### **Summary**

Hughes Hall at Arkansas Tech University is a two story, stone masonry classroom building designed in the Plain Traditional style with little other recognizable detail. Its plan is "U"-shaped, with a main southern section connected to two symmetrically-placed, hipped roof projections that flank a central shed area. The main elevation features two gable roof dormers set into the hipped roof, all of which is covered with asphalt shingles. The walls are sheathed with fieldstone and the building rests upon a continuous stone foundation.

### Elaboration

Hughes Hall at Arkansas Tech University is a two story, stone masonry classroom building designed in the Plain Traditional style with little other recognizable detail. Its plan is "U"-shaped, with a main southern section connected to two symmetrically-placed, hipped roof projections that flank a central shed area. The main elevation features two gable roof dormers set into the hipped roof, all of which is covered with asphalt shingles. The walls are sheathed with fieldstone and the building rests upon a continuous stone foundation.

The southern or front elevation is dominated by the monumental, central triangular stair ramp that provides access to the second floor from both the east and the west. The second story is fifteen bays in length, with the central double-leaf entrance separating the seven window bays to either side. The first story is lighted with three window bays to either side of the staircase, most of which retain their original compound metal windows, with a four-pane, central awning window surrounded by twelve fixed panes. The elevation is completed by the two hipped dormer vents placed symmetrically in the roof plane. The northern elevation opposite is lighted with four window bays on each of the ends of the "U" plan -- each of which is surmounted by a single, central dormer vent -- and with three more window bays on the eastern and western walls of the inside of the "U". Two single-leaf entrances are placed at the northern ends of the inside elevations, and a wood, shed roof covers the interior courtyard.

The western elevation is eight bays in length on the second floor, containing seven window bays and a single-leaf entrance. The first story is lighted with four horizontal windows to the north and three large, rectangular entrances to the south of a central, single-leaf entrance. The larger openings originally held overhead doors; only the central opening remains functional, the others having been filled in with concrete block. The eastern elevation opposite is lighted with three window bays to the south and a row of five horizontal windows to the north, identical to those

seen on the western elevation. A single-leaf entrance that was placed on this elevation has been filled in with concrete block also.

Hughes Hall has suffered the filling and the covering of several of its window openings; however, the building is substantially intact and in good condition.

# Hughes Hall; Arkansas Tech University

Arkansas Tech University was founded in 1909 when the Arkansas General Assembly created four Agricultural School Districts, with the Second District being formed by the twenty counties of northwest Arkansas. The city of Russellville offered the governor-appointed Board of Trustees four-hundred acres adjoining the city limits and a cash bonus of several thousand dollars, and was thus selected as the site of the new school.

The Second District Agricultural School -- as it was initially known -- first matriculated students in the fall of 1910. The school was planned to function initially as an agricultural secondary school and to grow into a four-year college-level institution as soon as possible. It first offered a freshman year of college work in 1921-22, and instituted second, third and fourth years in each of the succeeding academic years, respectively, so that by 1925 both a four-year high school and a four-year college were operating on the same campus. This progress was acknowledged by the Arkansas General Assembly in 1925 when it changed the name of the school to Arkansas Polytechnic College and awarded it the power to grant degrees. However, this ambitious program proved beyond the resources of the school, and by 1927 it became a two-year junior college. It remained so until 1948, when the Board of Trustees re-instituted its degree-granting status with a plan to return to a four-year school. The General Assembly officially changed the name to Arkansas Tech University in 1976.

The 1930's heralded one of the most ambitious periods of construction on the campus. As was the case with many public sites and institutions around the state, the labor force was largely contributed by the Emergency Relief Administration (ERA), the federal agency established by President Franklin D. Roosevelt to hire the nation's unemployed for the purpose of carrying out a broad variety of projects in the public interest. The Works Progress Administration (WPA), the National Youth Administration (NYA) and the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) were all subsidiary organizations whose work in Arkansas was overseen by the ERA.

Hughes Hall was constructed in 1940 by the Works Progress Administration. As such, it was built during the period covered by the historic context *The Evolution of the Public School System in the Arkansas Ozarks*, 1920-1940, and stands as an unusual example of a large, stone masonry classroom building with a "U"-shaped plan designed in what can best be described as the Plain/Traditional style. Its use during this period as an educational classroom building for a public university clearly identifies it with this historic context and with this property type. It is significant locally under Criterion A through its direct associations with both the history of the evolution of the public school system in the Ozark Mountain region of the state during this

This nomination is amended to show both the historic and current functions of the property as Education/College. What is now Arkansas Technical University was initially established as a secondary school. During the period of significance for this building, however, the institution was a two year junior college, which it had become in 1925. It became Arkansas Technical University in 1976.

This change has been confirmed by phone with the Arkansas SHPO (10/23/92).
