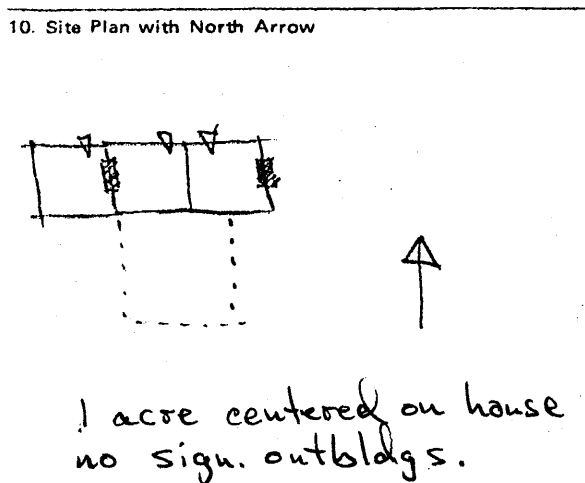

19. History on 2 south doors not visible - later all south side - round arches probably original
Built by William P. Neale - used slave labor - bricks fired on the property - woodwork all walnut was put on property - Property + house were sold to Richard Dawson Neale - William Neale's son. in 1853

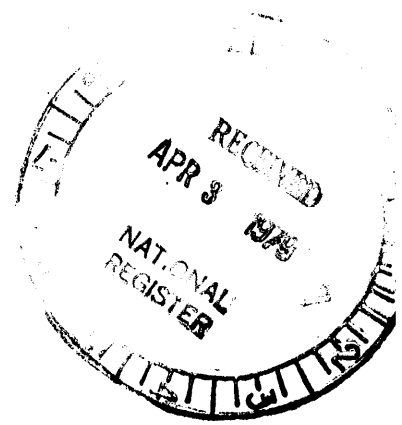

This house is one of six highly significant Federal style brick houses in the county that are based on the hall and parlor plan type and one of an even smaller sub-category consisting of houses with four-bayed facades. The house is further distinguished by a one-storied end addition rather than the expected ell and by unusual segmental retaining arches over the first floor and basement openings.

The William P. Neale house is unoccupied and has been neglected, but it is in sound structural condition. The tin roof shows no signs of leakage; although the sashes of several windows have been removed, no damage to the interior or exterior has resulted. The building's form, brickwork, and interior features, the chief reasons for the building's architectural significance, are intact.
