

Overview

There are 851 contributing and 37 non-contributing resources in the Woodlawn Highlands Historic District. The ratio of contributing to non-contributing resources is 23 to 1, which is quite high. Of the 37 non-contributing resources, 19 are less than 50 years old and lack exceptional significance. The other 18 are historic but have had alterations that compromise their historic architectural fabric, such as the addition of synthetic siding, major door and window changes, porch enclosures, and/or modification of the historic footprint. The period of significance for the district extends from 1890, the date of the oldest contributing resource, to 1956, the date of the most recent, historic, contributing resources. This time frame includes the architectural styles represented in the Area of Significance (see Section 8: Statement of Significance). The Woodlawn Highlands Historic District retains good overall integrity in terms of location, setting, feeling, association, design, materials, and workmanship.

The Woodlawn Highlands Historic District is situated on the east side of Birmingham, Alabama approximately two miles south of the Birmingham Airport. Two railroads trek through the district. Along with 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue, the tracks of the Norfolk Southern form the northern boundary of Woodlawn Highlands. One quarter mile to the south, the Seaboard Coast Line bisects the district in an east/west direction. U.S. Highway 78, also known as Crestwood Boulevard, serves as the southern boundary of the district, separating Woodlawn Highlands from Crestview Hills, a subdivision of ranch houses. The west and east boundaries are 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue and 56<sup>th</sup> and 61<sup>st</sup> Streets, respectively.

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Adherence to rigid geometry does not characterize the layout of the Woodlawn Highlands Historic District. The grid pattern of streets is not oriented to the cardinal directions. Rather, the streets generally trend in southwest/northeast and northwest/southeast directions. A number of streets actually swerve out of linear paths and embrace some curvilinear flair here and there. In many instances, streets intersect at acute angles. This circumstance is particularly prevalent in the north half of the district. Given the irregularity in the street grid, lots vary in size and shape throughout the district; however, pockets of uniform lot configurations exist. Gently rolling topography associated with the base of Red Mountain, which rises a short distance to the south, and random development by multiple developers account for the departure from strict adherence to uniformity rather than flights of design whimsy.

In the district, the southwest/northeast oriented roadways are labeled as avenues, courts, and terraces and northwest/southeast oriented roadways as streets and places. Originally designated as Grand Avenue, 5th Avenue is the northernmost avenue and one of two main thoroughfares for the area. Although 9th Avenue represents the end of this series of roads, 8th Terrace is actually the southernmost roadway. The northwest/southeast roads begin at 48th Street and culminate with 61st Street. Crestwood Boulevard, the name of which represents a break from the numerical tags, serve as the other main thoroughfare and southernmost road in the district.

Resource Classification and Description: There are 888 resources in the Woodlawn Highlands Historic District. The identified resources can be grouped into the following categories: Commercial Building, Residences, Religious Building, Civic Building, and Transportation Structure.

The residential category includes the following types: apartment complex, duplex, triplex, garage apartment, bungalow, Colonial Revival, contemporary, Craftsman house, cross hip roof cottage, foursquare, French eclectic, hip roof cottage, Italian Renaissance Revival/Mediterranean, L cottage, massed plan, minimal traditional, neo-bungalow, pyramidal roof cottage, quonset hut, ranch, Spanish eclectic, shotgun, side gable cottage, split level, T cottage, Tudor Revival, and Victorian era cottage.

The religious building category includes three churches.

The civic building class has one entry: a girl's club.

The district contains a railroad bridge.

For the sake of the non-architectural historian and those using alternate terminology, the identified resource types are defined in the following pages. The residential types will be addressed first.

Victorian

Victorian-era architecture, popular in America during the last decades of the nineteenth century, was loosely derived from Medieval models (McAlester and McAlester 1991). The Victorian-era cottage also features a distinctive roof form: a hip roof with one or more connecting gable roof(s). Often, the connecting gable roof(s) create(s) a front and/or side-projecting bay window(s), lending the dwelling a more fashionable appearance. In addition to its picturesque roof form and projecting bays, the Victorian-era cottage typically features a three bay facade with an entry bay placed in between a front projecting bay window and another bay. It is often embellished with patterned shingle work, decorative brackets, spindle work, and/or other detailing associated with the Victorian era. The Victorian-era cottage is considered a modest house built for the middle class. The count for this turn-of-the century residential classification stands at eleven.

