> This house, while having been altered through the years, still retains a sufficient amount of its original fabric that it should be recognized and retained. We are therefore including it for its architectural significance, for its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County area, and for its remaining historic fabric. As such, it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey.





Howard I. Durie says this house was built around 1794. Peter Post, a third generation of millers, came from Pompton and bought land along Bear Brook on April 1, 1789 from Johannes Myers and built a grist mill and residence. The tract extended east to the Pascack Brook and west to the top of the hill along Bear Brook. On May 5, 1794 Peter P. Post bought a tract of 112 acres and thirty porches south of the mill property from James S. Bogert and Frederick Storms. He subsequently built the s one house. Probably as an aid to completing the house, Post mortgaged the land to John Najie on December 28, 1795 for ±300. He married Neesje (Nashie or Nancy) Post, his cousin, and they had twelve children between 1771 and 1795. In 1795 he petitioned for the laying out of Glen Road for access from the west. He died suddenly in the summer of 1779 in debt, which was not resolved until the homestead and 91.57 acres were sold on June 16, 1806 to John Perry of Orangetown for \$2,641.25. His son-in-law and daughter, John and Margaret Blauvelt, occupied the farm until it was traded to Abraham J. Demarest in 1817. He remained until his death in 1863 and it went to his son Isaac. Subsequent owners included Charles F. Neer, Gideon W. Davenport and Peter Q. Eckerson, Fredericka B. McHarg and Honore G. Prades. Elsa Ross.
