The Waccamaw River Memorial Bridge, which carries Main Street/U.S. Highway 501 over the Waccamaw River and the tracks of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad, is a multi-span continuous steel girder bridge made up of four steel girder main spans with a maximum span length of 114 feet each and four continuous steel stringer approach spans; concrete piers support the bridge deck, and the entire bridge is 1270 feet long; the curb-to-curb width is 24 feet, with an overall width of 34.9 feet. It is notable for several features distinguishing it from similar South Carolina highway bridges of the period, such as its long horizontal curve in conjunction with a long vertical curve instead of the more common use of the vertical curve alone; the Gothic-influenced pointed-arch design of its concrete piers; and the use of 28 cast-iron light standards along the balustrade. The date of construction--1937--is inscribed on the the end of the concrete balustrade at either end of the bridge; a concrete marker stands at the northern approach to the bridge, with a bronze plaque bearing the inscription

> THIS BRIDGE IS DEDICATED AS A MEMORIAL TO THE SONS AND DAUGHTERS OF HORRY COUNTY WHO SERVED IN THE WARS OF OUR COUNTRY

A single cast-iron light standard, identical to those along the balustrade, stands between the marker and the bridge itself.

The bridge was rehabilitated by the South Carolina Department of Highways and Public Transportation (since renamed the South Carolina Department of Transportation) in 1992-93, with repairs and maintenance to the balustrade, the bridge deck, and the concrete piers supporting the bridge, all sympathetic to the original design of the bridge. This rehabilitation also included the replacement of the modern aluminum standards which had since replaced the originals; the replacement cast-iron standards, with fluted columns, duplicated the 1937 standards and were cast by Union Metal Company of Canton, Ohio, from the molds used to cast the original light standards.

The Waccamaw River Memorial Bridge, constructed in 1937 and opened to the public in April 1938, is locally significant as an example of engineering techniques and architectural design used in the construction of South Carolina highway bridges during a period of remarkable growth in the state's highway system. Among its notable engineering and architectural features are its long vertical and horizontal curves and the Gothicinfluenced pointed arches cut out of its concrete piers; the arches have been described as "a lavish treatment seldom seen in South Carolina bridges" in a 1993 bridge inventory project sponsored by the South Carolina Department of Highways and Public Transportation.¹ It is also significant for its association with the growth and development of the Grand Strand-Myrtle Beach area as a resort in the first half of the twentieth century.

This bridge, which was designed under the supervision of W.J. Gooding, Bridge Engineer of the South Carolina Highway Department and constructed at a cost of some \$370,000, replaced an earlier one-lane bridge which had been the only bridge connecting the town of Conway with the developing resort town of Myrtle Beach and the wide Atlantic beaches known as the Grand Strand. The bridge was also specifically designed to be "capable of handling the tremendous volume of motor traffic" from Conway to Myrtle Beach and points beyond, a volume of traffic which had grown dramatically during the 1920s and 1930s. It was designated as a memorial to Horry County citizens who served in America's wars from the American Revolution through the First World War at the request of Colonel Henry L. Buck, a prominent citizen of Horry County and member of the State Highway Commission.²

The ceremonies opening the bridge, held on 1 April 1938, were attended by what reporters estimated as "a crowd of not less than 15,000" who saw the dedication of "a handsome steel and concrete bridge . . . considered by those who are familiar with bridge construction as being one of the finest in the Nation."³ The extent of the local enthusiasm over the completion of the Waccamaw River Memorial Bridge is evident from the newspaper accounts of the dedication and from a poem Mrs. Charles R. Scarborough of Conway wrote for the occasion which began:

The Bridge! The Bridge! It was opened today! The handsome new bridge in the town of Conway It is your bridge, and my bridge, and everybody's, too It is free for the crossing; it is welcome to you!

Mrs. Scarborough's verses caught the spirit of the occasion and the purpose of the bridge more than she knew when she wrote, "With speeches and races and playing of bands/Our county brings greetings to more distant lands."⁴ Chief Highway Commissioner Ben W. Sawyer congratulated Conway on its new bridge, claiming that "this bridge across the Waccamaw river stands as a monument to public cooperation; cooperation on the part of Horry county authorities and the state highway department," and going on to urge the construction of

more bridges and roads in the South Carolina lowcountry, observing, "The Coastal section should and could be made a play ground for the people of South Carolina and large numbers of people from neighboring states. Such a development is economically feasible and socially desirable. The one essential prerequisite is more and adequate hard surfaced roads."⁵ The Waccamaw River Memorial Bridge is an excellent resource illustrating the expansion of transportation in the twentieth-century South Carolina lowcountry.