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Built circa 1890, Resource 39 at 5417 5th Avenue South typifies the genre. It has a quintessential hip with cross gable roof and bay window. Window ornamentation consists of decorative brackets, dentils, or modillions, and panel work. A later model, Resource No. 808 at 556 56th Street South, built circa 1910, has alternating courses of fish scale and square butt shingle work in a front facing gable. Additionally, it has a richly paneled front door with a transom and a single light.

### Craftsman House and Bungalow

The Arts and Crafts movement popularized by William Morris and his English craftsman associates found its way to America via the architecture of Charles Sumner Greene, Henry Mather Greene, Bernard Maybeck, and Frank Lloyd Wright. Following the tenets of the English aesthetic movement, the Greene brothers, Maybeck, and Wright based their designs on the dictates of simplicity, use of natural materials, and exposure of craftsmanship work. In addition to these architects, Gustav Stickley's *The Craftsman* (1909), women's magazines, and house pattern books helped popularize Arts and Crafts architecture in America. Arts and Crafts dwellings feature stone, brick, stucco, or timber construction, low-pitched roofs, exposed rafters and timber work, wide eaves, and a prominent porch supported by posts resting on brick or stone piers (McAlester and McAlester 1991). Arts and Crafts houses can be divided into two categories: Craftsman houses, which feature two or more stories, and Craftsman bungalows, which feature one or one and one half stories. The bungalows in the Woodlawn Highlands Historic District are truly a sight to behold. Even those who overdosed on the recent popularity of everything Craftsman and developed a bad case of tapered post on brick pier ennui might find a drive through the district a bit refreshing. Subtle and not so subtle variations on motifs abound everywhere. Rare it is to observe so many diverse porch support, rafter tail, wood, brick, and stone work, cladding material, and window and door designs in one collection of bungalows. The manner in which these elements are so freely mixed, allowing the Craftsman vocabulary to play within and stray from cookie cutter patterns, creates the impression that there are 556 uniquely designed bungalows in Woodlawn Highlands. Of course, the district has some plain vanilla examples for the traditionalist at heart.

Highlighting one or two stellar representatives of the Woodlawn Highlands bungalows simply will not do. Given the previous billing of "Here there is something new under the Sun," a sampling of the many Craftsman architect's is in order. Speaking of the sun, there are many sunburst motifs rising and setting on the Woodlawn Highlands. In fact, 24 bungalows feature gable peaks emblazoned with stylized suns and/or radiating beams. Possibly the most striking of which is to be found at 5212 7th Avenue South (Resource 462). Well appointed with Craftsman features, the bungalow at this address has a sunburst motif in the attic vent. This radiant scroll work detail features multiple rays emanating from a brick red sun disc. The brick red accent truly makes for a vivid image.

The highlight of a well designed bungalow porch at 5209 7th Avenue South (Resource 461) is a scroll work attic vent screen. The screen positively beams with an elongated sun disc and blazing rays. The image casts a bright and cheery ambience over the charming cottage.

With all the sun signs in the neighborhood, it would be a shame not to "let the sunshine in" and perk up house interiors. Woodlawn Highland's Craftsman cottages feature an abundance of lights designed to allow natural lighting to bathe interiors in a soft, muted, golden glow.

Built circa 1925, the bungalow at 516 55th Street South (Resource 765) is a glazier's dream. The windows consist of unique 11/1 double hung sashes, the muntins of which are painted black in contrast to the white surrounds. The door is nicely rendered with the upper portion subdivided into twelve smaller panes poised above four vertically attenuated panes. With six small lights atop two elongated lights, the sidelights reflect the light pattern of the door. A transom sandwiched

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between two pieces of glass divided into four smaller panes completes the door ensemble. Accent lighting shines through the gable peak to the attic floor via two attic lights composed of nine panes of glass.

