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Narrative Description:

Lincoln School sits on a corner lot in a residential neighborhood of Belle Fourche, SD. It is a two-and-one-half story, brick building with a flat roof featuring a parapet with decorative gable peaks. From its construction in 1919 until the mid-1960s the building served as an elementary school and later as school administration offices. In the late 1990s, the current owners purchased it to be converted into a private residence. The school is in very good condition and retains a high degree of integrity.

The Lincoln School reflects elements of standardized school plans used in South Dakota in the 1910s and 1920s. The plan exhibits many of the elements required under plans for standardization of schools including window placement, light to floor area formulas, and ventilation. It does not strictly conform to set school plans, though as it features a hallway that runs the full width of the building as opposed to having a central or double loaded corridor. It is also simpler in detail than many of the schools constructed during this time, especially in eastern South Dakota towns.

The façade of the building is asymmetrical with an entry door offset to the left. Two steps lead up to the doors, which have been replaced with new steel and glass doors. The doorway features a brick architrave topped by a rounded arch. The arch features decorative cast concrete elements. Above the entry is a rectangular cast nameplate carved with "Lincoln School". To the north of the entry are three six-light windows. The windows are single hung with only the bottom two lights moveable. The two top lights are smaller than the other four. These windows feature concrete sills and soldier brick lintels. To the north of these windows is a pair of the same style window with similar treatments. The second story features three centered windows that are the same as those on the first floor. Three two-light basement windows are to the north of the entry. A soldier course of bricks encircles the entire building approximately three feet above the ground. A masonry belt course runs above the second floor windows around the building. A decorative concrete cap on the parapet also is around the entire structure. All of the other windows in the building were reduced in size and replaced in the late 1960s when the building was remodeled and "updated". In 1999 and 2000 the owners began replacing the windows in replicas of the historic windows. These windows were six larger lights divided into six smaller lights each.

The north elevation of the school features two single windows, one on each floor, near the east façade. These windows open into the hallway. To the west of these individual windows, are ribbons

of five windows replaced in 2000. There are four windows at the basement level, two, two-light windows toward the front of the building, a single, small eight-light window, and a single one-over-one window.

The south elevation duplicates the north elevation. Windows on this elevation have not yet been replaced. The two individual window openings are completely filled in. The ribbons of windows have been mostly filled with small sliding windows that were put in place during the 1960s remodel. These windows feature concrete sills and soldier course lintels, like the windows on the north. The basement features two, two-light windows and three one-over-one windows.

The rear, west elevation of the building, has fewer window openings than the other elevations. There are two windows in the basement level. There is also a door into the basement at the northwest corner. A second doorway, centered under the fire escape, has been filled in with glass block. A two-story fire escape is centered on the rear elevation. One door exits onto the escape from each floor of the structure.

Period of Significance

1919-1950

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Statement of Significance:

The Lincoln School in Belle Fourche, South Dakota is significant under Criterion A for its role in the educational development in Butte County. Although no longer serving as a school, the building is indicative of the early years of school standardization in South Dakota.

While standardization tended to provide a better environment for learning, it also served to remove some of the uniqueness of school buildings on the landscape. Constructed in 1919, the first year financial incentives were offered by the state for meeting standardized plans, the Lincoln School reflects many of the elements intended to provide for the greatest learning potential. Window placement, lighting, room layout, and other factors were met. Although meeting these standards, the school did not completely conform to the standardized model.

Lincoln School features design elements from two phases of school reform in South Dakota. Rural schools were designed to be more functionally appropriate, at the same time a move was made to consolidate school districts. Generally, rural schools from this time frame featured two or four rooms and a hipped roof. They were stylistically like an oversized one-room schoolhouse. Consolidated schools tended to have more stylistic attributes with many being designed in the Romanesque style. These schools were larger, with flat roofs and central entryways leading into a central corridor. The Lincoln School was a combination of the two phases.

Featuring four rooms and simply block form, the school was similar to many other rural schools, but with its flat roof and simple, but ornamental design it compared more to a larger school. Different from both standardized plans was the use of a full width corridor along the front of the building on both floors. The stairway to the second floor was in this corridor and the doors into the classrooms were centered on the interior wall. The school had a large multipurpose room, restrooms, and boiler room in the basement.

Although the school is now being used as a single family dwelling, those features that make it eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places are intact. Although the windows have been altered, it is stated in the Schools in South Dakota Multiple Property Documentation Form, "It is rare to find a building dating to this period that is still in use and retains the original size and proportion of the historic windows." The Multiple Property Listing goes on to say that many of the schools dating

from this period have been drastically altered with additions, dating from both historic and non-historic time periods.

The intact character of the school's massing, plan, window configuration, and design make it eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion A. It reflects a period of educational reform, growth, and standardization in South Dakota, while retaining a small amount of distinctive character.
