because its first owner was one of the early settlers who operated a grocery in town. The house suggests the type of homes being built for men of such professions. This home is important to the educational history of Lumpkin because it served as a boarding house for (CONT'D)


