Narrative Description

Tishomingo State Park is located two miles southeast of Tishomingo, Mississippi off Highway 25 in Tishomingo County. This park consists of 1200 acres, of which approximately 590 are included in this nomination. Tishomingo State Park was the fifth of ten state parks in Mississippi developed by the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC). The CCC Company 3497 began creating the park in April of 1935, and opened the site to the public in May of 1939. All the buildings were designed in the popular Rustic style of architecture commonly found in state park structures to blend with their natural surroundings. Standardized plans were developed by the National Park Service for the layout and construction of park facilities throughout the United States.

The park is characterized by its outcropping rocks, deep ravines, dense undergrowth and the CCC stone structures, with a stream that runs around the historic portion of the park. In order to further blend the man-made landscape with the natural one, all buildings and structures from the CCC era were designed in the Rustic style of architecture. The buildings all retain their original forms, exterior materials, and sense of place.

The park retains a high degree of its overall historic and architectural integrity. However, the majority of the CCC resources are limited to approximately 590 acres of the park. The other park buildings date from the 1970's and most are not included in this nomination. The Tishomingo State Park Historic District contains seventeen buildings, three structures and one landscape that contribute to its architectural and historic character that are listed below. All contributing buildings are identified with the notation "C." Eight buildings within the district do not contribute since they were not constructed by the CCC and do not fit the architectural or historical character of this nomination. These buildings are identified with the notation "NC." The designed landscape of the park is another contributing element and is noted in the inventory.

01 C Picnic Pavilion

One-story stone building with a hipped roof and a stone floor. It is open on three sides, with exposed wood rafters and hand-hewn supports. There is a stone wall on the east end with wood-framed openings. A stone fireplace sits in the center of the east wall with a stone mantel and chimney. There is a gable roof over the projection with the fireplace.

02 C Comfort Station

One-story, stone, rectangular building with a gable roof. The windows have hand-hewn wooden lintels and stone sills. There are louvered, wooden vents at peak of gable end and wood siding in the rest of the gable. Windows have wooden frames and wire mesh. There are stepped, L-shaped, stone privacy walls projecting from the side elevations.

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03 C Main Office

One-story, rectangular, stone, side-gabled building with two gabled wings, a stone foundation, basement and a tar-shingled roof. The center portion has a centrally located, double-leaf, four-light-and-panel doors with pairs of six-pane casements flanking them on either side. The wings have two six-over-six double-hung-sash windows on the south facade. All windows have wooden frames, hand-hewn headers and stone sills. There is a stone chimney on the end of the southeast wing. The basement is exposed on the northeast elevation.

04 C Cabin Number 1

One-story, stone building with a gabled roof and two gabled wings that are screened-in porches. Four-pane casement windows on the east elevation. Eight-pane casement windows on all other elevations. The windows are framed in wood with hand-hewn headers and stone sills. There is a centrally located wooden, single-leaf door on the west facade; as well as wooden, single-leaf doors off the porches on the north and south elevations. There is stone corbelling on the corners under the beveled cornice. The porches have stone floors with tongue-and-groove on the ceiling. A stone chimney rests in the center of the main gable.

05 C Cabin Number 2

One-story, stone building with a cross-gabled roof. The windows are a combination of four-pane and eight-pane casement windows. The windows are framed in wood with hand-hewn headers and stone sills. There is a stone patio on the west facade with a wooden, single-leaf door. Stone chimneys are located at the peaks of the gables on the northeast and southeast sides.

06 C Cabin Number 3

Identical to Cabin Number 1

One-story, stone building with a gabled roof and two gabled wings that are screened in porches. Four-pane casement windows on the south elevation. Eight-pane casement windows on all other elevations. The windows are framed in wood with hand-hewn headers and stone sills. There is a centrally located wooden, single-leaf door on the north facade; as well as wooden, single-leaf doors off the porches on the east and west elevations. The corners are corbelled under the beveled cornice. The porches have stone floors. A stone chimney sits in the center of the main gable.

