JF613 Presbyterian Manse 125 Bellewood Road, Anchorage, Kentucky

Description

Erected ca. 1910, this one-and-one half story house is of frame construction. Moorish arches highlight the porch which encloses the structure on its southwest and southeast facades. Similar arches connecting the house and garage are actually later additions. A dormer rises above the steeply pitched roof, while the single interior brick chimney is located slightly off-center. Brackets embellish the dormer and gable ends, reflecting an Arts and Crafts influence.

Significance

The Presbyterian Manse, originally designed for use as a parsonage for the Anchorage Presbyterian Church, provides an interesting example of early twentieth-century architecture. Like the Robert May house (JF604), it reflects the eclecticism prevalent in many residences dating from this period. However, the Moorish influence evident in the arches of the porch is unique in the Anchorage area.

Although indicative of a highly popular trend of the early twentieth century, the Arts and Crafts element seen in the Presbyterian Manse is also rather unusual in this section of Jefferson County.

Boundary Description

The boundary of the Presbyterian Manse site comprises Lot 450 in County Block 22 and measures 185 ft. by 325 ft. The nominated site includes the house. There are no significant outbuildings.
