there is a mistake in their bill of 12 May
1827. in the cost of a pipe Give 124 net Gallons
of \$12³⁰/₁₀₀ Dols Lps - added to the note
will amount to \$550³⁰/₁₀₀ Dols. Their offer
was to give ~~two~~ notes at 4 + 6 months but
we should prefer one at 4 - or even 5 months
one creditor they have settled at 4 mos and an other
in Feb at the rate more than 10% on the pound we
the ~~the~~ cost & Collection of these notes should
be added - collection is one per cent - however
anything you will please to do will meet our