07 C Cabin Number 4

One-story, rectangular, stone building with a gabled roof and a recessed screened porch on the north facade. Wooden, single-leaf, double doors are centrally located on the porch. The gable ends are sided in wood with wooden louvers in the peak. The windows are a combination of four-pane and eight-pane casements. The windows are framed in wood with hand-hewn headers and stone sills. The corners are corbelled under the beveled cornice. The building sits on a stone foundation and has stone steps.

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**08 C Cabin Number 5
Identical to Cabins Number 4&6**

One-story, rectangular, stone, building with a gabled roof and a recessed screened porch on the north facade. Wooden, single-leaf, double doors are centrally located on the porch. The gable ends are sided in wood with wooden louvers in the peak. The windows are a combination of four-pane and eight-pane casements. The windows are framed in wood with hand-hewn headers and stone sills. The corners are corbelled under the beveled cornice. The building sits on a stone foundation and has stone steps.

**09 C Cabin Number 6
Identical to Cabins Number 4&5**

One-story, rectangular, stone building, with a gabled roof and a recessed screened porch on the north facade. Wooden, single-leaf, double doors are centrally located on the porch. The gable ends are sided in wood with wooden louvers in the peak. The windows are a combination of four-pane and eight-pane casements. The windows are framed in wood with hand-hewn headers and stone sills. The corners are corbelled under the beveled cornice. The building sits on a stone foundation and has stone steps.

10 C Residence

One-story, rectangular, stone, side-gabled building with a stone foundation and a tar-shingle roof. The north facade reads window, window, window, window, door, window. The windows are a combination of six-over-six double-hung-sash and four-pane casements. All have wooden frames with hand-hewn headers and stone sills. There is an addition on the southern side with board-and-batten siding.

**11 C Water Tower
Metal tank and tower**

12 C Lodge

One-story, stone, cross-gabled building with two gabled wings, a stone foundation and a tar-shingle roof. The facade has a stone porch recessed under the gable, supported by hand-hewn wooden posts. The central portion of the facade has ten-light double doors flanked on either side by two six-over-six double-hung-sash windows. All windows have wood frames, hand-hewn headers and stone sills. There is a gabled porch off the northeast wing with hand-hewn supports. A patio extends off the northwest elevation. A cross-gabled portion extends off the southwest wing with several six-over-six double-hung-sash windows.

13 C Swinging Bridge

This is a swinging bridge with stone steps that lead to the stone entrances. The bridge is constructed of wood planks and wire-cabled suspension.

14A C Pool House

One-story, rectangular, stone, side-gabled building with a concrete foundation and a tar-shingle roof. The gable ends are sided in wood with wooden louvers at the peaks. Recessed under the roof on the southwest elevation is a full-length porch supported by six wooden posts on battered concrete bases. The windows are nine-pane casements. On the northeast facade, there are louvered vents under the fascia. The roof projects slightly in the center of the facade to cover a porch supported by four wooden posts on battered concrete bases.

14B C Pool

This is a rectangular, underground, concrete pool located off the southwest side of the pool house. It is surrounded by a concrete patio.

15 C Group Cabin Number 1

One-story, rectangular, wood-frame building with a gabled roof, a stone foundation and a tar-shingle roof. The southwest facade has a door that enters onto the screened porch, recessed under the gable and a pair of four-over-four double-hung-sash windows. All windows have wooden frames. On the southeast elevation, there is a bank of four four-over-four double-hung-sash window. The northeast elevation has a pair of six-pane casements. The porch is enclosed by a half-wall sided in board and batten. There is a stone chimney in the northeast corner of the roof.

16 C Group Cabin Number 2

Identical to Group Cabin Number 1, rotated 90 degrees.

One-story, rectangular, wood-frame building with a gabled roof, a stone foundation and a tar-shingle roof. The northwest facade has a door that enters onto the screened porch, which is recessed under the gable and a pair of four-over-four double-hung-sash windows. All windows have wooden frames. On the southwest elevation, there is a bank of four four-over-four double-hung-sash window. The southeast elevation has a pair of six-pane casements. The porch is enclosed by a half-wall sided in board and batten. There is a stone chimney in the southeast corner of the roof.

