A U-shaped, gable roofed, hand-hewn log house, the Fort Winnebago Surgeon's Quarters is set upon a quarried stone foundation. Each of the two wings of the house contains two connecting rooms of about equal size, with a connecting passageway between the wings at the closed end of the building. Within this passageway is a fireplace area. There is a single small room in the attic.

The use of exterior trim gives the quaint log building a distinctly dressed appearance. Rather than merely being neatly cut and fitted, the corners of the house are covered with plain sawed boards, and window and door casings are trimmed to match. Muntined windows have two panes to the sash and are fitted with plain vertical board shutters.

An interesting classic revival influence is noted in the use of raking cornices with wide frieze boards and cornice returns at the gable ends of the wings. These architectural details were undoubtedly added at the time of conversion of the log building from its original use as a fur trader's home and then as a sutler's store to suitable housing for the post surgeon, in 1834. The original log house was built sometime between 1818 and 1828.

In the restoration of the Surgeon's Quarters in the early 1950's, plans furnished by the War Department, which had been used in the remodeling of 1834, were used to determine the original placement of partitions, fire-places, chimneys, stairway, doors and windows. Exact locations of fire-places were determined by location of the original foundations and footings under the floor. The exact location of the kitchen fireplace was shown by the old red brick base which is still in place. The chimneys have been restored and the three fireplaces were rebuilt on the original foundations to conform to the general plan of fireplaces of the period, since there was no description or plan of their exact appearance. Two of them were rebuilt with bricks known to have been made at the Armstrong brick kiln (at Portage) which furnished the original bricks for Fort Winnebago.

Much of the original flooring remains and the original structural members such as ceiling joists, roof trusses and beams of hand-hewn pine or tamarack are also in an excellent state of preservation.

The building was plastered on hand-sawed and hand-tooled lath and the Plaster made of lime burned nearby.

Although Fort Winnebago was of strategic importance due to its location, it was never a heavily fortified garrison and never engaged in fighting actions of any consequence. It did not figure directly in the Black Hawk War of 1832. However the troops stationed at the fort were responsible for building the portion of the Green Bay - Prairie du Chien military road extending from the portage to Green Bay.

The life of the fort was relatively short; it was garrisoned only from 1828 to 1845. During that period the fur trade disappeared, the Winnebago were removed from their lands in Wisconsin, the Military Road from Green Bay to Prairie du Chien was completed, the Wisconsin Territory was created, and there was an attempt to dig a canal to connect the Wisconsin and Fox rivers.

Jefferson Davis, Secretary of War, who had been stationed at Fort Winnebago in its early days, sold the reservation lands to private owners in 1853-54. In 1856 about a third of the barracks buildings burned down and in 1866 the rest of the buildings were torn down except for the aurgeon's quarters, which was used as a farm home and not destroyed. The Wisconsin Society, Daughters of the American Revolution purchased the building when it was in danger of demolition in 1937 and faithfully restored it.

The Fort Winnebago Surgeon's Quarters, on its original location, is the last remaining building of a military installation which, despite a relatively short existence, was highly significant to the commerce and development of Wisconsin in the years just prior to achievement of territorial status in 1836 and for most of the ensuing period until Wisconsin's attainment of statehood in 1848.
