DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Fern Mountain Ranch stands on the western slopes of the San Francisco Peaks, looking across Hart Prairie to Mt. Humphreys. Five of the original buildings (constructed of pine, aspen, fir, and spruce cut from the nearby forests) are still in use.

The house (X-1), which faces east is a rectangular $1\frac{1}{2}$ story log building with a shingle roof. Gable ends are vertical plank and so are the doors. Logs are chinked with mud. The building is approximately 15' x 35'.

The dining room (X-2) was built in a line with the house and is similar in size, shape, and construction. The space between the two buildings was at one time filled in with a one-story vertical plank addition, but this was removed ca. 1934. There is now a small log addition on the northwest corner. There is a small dormer on the east side. Mud chinking has been reinforced with concrete and a concrete foundation has been added. The building is approximately 15' x 35'.

The barn and stable (x-3) has had some additions but the original stalls remain. The structure is approximately 80' long with two 60' wings. The barn was evidently constructed in three sections, all of logs with vertical plank gabled roofs. The logs of the south addition have been squared. The stalls are also of log and have shingle roofs. Corral fences are of log and pasture fences are split rails.

The two small outbuildings are of logs. X-4 is a storage shed with a corrugated roof layered with dirt and is approximately 10' x 12'. X-5 is a 12' x 20' cabin with shingle roof and vertical plank gables.

There are three structures from the 1930s. Building A is a log shed large enough to hold four cars. Building B is a residence built by Wilson of stained logs and appears to have been constructed in four sections. Roofs are shingled and have horizontal plank gable ends. Building C is a small frame playhouse with a shingled roof.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Fern Mountain Ranch is notable as a pioneer Arizona ranch which is virtually unchanged. The original buildings are still in use. The ranch also played an important role in the development of the Grand Canyon as a tourist attraction.

August Dillman Freudenberger and his wife settled in Flagstaff in the 1880s. In 1887, they took over the Daggs brewery there. (During World War I, Freudenberger dropped his last name and was known as Gus Dillman.)

About 1890 the Freudenbergers decided to go into ranching and acquired the land for Fern Mountain Ranch. They constructed a log house, a barn, and several outbuildings and secured a patent to the land in 1896.

In May of 1892, the Santa Fe Railroad Company started a tri-weekly tourist stage to the Grand Canyon from Flagstaff. The 12 hour trip covered 65 miles and required three relays. The first relay station was at Fern Mountain Ranch 18 miles from the starting point at Flagstaff's Bank Hotel. The ranch stables housed the relay horses.


The ranch was not scheduled as a meal stop but Mrs. Freudenberger always had sandwiches and cold milk or buttermilk ready for the passengers. The cabin adjoining the house was used as a dining room. As many as 900 people traveled this route each year. Theodore Roosevelt once stopped here. After 1901, the tourists traveled to the Canyon by train.

In 1928, the ranch was purchased by Robert T. Wilson, one time Mayor of Corpus Christi, Texas. Mrs. Wilson is a writer. They decided that Arabian horses and half-Arabs would be well-suited to Arizona ranch needs and acquired the famous Army Remount stallion Ribal, importing Arab, Saddlebred, and Thoroughbred mares at the same time. Fern Mountain Ranch then became the first in Arizona to raise Arabian horses. Ribal was of imported English stock and his name is on pedigrees of many outstanding horses. Ribal appears in Historic Photo #10. The ranch is now owned by Wilson's son, Richard, and is leased to the Museum of Northern Arizona.
