By 1918, Rev. Jacob T. Brown was residing here, and by 1923, Rev. Broadus H. Hogan was listed at this address. Both were also pastors of First African Baptist Church.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL): Architecture: This house is significant as a Victorian Cottage which employs Eastlake detailing. Few properties in this area of town can boast the porch turnings and bracketing found here. Local History: This house is significant as it was apparently built as the parsonage for pastors of First African Baptist Church and is structured as such. This dwelling is situated directly next door to the actual sanctuary (which is also included in this multiple resource nomination as #437).