17 C Group Cabin Number 3

One-story, rectangular, wood-frame building with a gable roof, a stone foundation and a tar-shingle roof. The southwest facade has a door under a gabled portico and a stone chimney. The roof on the southeast elevation projects over a screened-in porch. The porch is enclosed by a half wall sided in board and batten. On the northeast elevation there is a bank of three four-over-four double-hung-sash windows. The northwest elevation has a bank of four four-over-four double-hung-sash windows.

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18 C Group Cabin Number 5

Identical to Group Cabin Number 3, without a door on the porch

One-story, rectangular, wood-frame building with a gable roof, a stone foundation and a tar-shingle roof. The northeast facade has a door under a gabled portico and a stone chimney. The roof on the northwest elevation projects over a screened-in porch. The porch is enclosed by a half-wall sided in board and batten. On the southwest elevation there is a bank of three four-over-four double-hung-sash windows. The southeast elevation has a bank of four four-over-four double-hung-sash windows.

19 C Group Cabin Number 6

Identical to Group Cabin Number 2, with entrance in center of porch

One-story, rectangular, wood-frame building with a gabled roof, a stone foundation and a tar-shingle roof. The northeast facade has a door that enters onto the screened porch, recessed under the gable. All windows have wooden frames. On the southwest elevation, there is a bank of four four-over-four double-hung-sash window. The southeast elevation has a pair of six-pane casements. The porch is enclosed by a half-wall sided in board and batten. There is a stone chimney in the southeast corner of the roof.

20 NC Modern Group Cabin Lodge

One-story, rectangular, wood-frame building with a gable roof, concrete foundation and a tar-shingle roof. The east facade has a double-leaf, plate-glass door under a gabled portico. The north and south elevation have centrally located, identical porticos. There is a shed-roof projection at the center of the gable roof. All windows have aluminum frames.

21 NC Modern Group Cabin Number 1

One-story, rectangular, wood-frame building with a side-gabled roof, concrete foundation and a tar-shingle roof. The facade reads window, window, window, door, window. The door is a single-leaf wooden door. The windows are single-pane casements grouped in pairs and located directly under the fascia. All windows have aluminum frames.

22 NC Modern Group Cabin Number 2

One-story, rectangular, wood-frame building with a side-gabled roof, concrete foundation and a tar-shingle roof. The facade reads window, window, window, door, window. The door is a single-leaf wooden door. The windows are single-pane casements grouped in pairs located directly under the fascia. All windows have aluminum frames.

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23 NC Modern Group Cabin Number 3

One-story, rectangular, wood-frame building with a side-gabled roof, concrete foundation and a tar-shingle roof. The facade reads window, window, window, door, window. The door is a single-leaf wooden door. The windows are single-pane casements grouped in pairs located directly under the fascia. All windows have aluminum frames.

24 NC Modern Group Cabin Number 4

One-story, rectangular, wood-frame building with a side-gabled roof, concrete foundation and a tar-shingle roof. The facade reads window, window, window, door, window. The door is a single-leaf wooden door. The windows are single-pane casements grouped in pairs located directly under the fascia. All windows have aluminum frames.

25 NC Modern Group Cabin Number 5

One-story, rectangular, wood-frame building with a side-gabled roof, concrete foundation and a tar-shingle roof. The facade reads window, window, window, door, window. The door is a single-leaf wooden door. The windows are single-pane casements grouped in pairs located directly under the fascia. All windows have aluminum frames.

26 NC Modern Group Cabin Number 6

One-story, rectangular, wood-frame building with a side-gabled roof, concrete foundation and a tar-shingle roof. The facade reads window, window, window, door, window. The door is a single-leaf wooden door. The windows are single-pane casements grouped in pairs located directly under the fascia. All windows have aluminum frames.

27 NC Log Cabin

This two story log cabin was moved to the park in 1976 and restored to its original condition. It was constructed circa 1840. The rectangular building had a side-gabled roof, stone foundation and wood shingle roof.