In addition to plenty of Craftsman lighting, the bungalow has a splendid wrap around porch featuring an arcade. In this arcade, segmental brick arches gracefully rise and gently land on stone capped brick piers. This porch evokes notions of arcaded cloisters where one retires from the rigors of the outside world and quietly contemplates the finer things in life. Replete with a swing, a wicker chair, plants, and views of mature hardwoods and other landscaping, the porch looks like it invites such repose.

The bungalows located on the 500 and 600 blocks of 49th Street (Resources 699-710) make for a varied display of Craftsman lights. Most of the bungalows have front doors with either fifteen or nine lights. The fifteen-light model consists of two vertical muntin bars and four horizontal glazing bars that divide the door into either three columns of five panes or five rows of three panes. For the nine-light door, four muntin bars (two vertical and two horizontal) are placed toward the top, bottom, and sides, thus dividing the glass composition into a large central light with thin sidelights and a three piece header and footer. These doors are equal parts stylistic details in that they feature aesthetically pleasing arrangements of glass and glazing bars and functional devices that bring natural sunlight into the cottages and provide cheery views of the neighborhood.

The 49th Street Craftsman delights include a panoply of window styles. The double hung sash collection is rich with 4/1, 6/1, 8/1, 12/1, and 6/6 treatments. The bungalows on 49th Street also display some fixed windows with 12 panes and casements. Placed on either side of chimneys, the casement windows contain some fine craftsman detailing. Casement windows associated with Resource 699 at 508 49th Street consist of two leafs, each leaf of which is divided into two parts by a horizontal muntin. The bottom of the leaf has a single piece of glass while the top exhibits a crucifix motif composed of four panes separated by vertical and horizontal glazing strips. At 512 49th Street (Resource 700), this cross motif is repeated in rather elongated form in the casements on either side of a stone chimney. These lights, as are many others throughout the district, are fantastic.

At 624 49th Street, the bungalow identified as Resource 710 brings to light an interesting nuance in Craftsman porch construction. While the brick piers of the two-part porch supports are commonplace, the posts cut a different look than the typical tapered posts found in most bungalows porches. The spotlighted construction is considered by some to be open frame: rather than one solid post per pier, there are three separate posts; a picket-like embellishment extends between the voids of the wood blocks. Not only is the triangular form created by the three posts inherently more stable in supporting the porch roof than a single block or cylinder, but the open frame design also adds some novelty to the porch decoration.

Judging by the variations on the open frame theme, Woodlawn Highlands' craftsmen/carpenters enjoyed playing outside of the blocks. Built circa 1910, the Waddell-Hall House (Resource No. 71, Jefferson County Historical Commission Plaque #392) at 5321 5th Court South exemplifies the creative approach to porch design in the district. The bungalow features four columns composed of two full-height posts with capitals and pedestals and a connecting lattice work of horizontal and vertical wood strips. These columns evoke seemingly contrasting impressions of solidity and a transparent screen-like quality. With its abundance of beams, braces, and posts, the bungalow (Resource 161) at 5404 5th Terrace South represents a lesson in Craftsman timber work. The porch gable rests on a series of vertical posts and horizontal beams that are at once functional and decorative. In turn, this frame work rests atop several joists and a massive beam. While the middle of this beam appears to float effortlessly above ground, the ends rest solidly on A-frame-like supports, featuring two sets of vertical posts and ancillary diagonal braces. All of this construction is archetypal Craftsman wood work. It is meant to be functional, solid, and aesthetically pleasing. The same can be said for the wood work of the porch piers at 5243 6th Avenue South (Resource 289). Held together with mortises and tenons, these supports are authentic

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Craftsman details. In Woodlawn Highlands, even the brick layers had fun with open frame construction. Built circa 1925, the bungalow identified as Resource 439 has a distinctive pair of porch columns with pointed arch voids; or, are they pointed arches on brick piers? That the supports are examples of posts on piers or arches does not matter, because they illustrate the Craftsman ethos of structural functionality and decorative appeal.

