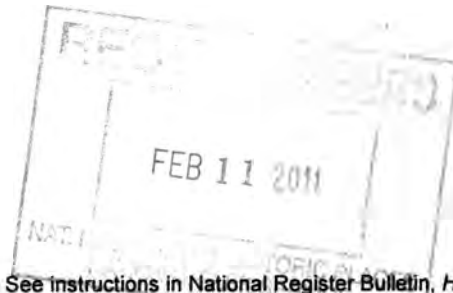



#### **Summary Paragraph**

The Algiers Point Historic District (Orleans Parish) was listed in the National Register in 1977 with the boundaries shown on the attached map. They are the Mississippi River levee on the north and west, a large swath of vacant land on the east (a former railroad corridor), and a line running down the middle of Slidell St. on the south. In 1996 the National Park Service accepted an update extending the period of significance for the district to 1946. (Boundaries were not addressed at that time.) This expansion will increase the boundaries to the south, adding a total of 63 buildings, 55 contributing and 8 non-contributing.

### **Narrative Description**

#### Methodology:

In August 2009 the designated project consultant surveyed the district boundaries and readily agreed with the SHPO that a boundary extension was appropriate. But generally speaking, the consultant did note a high degree of vacant lots and altered historic buildings beyond Slidell. To be able to make solid recommendations on a boundary increase, the consultant identified a several block study area beyond Slidell (from Slidell to Newton, stretching between Atlantic and River Street) and conducted a building-by-building survey, identifying each by style, type and contributing or non-contributing status. This showed quite graphically what had appeared to be the case from initial fieldwork. The historic character (matching that of the existing district) ended in different places on different block-faces and streets, hence the irregular nature of the proposed boundary increase.

#### Building Types and Styles:

As per National Park Service instructions, the character of the existing district is described in Part 8.

Mostly residential in nature, the buildings to be added to the district share the same character. Most are one-story and are routinely of frame construction. However, some have bungalow style porch piers and columns made of brick. All have pier foundations, with the areas forming their porches often enclosed or made of concrete slabs. Although gable roof houses exist, the hip roof form dominates. Some roofs have shed roof dormers which are pierced by windows; the peaks of gabled houses are often pierced by windows or vents.

The above mentioned study identified the following building types and styles within the proposed area of expansion:

The "other" category within building types includes a church and a camelback shotgun. Stylistically, the "other" category includes an early twentieth century brick Gothic Revival church with a prominent side tower and a shotgun with a Queen Anne Revival inspired facade.

Contributing Elements:

The preparers of this submission evaluated resource status based on the continuance (or lack thereof) of the architectural character described in Part 8 of this document. With 63 buildings, 55 contributing and 8 non-contributing, the boundary increase area has a non-contributing rate of 12%, admittedly more than the listed Algiers Point district, but still low. And with 70% styled shotguns, it continues the architectural character of the listed district. And like the listed district, contributing elements retain a high degree of integrity.

Non-Contributing Elements

There are 8 non-contributing buildings. Almost all are altered historic houses; thus they continue the district's historic streetscapes in terms of massing.

**Statement of Significance Summary Paragraph** (Provide a summary paragraph that includes level of significance and applicable criteria.)

The original National Register-listed Algiers Point Historic District is locally significant under Criterion A within the context of Orleans Parish and the City of New Orleans as a relatively self-contained community which retains its historic appearance, including evidences of the dry-docking, shipbuilding, and railroading industries which influenced the development of the area. The existing district is also significant for its large concentration of historic buildings on densely packed streetscapes. Additionally, the district is locally significant under Criterion C for its large and intact complement of signature New Orleans house types and their high rate of integrity. The area to be included in the boundary expansion also reflects this significance, especially that under Criterion C.