28 C Park Landscape

This is a designed landscape that emphasizes the scenic beauty of the park's terrain. Notable man-made features include stone paths, stone seating, stone steps, stone water fountains, stone retaining walls, stone planters and stone culverts. In addition there is a CCC dam and lake. The CCC strove to make non-intrusive man-made landscapes. Tishomingo State Park is an example of this philosophy.

Statement of Significance

The proposed Tishomingo State Park Historic District has local and statewide significance under Criterion A in the areas of entertainment and recreation and social history, and under Criterion C in the areas of architecture and landscape architecture. The period of significance extends from 1936-1948. The historical development of the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) is discussed in detail in the MPS "State Parks in Mississippi built by the CCC between 1934-1942." Tishomingo State Park Historic District is an example of one of the ten new parks built in Mississippi by the CCC and placed under the supervision of the Mississippi Forestry Commission.

The CCC administered a variety of programs including road, park, and defense construction, reforestation, and erosion control, as well as many other facilities. The effects of this agency on the man-made landscape are overwhelming. President Franklin Delano Roosevelt established the CCC as part of his New Deal program to help combat the economical hardships of the depression (see the MPS cover document for a detailed analysis on pages 3-5).

The CCC used standardized plans for park layout to create regional interpretations that would blend into the natural surroundings. Tishomingo State Park Historic District was the fifth of ten parks in Mississippi created by the CCC. The CCC began work in April of 1935 and opened the park to the public in May of 1939. The CCC workers transformed the natural landscape with man-made roads, walking trails, cabins and other necessary park facilities thus combining national agendas with regional materials and surroundings.

All buildings within the district are constructed in the Rustic style and blend nicely in to their environment. The buildings retain their forms, exterior materials, and sense of place.

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Additional Registration Requirements

The registration requirements for listing of Roosevelt State Park Historic District have been discussed in the cover document. However, because of their brevity, it has been determined that in order to be eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places as a part of the "State Parks in Mississippi built by the CCC between 1934-1942" multiple property submission, a state park historic district must meet these additional registration requirements.

1. It must be or have been a Mississippi State Park developed by the CCC between 1932 to 1942.
2. It must retain, within the proposed district boundaries, a high degree of historical integrity from the period of its construction. It must retain most of its historic buildings, and they must retain a high degree of integrity of design, location, craftsmanship, and materials. It must retain its major landscape features, including lakes, woodlands, CCC-built walks, steps, and other structures, as well as the basic arrangement of roads and trails.
3. Areas of these parks not historically associated with the CCC or developed after that period will be excluded whenever possible from the boundaries of the historic district.

