The home is significant for its structural material. Cut stone was a rare building material used on only a few residence in Safford. Bick came from Tucson, and El Paso, brought to Safford by the opening of the railroad, Brick kilns proliferated in the Safford area due to the local soils which possessed enough clay to produce a high quality hard baked brick. Cut stone was very rarely used due to the availability of these other building materials, thus this home represents a very unique and distinctive building element used in the construction of few homes in Safford.
