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<p>Architectural Statement:</p> <p>An architecturally significant example of the non-historical brick commercial structures which dominated Midwestern cities in the 1920's, the Rindfleisch building is characterized by brick piers, stone trim, a parapeted roofline, and a large plate glass storefront.</p> <p>Rising three stories with attic, the second and third floor are united by brick piers which rise uninterrupted from the top of the first story to the parapet. A stone course articulates the top of the third story and stone capitals crown the piers. The first-story storefront is distinguished by its cutaway entry on the northwest corner and a Tudor arched doorway on the northeast. Above the plate glass are banded transom windows which are ornamented with thin comes. Above the first story is a stone course, and several stone diamond-shaped inlays punctuate the front facade.

This building remains in its totally original, unaltered state and is in fact probably the least altered pre-1930 structure in all of downtown Beloit.
