Hilton Residence

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The Hilton Residence is located at the corner of Division and Main Street in the City of White Lake, South Dakota. The house is located in a thriving community, just blocks from the commercial core. The house is surrounded by late 20th century structures. The house is an excellent example of a Late Victorian Queen Anne in Aurora County.

Architectural Description

The Hilton House, built circa 1920 is a two story, clapboard sided house with an asphalt shingle roof and a concrete and brick foundation. The house exhibits characteristics of Queen Anne design which include: steeply pitched roof of irregular shape with dominant front-facing gable; cutaway bay windows; asymmetrical facade with a full-width porch which is one story high and extended along one or both side walls.

The façade (west elevation) features a wrap around porch and a two story bay window. The shed roof of the porch is supported by simple columns topped with a unornamented frieze. At the entry to the porch the roof forms a gable peak. The first floor has an entry at the northwest corner. The bay window has a cottage window. The second floor has a fixed diamond paned window above the entry door on the first floor. The bay window has one-over-one double hung windows on each side of the bay. The bay is topped with a gable that features a half round hopper window. Below the roof line is a simple, unornamented frieze.

The south elevation continues with the wrap around porch, which extends half the distance of this elevation. The entrance onto the porch on this elevation also has a gabled roof. At the terminus of the porch is a two story, two foot bump out. The first floor has a large one-over-one, double hung window at the southwest corner. The west side of the bump out has an entry door into this portion of the house. The south wall of the bump out has a diamond pane-over-one, double hung window in the center flanked by two narrower, one-over-one, double hung windows. At the southeast corner of the fist floor is another entry door. This portion of the first floor has a shed roof porch. The second floor has a narrow one-over-one, double hung window at the southwest corner. The south wall of the bump out has a narrow one-over-one, double hung window at the southwest corner. The second floor has a narrow one-over-one, double hung window at the southwest corner. The south wall of the bump out has a pair of narrow one-over-one, double hung windows. Directly above the entry door is a one-over-one, double hung window on the second floor. The bump out is topped by a gable roof which has a half round hopper window in the peak.

The east elevation (rear) has a one-over-one, double hung window and an entry door on the first floor. The second floor also had a one-over-one, double hung window. This portion is topped by a

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gable roof with a half round hopper window in the peak. At the northeast corner of this elevation is an enclosed one story addition. It has a flat roof with a decorative baluster at the roof line. It has poured concrete steps leading to an entry. To the south of the entry is a narrow rectangular fixed window.

The north elevation on the first floor has two, one-over-one double hung windows in the one story addition. Above the addition, on the second floor, is an entry door leading out onto the balcony and a simple fixed pane window. The one foot bump out on this elevation has three small one-over-one double hung windows on the first floor and two larger one-over-one double hung windows on the second floor. The bump out is topped by a gable roof with a half round hopper window in the peak. The northwest corner of the house has two one-over-one double hung windows that follow the staircase on the interior of the house.

Garage

The garage dates to the construction of the house. It is a hipped roof structure with fixed pane windows on the north and south elevations. The garage has suffered severe deterioration and lacks integrity to be considered eligible.

Statement of Significance

The Hilton House is significant under Criterion C for architecture. The house is an excellent example of a Late Victorian Ear Queen Anne style home. It is a well-preserved example of the Queen Anne style in a rural community setting. The ornate home continues to provide a sense of high style architectural appeal that made it worthy of notice in the 1920's.

The Hilton House is located in White Lake in the southeastern portion of South Dakota. The Hilton's were a prominent family in White Lake. As they were the owners of the local lumber yard, having a home such as this one, with its many decorative details, became important to the family as well as the lumber business. It exhibited recent trends in building and became a key element for their business.

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A farming region characterizes the surrounding area. Settlement in the city of White Lake began in the early 1880's with the development of the railroad through this region. Many shops opened in relation to the coming of the railroad. At this same time, new house construction started. The first lumber yard opened in 1895 and was purchased by the Hilton family in the early 1920's.

Throughout the past 75 plus years, the Hilton home has had only 4 different owners within the Hilton Family. According to the family, the house has been used as a private residence, a stop for religious dignitaries of South Dakota, and a court martial in 1935. The house has been virtually unchanged in the past 75 years. The builder's talents combined with the selected construction materials and care have made the Hilton House an excellent example of a Queen Anne style house.

The Queen Anne style was most popular from roughly 1880 through the turn of the century, although it did persist into the mid 1920's in South Dakota. The style is typified by irregular, steeply pitched roofs, asymmetrical facades and decorative elements to avoid flat walls. The Hilton House is a typical representation of the Queen Anne style and the picturesque movement in architecture.

The house exhibits many of the characteristics associated with the Queen Anne style. It has the irregular roof, asymmetrical porch, decorative columns and spindles. The house has had few alterations over time which include a small addition to the rear of the house and minor renovations to the interior.

The Hilton House is eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C, for its architectural value and significance in White Lake, South Dakota. It is an excellent example of Queen Anne style homes in Aurora County.
