SUMMARY

Located at 116 South Second Street in downtown Rogers, the Victory Theater was designed by the locally renowned architect A. O. Clark. Built in 1927, the two-story building is a good example of a theater designed in the Mediterranean style. Expressing the frugality of the day, the building was designed not only to hold a theater/performance hall, but two stores and an apartment for the theater manager. Exterior detailing includes glazed terra cotta tiles on a center bell cast parapet, multiple casement windows and transoms with geometric patterned glazing, and formed stone decorative elements. From 1978 until 1999, the exterior of the building was covered in many materials and coats of paint. The Victory Theater was rehabilitated with the help of local donations, a state grant, and a grant from the Arkansas Historic Preservation Program.

ELABORATION

Flanked by single story buildings (Edward's Grocery/Watson's Goodyear Building is NR listed) and located on South Second Street directly adjacent to the Walnut Street Historic District, the Victory Theater is a 1927 mixed use theater building with an intriguing design. The roof configuration is flat with a bell-cast Mediterranean tile roof centered between a pair of matching bays with higher parapets. Behind the parapets, the roof slopes to the rear of the building eventually intersecting a gable roof section and finally the theater flies that rises to accommodate the stage and screen. The solid brick masonry building is decorated by formed stone and rests on a poured concrete foundation.

The front façade is three bays in width and two stories in height. On the first story, the side bays contain storefronts. During the recent restoration veneer materials were removed to reveal the original transom patterns. Recessed between the retail space and flanked between pairs of wooden doors is the ticket booth. As part of the rehabilitation of the building the ticket booth was recreated from historic photographs. A metal canopy overhangs the entrance. Above each storefront on the second story three pairs of casement windows are highlighted by transom windows and given a romantic Mediterranean feel by non-functional wrought iron balconies. These details had been removed when the building fell into disuse. A larger center bay containing four pairs of casement windows with matching transoms is located between the two identical bays.

Over the center windows, is a wide undecorated frieze topped by a bell cast parapet. On either side the matching bays rise higher and contain formed stone decorative elements with the raised parapet denoted by a projecting cornice. Though the Victory Theater is a story taller than the rest of the buildings adjacent to it, the sidewalls offer no ornamentation other than a slight wrapping around of the decorative elements found on the front elevation.

On the rear or west elevation the building is designed to be merely functional and lacks ornamentation of any kind. A few basement windows have been infilled by brick and modern heating and cooling systems are located on this elevation.

Albert Oscar Clark was born in Medina, New York on May 23, 1858. He was the son of Martha and Edgar Clarke, who was a Presbyterian minister. A. O. Clark was an educated, but self-taught architect. At age twenty-three, he became a partner in the architectural firm of Matthews and Clark in St Louis. In 1904 A. O. Clark visited northwest Arkansas to make plans for the building of a hotel at Monte Ne for the eccentric Coin Harvey. That same year, he moved to Rogers and began an active architectural practice. During his lifetime, he was Roger's most prominent architect. Many of Clark's buildings are placed on the National Register of Historic Places. These include the Bank of Rogers, the Applegate Drugstore, Charles Juhr House just to name a few.

The exterior of the Victory Theater underwent major alterations in the 1970s while it operated as a flea market. Changes included the covering of the multiple casement windows with a veneer to form a blind arcades above each of the store fronts. The center section retained its original window configuration and it is on the basis of these and historic photographs that the others were recreated.

Interior

During the period the Victory Theater building served as a flea market, the interior was gutted. Disuse led to the deterioration of the remaining fabric of the interior, and it suffered insurmountable water damage and mutilation by small animals. Thus the recent rehabilitation of the building into a live performance dinner theater necessitated the modification and reconstruction of the interior. Converting the building into a dinner

theater created different needs for space and much of the renewed architectural design (by Perry Butcher & Associates, Architects of Rogers, Arkansas) lends itself to that need.

SUMMARY

Extending the Rogers Commercial Historic District to include the Victory Theater seems the natural way to now include this refurbished building in the National Register of Historic Places. In 1998 its neighbor to the south at 120 South Second Street, Edward's Grocery/Watson's Goodyear building was restored and added to the district. Although rehabilitation work was already beginning on the theater building at that time, the 1970s exterior alterations precluded its being amended.

ELABORATION

Second Street in Rogers present commercial district was used residentially until approximately 1917. As the core of the town expanded, homes made way for commercial buildings. By 1927, the block where the Victory Theater stands was fully incorporated as part of downtown, and the increase in population gave reason to erect a new building to house another theater. The theater opened its doors on Monday 5 December 1927 and the local newspaper The Rogers Democrat boasted, "Rogers will have finest movie theater in northwest Arkansas." The opening night brought not only the silent movies "The American Beauty" and "Yale and Harvard" from the "Our Gang" comedy series, but also a solo performance by the theater's organist Richard Lauderback. Unfortunately another act, Johnny Harrison and His 11-piece Orchestra were delayed by car trouble on their way from Joplin, Missouri. Prices for opening were thirty-five and fifteen cents. A year later the theater began running "talkies," but still kept the tradition of local performances and traveling shows, which utilized the building's stage, small orchestra pit and red velvet curtains.

For forty-nine years the design of this building allowed for a movie theater, an upstairs apartment and rental space for two retail stores. As a movie theater, the building accommodated seven-hundred-and-fifty people and was often "full to the rafters." Emily Patton, the daughter of the first movie manager (Charley Marshall) and later manager herself, says she has fond memories of living in the apartment above the theater's entrance. "I liked it because I was right up in town," Patton says. "It was during [the days of] the Apple Blossom festivals. I had a perfect view from my front window. I could watch the Apple Blossom parade go right by Second Street."

In 1976 the doors closed and the theater lost its way to television and larger movie screens on the outskirts of town. Used as flea market until 1997, it was purchased by the Rogers Little Theater group and the arduous work of raising funds, finding architects, gutting the destroyed and dilapidated interior and restoring the 1920s façade began. In 2000 the theater reopened its doors as a live performance dinner theater. The renovated interior can hold two-hundred-and-eighty people (diners are on the first level and the balcony holds those without tickets for dinner).

Significance

The community of Rogers treasures the Victory Theater, designed by A. O. Clark, as an example of preservation in the downtown commercial district. The restoration of the exterior and the rehabilitation of the interior of the building bring it back once again as an entertainment center in the community, and speaks to the dedication and ongoing interest in preservation of the people of Benton County, Arkansas. For these reasons it is being nominated to the National Register under **Criteria C as an amendment to the Rogers Commercial Historic District.**