**Narrative Statement of Significance** (Provide at least one paragraph for each area of significance.)

Issues with the southern boundary of the Algiers Point Historic District surfaced in 2006 with the award of National Park Service grant funds for restoring historic buildings damaged by Hurricanes Katrina and Rita. Owners of buildings on the south side of Slidell applied for funding, but were ineligible for consideration because they were outside the National Register historic district. The Louisiana State Historic Preservation Office, after visiting the district, realized that the original boundary along Slidell was not defensible. (The other boundaries were obviously correct – a river and former railroad corridor).

Documents in the SHPO's National Register files show that much discussion went into the choice of the eastern and southern boundaries, and that the proposed boundaries changed before the SHPO forwarded the nomination to the Review Committee and the National Park Service. In the case of the eastern boundary, the district was made smaller by moving the line westward from Thayer to Atlantic streets. This excluded the previously mentioned large railroad corridor located between the two thoroughfares. In the case of the southern boundary, the proposed demarcation appears to have changed from the middle of Slidell to the rear property line of the lots on the south side of Opelousas and then back to the middle of Slidell. Although the original National Register nomination (1978) clearly recognized the middle of Slidell as the southern boundary, neither the narrative nor the SHPO files provide a reason for the final choice of that avenue as the boundary.

In 1996, at the request of a developer seeking tax credits, the SHPO extended the nomination's period of significance from 1927 to 1946. However, only seven buildings were added to the National Register as a result of this update; and the staff did not consider the possibility of expanding the district's southern boundary as part of the project. It is here that professional error occurred. As explained in Part 7, the architectural character of the listed and updated district does not abruptly stop in the middle of Slidell on each and every block-face. Instead, it ends in different places on different block-faces and streets. Thus, the SHPO targeted the district for a boundary increase.

Character of the District

As explained in detail in Part 7 of the original National Register nomination and also in the 1996 update of the period of significance, the Algiers Point Historic District is a large collection of distinctive New Orleans house types. These include Creole cottages, basement houses, and (most importantly) single and double shotgun houses in a variety of styles. The majority of the buildings are single story, although story-and-a-half, camelback and two-story homes are found in the area. Dwellings range from four room doubles to large two story singles and doubles, and from modest to rather grand. Virtually all residential structures are of frame construction.

Most notable among the district's resources are its shotgun houses (single and double). Importantly, these shotgun houses are a regional variant, featuring distinctive and often lavish architectural styling, making them virtually unique in the history of the shotgun house as it developed across the South. Local archetypes also include small Creole cottages (without galleries) and what locals call basement houses, the latter in various styles. (A basement house is a two-story house in which the principal living floor is raised a full story above grade on a high basement.) Styles of note in the district overall include Greek Revival, Italianate (in its bracketed shotgun house form), Eastlake, and Bungalow.

Although the existing documentation does not give a precise tabulation, it is possible to extrapolate that the existing district contains approximately 1,700 elements, with a non-contributing rate of only roughly 4%.

Also containing frame Creole cottages, basement houses, and styled shotgun singles and doubles, the area within the proposed boundary increase clearly continues this character. In fact, 70 percent of its contributing elements are styled shotguns. Additionally, as shown in the type and style breakdowns included in Part 7 of this document, the architectural styles chosen for the houses within the boundary expansion reflect those found in the overall district. Both areas contain examples of Italianate, Eastlake and Bungalow styling; while the Colonial Revival takes the place of the older Greek Revival style. Thus, in both type and style, the houses within the area of the proposed expansion continue the character of the overall area and should be added to the historic district.

