

The Academy Grove Historic District comprises two Italianate-influenced frame buildings located in a grove of trees on the northwest side of Maryland Route 361 east of the village of Fairmount in Somerset County, Maryland. The two buildings include the Fairmount Academy, constructed c. 1860-67 to serve as a public school for the Potato Neck District, and the Knights of Pythias Hall, erected adjacent to the Academy c. 1872 by the Fairmount Lodge No. 77 of the Knights of Pythias. The two buildings are similar in form, construction, and detailing. Both are rectangular frame structures, two stories high, with symmetrical three-bay principal facades facing southeast. Entrances feature double-leaf doors in transomed Classical surrounds. The buildings are sheathed in weatherboard, and feature bracketed cornices and narrow paneled pilasters at their corners. The Knights of Pythias Hall is gable-roofed, while the Academy has a hipped roof to which an open belfry was added in 1888. Interior plan and appointments are likewise similar, with a vestibule and stair hall across the front, opening into a large open class or meeting room on each floor. The two buildings served a common educational function as early as 1883, when the Knights of Pythias Hall was rented by the Board of Education; when the Fairmount Lodge disbanded in 1911, the Hall continued to provide additional classroom space for the Academy.

SIGNIFICANCE SUMMARY:

The Academy Grove Historic District is significant for its architecture, comprising two well-preserved frame public buildings showing the influence of the Italianate style, a style rarely used in rural Somerset County. Notable features of both buildings include bracketed cornices and paneled corner pilasters. In addition, the District is significant for its association with the development of public education and civic organizations in the county during the third quarter of the 19th century. The Fairmount Academy is the best-preserved survivor of the county's earliest efforts to create a public educational system. The c. 1872 Knights of Pythias Hall is the only known structure in the county erected to serve as a meeting place for that organization; it is also significantly associated with education, having provided additional classroom space for the Academy as early as 1883.

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GENERAL DESCRIPTION:

The 'two buildings comprising the Academy Grove Historic District are described briefly below:

Fairmount Academy (S-108)

Fairmount Academy is located between Upper Fairmount and Fairmount on the northwest side of Maryland 361. The frame school building faces southeast with the axis of the roof running in a northwest/southeast direction.

The c. 1860-1867 two-story rectangular frame Italianate structure is supported by a minimal brick foundation and covered by a steeply pitched asphalt tile hip roof. The building measures 30'7" by 45'7" and is uniformly sheathed with weatherboard siding. A small frame bell tower is centered on the roof.

The southeast facade is three bays across with center double doors flanked by 12/12 sash windows. The double doors are replacements but the four-light transom and dentiled lintel are original features. Three 12/12 sash windows pierce the second floor. The four corners of the building are trimmed with paneled pilasters, and the eaves are distinguished with brackets.

Both side walls are pierced by an asymmetrical arrangement of 12/12 sash which light the main rooms on both floors. A side entrance into the front hall and an interior brick stove stack are on the southwest elevation.

The rear facade has four boarded windows, two on each floor, along with a back door.

Inside both the first and second floors are divided into two rooms; a small stair hall or vestibule in front and the large classroom behind. On the main floor twin stairs flank the entrance and rise opposite each other to the second floor. A heavily turned newel post and tapered oak balusters support an oval profile handrail. Under each stair a small room has been partitioned for a bathroom on the right and storage on the left. Two door openings pierce the vestibule partition and open into the first floor classroom. A centrally located, fluted iron post supports the floor above. Blackboards are fixed to the side and back walls.

The second floor is divided in the same manner. However, a stage has been added to the large classroom. Standing on the stage is a platform with the school bell inscribed by McShane Bell Foundry, Henry McShane and Company, Baltimore, MD., 1888. The front room was mainly used for storage but does contain a ladder for access onto the roof.

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GENERAL DESCRIPTION (continued)

Knights of Pythias Hall

The Knights of Pythias Hall is located next to Fairmount Academy between Upper and Lower Fairmount on the northwest side of Maryland 361. The frame building faces southeast with the axis of the gable roof running in a northwest/ southeast direction.

The c. 1872-1875 two-story three bay by two room weatherboard frame structure is supported by a minimal brick foundation and is covered by a medium sloped asphalt tile roof. The eaves are extended as well as bracketed. Like the adjacent Fairmount Academy, the building is trimmed on each corner with paneled pilasters.