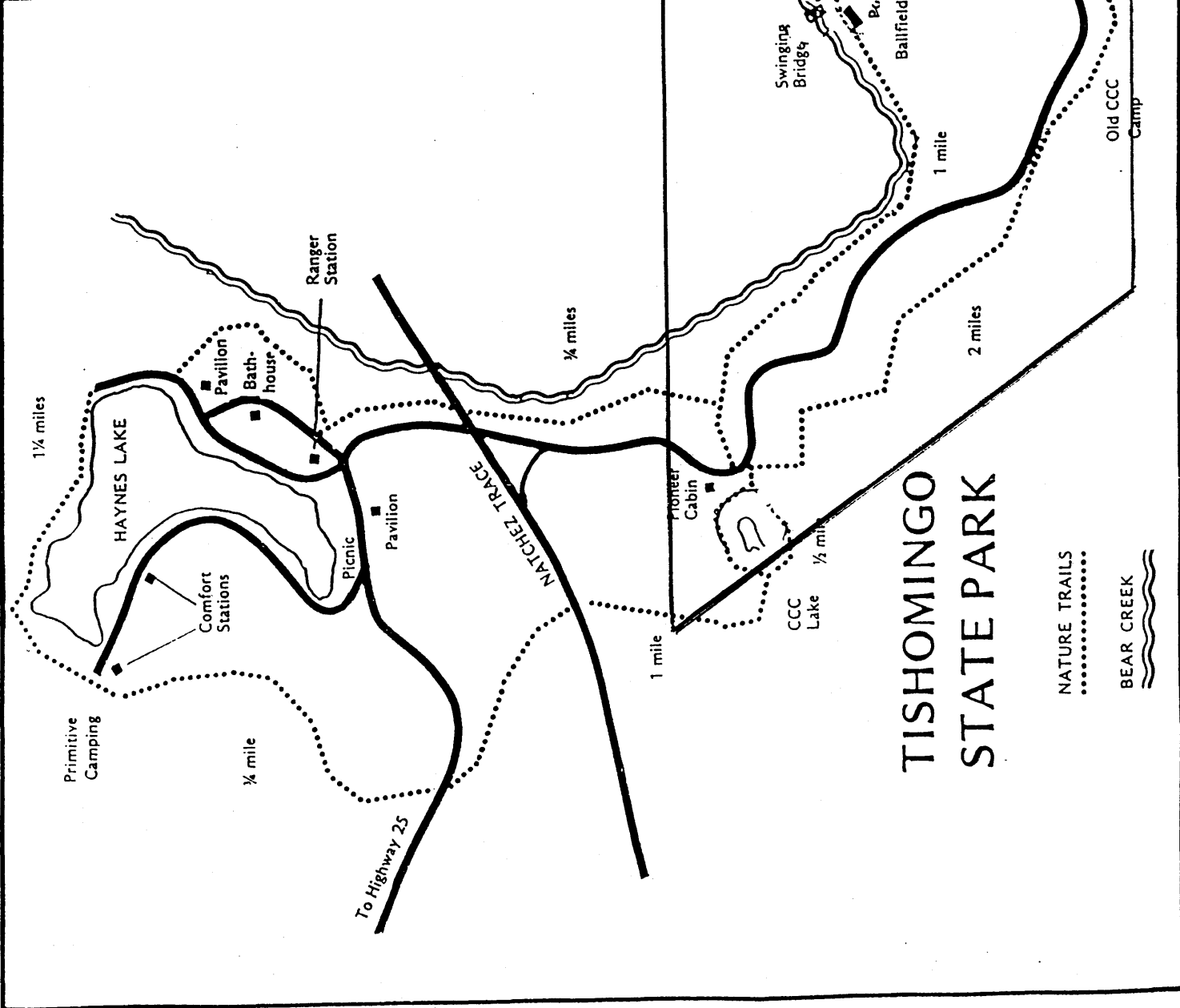
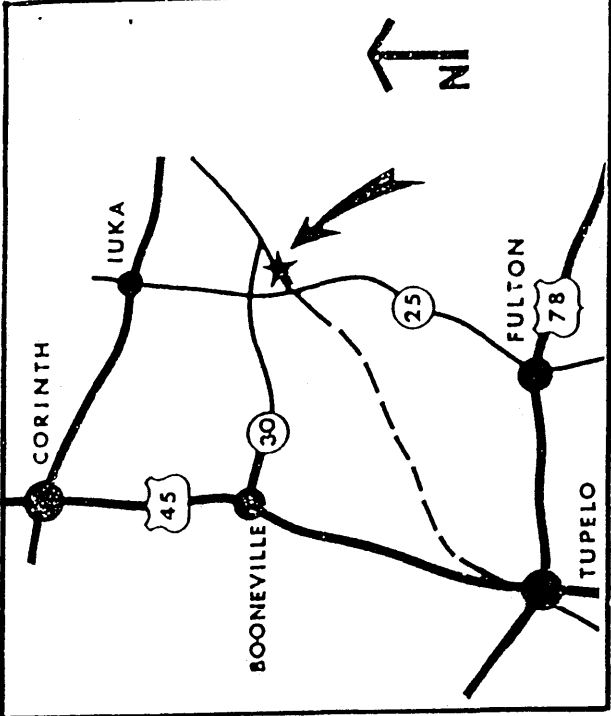
