Summary

The Oscar Crow House is a single-story, wood frame residence designed in the Craftsman style. Though not a true shotgun house in plan, it does feature a gable end front entrance set beneath an open porch and a series of rooms placed directly behind. The house has recently been restored, including the removal of a later shed addition to the rear and the replacement of the original front porch balustrade. An historic (though not original) combination garage/tool shed is also included in the nomination.

Elaboration

The Oscar Crow House is a single-story, wood frame residential building designed in a restrained interpretation of the Craftsman style. Though it is not a true shotgun house in plan (the rooms do not recede from the front entrance in a strictly linear fashion), it does feature a gable end front entrance set beneath an open porch and a series of rooms placed behind. There are no masonry chimneys. The gable roof is covered with asphalt shingles, and the novelty sided walls rest upon brick piers.

The eastern or front elevation features the gable end of the roof above a recessed porch that is supported upon two box columns. A rectangular vent is placed in the center of the upper "pediment" section, directly beneath the gable peak. The wall of the recessed porch beneath is symmetrically organized, with a central, single-leaf entrance separating two identical three-overone wood sash windows. The box columns are ornamented by a simple wood balustrade.

The northern, side gable facade is fenestrated by four irregularly-placed three-over-one wood sash windows. The southern elevation is lit by a single three-over-one wood sash window in the eastern, slightly-recessed wall, and another identical window just to the west. The western elevation features a recessed porch also, and is entered via a single-leaf door to the north that is flanked by two pair of modern six-over-six sash windows. The projecting porch roof is supported upon four turned posts.

Given the simple, restrained nature of this home, the significant exterior details are rather few. The exposed rafters that accent the roofline and the three-over-one wood sash windows throughout comprise the bulk of the detail.

The interior is simply-appointed, as it has always been, with unornamented plank moldings

throughout and little other ornament of note.

The alterations to this structure have been limited to the addition of the balustrade on the front porch and the gable roof rear addition that replaced a shed roof addition that was probably historic, though not original.

Also included in the nomination is the combination gable/shed roof garage/outbuilding that is currently undergoing restoration. This structure, constructed three years after the house itself, is largely intact and historic.

Summary

Criterion C, local significance

The Oscar Crow House is eligible under Criterion C locally as the best example of a restrained version of a Craftsman style residence. The exposed rafters, the two-tier, asymmetrical roof line and the three-over-one windows are all characteristic elements of this style.

Elaboration

In 1929, Star City, the county seat of Lincoln County, was a small town of approximately 1,000 people. Lincoln County was then, as now, a rural county bisected diagonally (northwest to southeast) by Bayou Bartholomew, the customarily-understood boundary between the Mississippi alluvial floodplain and the Gulf coastal plain. The main industries were agriculture, with the primary crops being cotton and timber.

The Crow family first settled in what is now Lincoln County in 1850. Several generations remained in the area, and Randolph Crow, the father of Oscar Crow, the first resident of this structure, moved to Star City in 1927 to open a store on the courthouse square with his son. After the first store burned, Oscar and his brother Willie Bob established Crow Drug on the south side of the square in 1928. This business prospered and remained in business until 1955.

The Oscar Crow House was built by the brothers Robert and Doug Verdue, two well-known local builders in Star City of the period. It was built for Oscar Crow and his wife, Hazel Vick Crow. Unfortunately, the couple lived together in the house only a few years, as Oscar died five years later, in 1934.

Ironically, it was Oscar's passing that may have been the primary reason that the house has survived in such good condition, as it was typically the expanding needs of a growing family that resulted in the alteration of many residences through the addition of more rooms and the rearrangement of original interior floor plans. The Oscar Crow House suffered the addition of only a single shed room on the rear of the house in 1936, seven years after its construction; otherwise the interior of the house has remained as it has always looked. As simple as it is, the Oscar Crow House remains an intact example of the simpler, more economical housing that prevailed for the less wealthy, local middle-class laborer and merchant that were the economic backbone of many such small communities as Star City. As such, the Oscar Crow House remains an excellent example of one of these early twentieth century vernacular residences that modern architectural history has only really begun to appreciate in the last ten years.