The southeast facade is three bays across with center double doors and flanking 6/6 sash windows. The double doors are replacements, but the simple classical surround, dentiled cornice and two-light transom are original features. Two 6/6 sash windows light the second floor, and one 6/6 sash window lights the attic.

Each side is three bays across. The southwest facade has three 6/6 sash on each floor, while the northeast side has a side entrance that is flanked by 6/6 sash windows. Like the Academy building, the rear windows have been boarded over. A brick stove stack rises out of the center of the building against the interior partition.

The plan of this building is similar to the Academy. The main difference is that only one stair, to the right of the entrance, leads to the second floor. A heavily turned newel post and turned balusters support an oval profile handrail which curves to the second floor. The main room is fitted with blackboards due to the later use as a school. Two square wood piers support the second floor. The small room left of the entrance is a later alteration.

The second floor is divided in the same manner with no unusual features.

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HISTORY AND SUPPORT:

Local tradition has held to an 1839 date of establishment for a school house on Potato Neck. The earliest documented reference is found in the will of Lazarus Maddox, which was proved on March 26, 1841,

> It is my will that I now establish and confirm the following to be the line between my home farm above described and my other lands hereafter mentioned commencing at the northwest corner of my field adjoining Edward T. Hall's Store on the north side of the County road in Potato Neck, from thence running with a straight line to a marked pine tree standing near the School House down the neck on the same side of the County road aforesaid."1

This marked pine and school house are referred to in an 1848 plat of a 19 3/8 acre parcel of Daniel Ballard's land, known as "School House Ridge."2 With these two firm references, it appears that a school was located on this site as early as 1839. However, a proper deed had not been executed for the school house ground. In 1867, Daniel Emery Ballard and Rosa Ballard granted to William Muir and others, "one and one half acres of land more or less to have and to hold the same in and for the use and purposes of a School House or Academy for the Education of Youth."3

Despite an uncertain date of construction for the extant academy building, it seems most probable that the trustees wanted a binding deed that would insure ownership of a new academy. A pre-1867 construction date is further strengthened by the fact that the Somerset County Board of Education Minutes begin in 1867. and no mention is made of erecting an academy in the Potato Neck District. The name "Fairmount Academy" was evidently assigned to the building around the time of its construction, for early Board of Education references mention Fairmount Academy specifically. For instance, it was ordered by the Board on April 17, 1867, that, "The Treasurer pay to the teacher of Fairmount Academy as Librarian the sum of twenty dollars provided by Chapter 7, Section 1 of the Public School Law. "4

The next building project at "Academy Grove" involved the construction of the Knights of Pythias Hall, c. 1872. The Society of Knights of Pythias, was founded in 1864 by Henry Rathbone (1839-1889) in Washington, D.C. Fairmount Lodge No. 77 was established on May 5, 1872.5 Due to the close similarity in architectural details between the Fairmount Academy and the Knights of Pythias Hall, it is thought the structure was assembled not long after the Fairmount Lodge's inception. The first reference to the building is found in the Board of Education minute book of August 14, 1883, when a bill was submitted to the

Board for a \$60.00 rental of the Knights of Pythias Hall at Fairmount.⁶ The Fairmount Chapter of Knights of Pythias dissolved in 1911, but the building was still used for additional classroom space.

In 1888, the Fairmount Academy Building was graced with a school bell ordered through the McShane Bell Foundry, McShane Company of Baltimore, MD. The notice of purchase was signed by John Hall, William E. Muir, A. Whittington, John Ford and L.H. Miles. From the late 19th century until 1927, all twelve grades were offered by an academy staff of five: one principal and four teachers. Beginning in 1927, the grades were cut back to one through seven, and from 1944 to 1969 only the first six grades were taught.

In 1972, a decision to auction off all unused school buildings was made by the Somerset County Commissioners. This action galvanized a group of local residents to establish the Fairmount Academy Historical Association. This group holds a lease on the property, as long as they maintain the buildings.

VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION AND JUSTIFICATION

The nominated property, 1½ acres, comprises the single lot upon which the buildings stand, and represents the historic landscaped setting around these two structures. It comprises the property transferred in 1867 from Thomas E. Ballard to the trustees of Fairmount Academy, and is traditionally known as "Academy Grove," a reference to the mature trees which enhance the setting of the buildings. Boundaries are depicted on the attached map.
