DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

At the time of Fort Adams' occupancy, there were extensive buildings on the site. These structures consisted of a blockhouse and a watchtower situated upon the summit of the bluff almost three hundred feet above and overlooking the Mississippi River. The magazine was located at the foot of the bluff, and nearer the river was the battery. A road connected the three principal locations by descending the bluff on the east side and spiraling onto the glacis below and to the magazine and battery west of the bluff. This road also served the landing on the bank of the river near the battery.

With the exception of brick rubble, no visible evidence of the fort remains today. However, a team of archaeologists from the Smithsonian Institute visited the site in 1960 and discovered the inground remains of the foundations. At this time, the archaeologists were able to establish and verify the extent of the structures at the fort.

The fort site is on the south edge of the present day community of Fort Adams, which is named, of course, for the nineteenth century fort. The glacis of the fort which encompassed the battery and magazine is in cultivation, but the summit where the blockhouse and watchtower stood is overgrown by forests. If one climbs to the summit and overlooks the broad Mississippi and into the flat lands of Louisiana, it is readily apparent why Captain Isaac Guion chose this spot for America's frontier picket.

While commander of Fort Adams, Wilkinson performed valuable services to the United States. He was instrumental in securing treaties with the Indians for post roads, land, and an overland route to the Yazoo River. He also obtained permission from the Spanish for passage and deposit of American goods at the port of New Orleans.

Fort Adams served as a port of entry, with collection agents stationed at the garrison to collect duties for all goods entering the territory by way of the Mississippi River. Before the duty was abolished June 30, 1802, \$59,029.29 was collected on tonnage shipped into the Mississippi District.

The village of Wilkinsonburgh, with a saw mill, several stores and dwellings for the families of the garrison, grew up immediately adjoining the lands of Fort Adams proper. Fort Adams was also the setting of Edward Everett Hale's story The Man Without a Country (1863).

The existence of the fort as a military outpost was short lived because of the Louisiana Purchase. When the United States purchased the whole of France's American territory from Napoleon in 1802, the garrison reached its peak in strength. Since opposition was expected from the Spanish, who were still in possession of New Orleans, troops were sent to bolster the small garrison and to accompany the commissioners to New Orleans for the transfer ceremony. The Spanish, however, although offering little cooperation, did not actively resist. The movement of troops to New Orleans left the fort with a complement of only twelve men and a lieutenant, but it continued as a military establishment until 1810.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The site of Fort Adams, twenty miles west of Woodville on the Mississippi River, was strategically important to the American frontier during the Mississippi territorial period. The fort, closer to the Spanish territory than any other army post, controlled all traffic up or down the Mississippi. The ground chosen for the fortifications by Captain Isaac Guion was situated high enough to offer prospects of reasonable Health and to afford an excellent defensive position. The fort was also in close proximity to the new national boundary of 31° latitude.


In 1798 following the expedition of Guion, President John Adams ordered Brigadier General James Wilkinson to move a body of troops to the site and to investigate the possibilities of constructing fortifications. Wilkinson arrived at Natchez on September 27, 1798, with a flotilla of twenty-seven barges containing soldiers and their equipment and moved on to the site shortly thereafter.

By late 1799, eighty thousand dollars had been expended in the construction of the fort, which contained a battery of cannon, a magazine and barracks for the garrison. This new fort, named in honor of President John Adams, occupied the point of land previously known by the French as Roche à Davion ("Davion's Rock") and more recently as "Loftus Heights" by the British.

The first commander of Fort Adams was General James Wilkinson, a man of much intrigue and mystery. He had been involved in an unsuccessful scheme to overthrow George Washington during the Revolutionary War and had later conspired with Spain for the control of the Southwest territory, even to the point of swearing allegiance to the Spanish government. General Wilkinson was also investigated in Aaron Burr's alleged conspiracy to establish an empire in Mexico or the Southwest. During his stormy military career, Wilkinson received two court-martials.