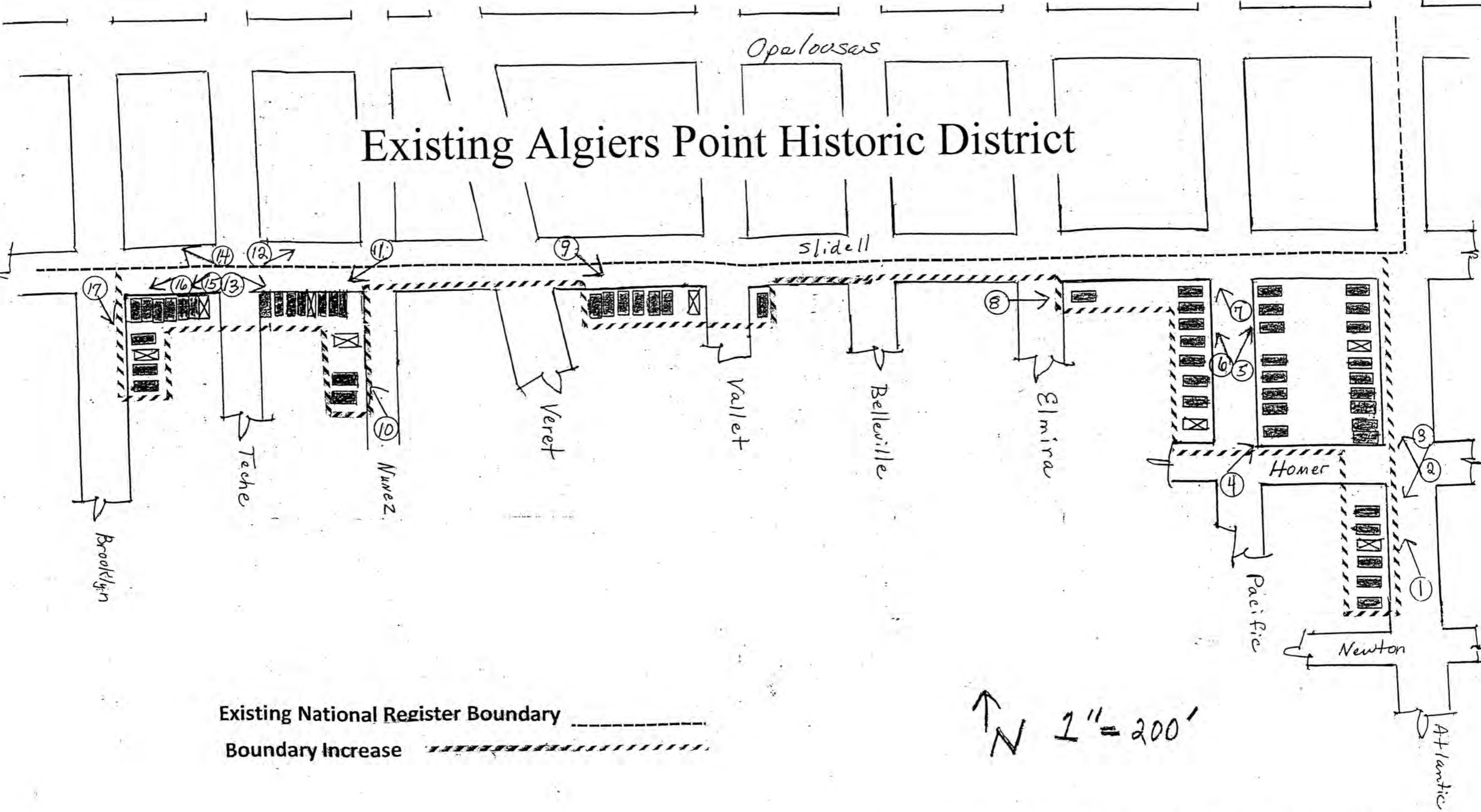

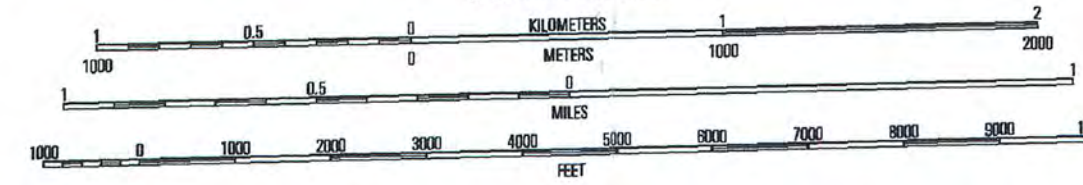
