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Architectural Description

The Rockerville Civilian Conservation Corp Camp F-10 includes a hospital cabin, two officer's cabins, and a fireplace ruin that was part of the mess hall. The remaining buildings of Camp F-10 lie in a meadow surrounded by pine trees. The cabins sit along the edge of the meadow just inside the trees while the fireplace is in the open field to the east of the cabins.

Officer's Cabin 1

This 11' x 13.5' cabin is built with round pine logs chinked with mortar. The logs have saddle notch joinery. The foundation is rock and the roof is metal. The gable roof has a pine log ridge pole with dimensional lumber rafters and sheathing. The façade (east elevation) has a door at the northeast corner and a lumber framed single pane window toward the southeast corner. The north and south elevations each have a single lumber framed single pane window. The west elevation has an external central chimney made of mica schist. There is a lumber frame porch at the base of the façade. The gable roof extends past the façade to overhang the porch.

The walls on the interior of the cabin have wood paneling. There is a log mantle over the chimney.

Officer's Cabin 2

This 17' x 26' cabin is built with round logs chinked with mortar. The logs have saddle notch joinery. The foundation is rock and the roof is metal. The gable roof has a round pine log ridge pole flanked by two round pine log purlins. The roof has dimensional lumber sheathing. The façade (north elevation) has an entry at the northeast corner. There is a composite masonry chimney near the northwest corner made of schist and concrete. The east elevation has one two-pane lumber framed window near the northeast corner. The west elevation has a centered two-pane lumber framed window. The south elevation has a large opening near the southwest corner and a lumber framed six-pane window near the southeast corner. The porch on the east elevation was enclosed and clad with dimensional lumber in circa 1940.

The only major alterations on the interior are the circa 1940 addition that enclosed the porch.

Hospital

The hospital is built with round pine logs chinked with mortar. The logs have saddle notch joinry. The building has a cross-shaped plan and a cross gable roof. The roof has round log ridge poles and dimensional lumber rafters. The building is divided into four wings.

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The east elevation of the east wing has a door at the northeast corner and lumber framed one-overone double hung window. The north and south elevations of the east wing have a lumber framed one-over-one double hung window. The west elevation is attached to the building.

The east elevation of the north wing has a lumber frame one-over-one double hung window. The north elevation of the north wing has a door slightly off center to the east and a boarded window opening. The west elevation is bare. The south elevation is attached to the building.

The north, south and west elevations of the west wing each have a lumber framed one-over-one double hung window. The east elevation is attached to the building.

The east elevation of the south wing has a lumber framed one-over-one double hung window. The south elevation has a large central entry. The west elevation is bare. The north elevation attaches to the building.

The interior walls have wood paneling.

There is also a rose quartz retaining wall and stone steps to the east of the hospital building.

Fireplace

There is a rose quartz and mica schist fireplace ruin to the east of the cabins. The north side of the fireplace has an embedded concrete slab with the carving "CCC 1933." To the south of the fireplace is a bench.

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The Civilian Conservation Corp Camp F-10 is located 15 miles southwest of Rapid City, Pennington County, South Dakota, near the town of Rockerville. The camp is significant under Criterion C for its CCC construction affiliation and under Criterion A for the role it played in employing South Dakotans during the Great Depression.

The western portion of Pennington County is located in the Black Hills National Forest. The area was first occupied by Euro American settlers during the Black Hills Gold Rush that began in 1876. Rockerville, which was named for the rocker type sluice boxes that the placer miners used, lies in the eastern Black Hills. The area has sporadic development but remains largely rural forest.

The Civilian Conservation Corp built Camp F-10 in 1933. Company 1794 was formed by men transferred from other companies and would be the only company to occupy the camp. The camp was occupied until May of 1935, at which time the company was transferred to Camp F-22 at Summit Peak. The men of Company 1794 were disbanded upon arrival and absorbed into Company 791 at Summit Peak when that camp consolidated with Camp Lightening Creek the same year.¹

Camp F-10 consisted of 17 buildings including four 50 man barracks, a mess hall, a kitchen, a bath house, a cooks' quarters, a recreation hall, an administration building, a store room, a forester's cabin, a commanding officer's cabin, a hospital, a garage, a blacksmith shop, two storage cabins, and a water tower.² At any given time, there was up to 175 men in Company 1794 stationed at the camp involved in tree thinning, dam construction, bridge construction, trail building, campground improvements, and fire suppression as needed.³ Most of the work was done under the supervision of the Forest Service.

The Civilian Conservation Corp was established in 1933 as part of President Franklin Roosevelt's New Deal. The CCC employed hundreds of thousands of men throughout the nation on projects including: structural improvement, transportation, flood and erosion control, forest protection,

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landscape and recreation, and range improvement.⁴ Of the 52 CCC camps in South Dakota, 23 were Forest Service camps.⁵ Overall the CCC provided employment for more than 32,000 men in South Dakota during its existence.⁶

Only three of the original buildings of Camp F-10 remain today. The two officer's cabins, the hospital cabin and the ruin of the fireplace of the mess hall are the only remaining structures. The majority of CCC buildings were prefabricated with interchangeable parts, which allowed for their disassembly and reuse when the camp closed.⁷ The prefabricated buildings were developed by the U.S. Army in 1934 and became standard issue in CCC camps in 1936.⁸ However, earlier CCC camp buildings were more solidly constructed and either donated or abandoned when the camp closed.⁹ The three remaining buildings of Camp F-10 were constructed in 1933 before the camps became standardized. Historic photographs of Camp F-10 show what appear to be standardized barracks and secondary structures. It is likely that these structures were moved when the camp disbanded, either to another camp or to some other private or public entity.

The three remaining buildings and fireplace ruin retain a high degree of integrity. As one of the earlier CCC camps, there are three remaining log construction cabins that reflect the period before standardization. The cabins and fireplace ruin still convey an excellent sense of the history and time they represent. Camp F-10 is eligible under Criterion A for the role it played in employing South Dakotans during the Great Depression and under Criterion C for its CCC construction affiliation.

Verbal Boundary Description

The boundary is an imaginary line that is roughly in the shape of a triangle. The boundary starts at a point 10 feet off the east edge of the fire place and runs southwest to a point 10 feet off the southwest corner of the west wing of the hospital. The line then runs north to a point 10 feet of the northwest corner of the first officer's cabin. The line then runs southeast to the original starting point.

Boundary Justification

The boundary surrounds the remaining built structures of Camp F-10.
