This house has a side-facing gable roof covered by corrugated metal sheets. The siding is vertical board and batten. Hooded six-over-six double-hung windows with sills appear on all elevations. The front elevation is basically symmetrical, with second story windows directly above those on the first story, which in turn are equidistant from the central doorway. The tops of the second story windows are directly beneath the roof overhang, suggesting a second floor of less than full height. Next to the window on the left (west), a door opens out onto the porch roof. This shed roof extends the width of house and is supported by four log posts. The building appears to be two rooms wide but only one room deep. It overlooks the García River in a rural area about five miles from Point Arena. At the rear of the house is a one-story section that is either original or an early addition.

The Buckridge Ranch House is an excellent example of a building form that first arrived in the United States with English settlers in the seventeenth century and continued to be built in one guise or another for over 200 years. This kind of building, called an I-house, has a rectangular form, two stories with two rooms on each, and a symmetrical facade. A side-facing gable roof is usually In the Virginia and the Carolinas a full-width front porch became a present. common feature. I-houses, like other early vernacular building types, used design principles that were of proven utility and were passed from builder to builder by word of mouth. The builder of the Buckridge Ranch House was probably not trying to design a house similar to those popular in the American Southeast. That was an unintended result of an effort to construct a simple, functional residence. The building displays all the characteristics of a Tidewater I-house (form, height, fenestration, roof, and porch) in an unusually pure example. The poard-and-batten siding is typical of the early settlement of California, while the log porch supports add a rustic note.

It is the only unadorned I-house in the Point Arena area. It meets the registration requirements for its property type.