No cottage calling itself a bungalow would be without ample gable roofs, wide eaves, and the ever so tell tale Craftsman rafter tails. Located at 4901 5th Avenue South, Resource No. 4 takes a little liberty in rafter design. Jutting out from a cross gable roof, the eaves of which are supported by triangular knee braces, are a series of boards with accents, including scallop and trefoil, or leaf-like motifs. Similar details are found on the rafter tails next door at 4905 5th Avenue South (Resource 5). At 5110 7th Avenue South (Resource 440), the tale is less about the tails and more about the other appointments. Beneath the gable peaks are slatted attic vents and beveled joist ends. One pair of joist ends sports a stylized emblem, a canoe or anvil motif perhaps. Given Birmingham's industrial heritage, the anvil is not an unlikely interpretation. Additionally, the porch roof has some stylish braces. Peaking out from the porch gable at 4929 6th Avenue South (Resource 238) is a sunburst-like vent screen. This Woodlawn Highlands' leitmotif seems to rise above faux timber work and stucco cladding reminiscent of the English Craftsman architectural tradition. Other tip top architreats include panel work, joist ends with notched setbacks, and the omnipresent exposed rafter tails. When it comes to roof design, the bungalows in the Woodlawn Highlands Historic District tell all.

The exterior of Resource 238 covers another important aspect of bungalow architecture: carpenters and masons were encouraged to make full use of their talents in cladding cottages. The brick work covering Resource 238 is clever in that buff colored bricks simulate quoins at wall, chimney, and column corners and window and door openings and create a pleasing contrast to red bricks. Combined with the other stylistic treatments mentioned in the previous paragraphs, the brick work makes for a stunning composition in this bungalow.

Other Craftsman cladding materials in the district give some credence to the statement, "beauty is skin deep." Several bungalows on 55th Street South (Resources 768, 769, 772, and 773) seem to compete for the title "most beautiful bungalow on the block." Bungalow 772 presents a façade applied with several widths of weatherboards and fieldstones while its neighbor, bungalow 773, counters with touches of weatherboards, rectangular shingles, fieldstones, decorative brackets, and crossbuck-adorned vent screens. Resource 769 accentuates its shingle, weatherboard, and fieldstone veneers with coats of crème tan, brown, and forest green paint. Not to be outdone, bungalow 768 poses for passersby with an outfit of hexagonal shingles, faux half timbers, weatherboards, and field stones. Applications of white, forest green, black, and red brick colors highlight this Craftsman beauty. These and the rest of the cottages comprising the collection of 556 bungalows are all winners in their own right. To fully appreciate the richness of expression in Craftsman design exhibited in the Woodlawn Highlands Historic District one must drive, or better yet, walk, each and every street in the neighborhood, taking time to sample all the flavors of these historic homes.

The Craftsman House, as stated earlier, is distinguished from a bungalow by having at least two full stories. A total of eleven examples of Craftsman Houses were identified during the survey. Though not as visually rich and diverse as the collection of bungalows, nevertheless they are some fine examples of Craftsman architecture.

The large two story home at 5416 6th Avenue South (Resource 301) is an outstanding example of Craftsman architecture. Built in the early 1920s, this home had nine rooms, a two room servant's house, and a one car garage. Rectangular in plan with side gables, the house has projecting gable roof porches on each end of the main façade, one of which is enclosed, forming a sunroom. The usual Craftsman accoutrements are present such as exposed rafters, fieldstone piers, balustrade, and chimneys, the open wood work on the entry porch, the wooden door surround with paired bracketed hood, and the windows which feature, in the upper portion, eight small panes above four larger, more vertical, panes. The form of this

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home is rather unusual in that the longer side of the house faces the street, rather than the narrow, gable front typical of city lots. This was clearly a Craftsman home designed to stand apart from its neighbors, and may have been designed by the Birmingham architectural firm of Sallie and Mewhinney, who specialized in residential Craftsman architecture. A home in Norwood that was designed by this firm closely resembles this resource.

Just up 55th Street South is Resource 771, typical of the gable front Craftsman house, with its wide eaves, decorative wood work within the gable, triangular knee brackets, the use of both weatherboard and clapboarding for the exterior cladding, intricately machined brackets, full width front porch, and stone piers and chimneys.

#### L Cottage

The L-cottage was a popular building type in Birmingham, as was the T-cottage. Many of these were built based on plan books and were often decorated with ornamental wood work, often called gingerbread that became widely available through mail order companies thanks to the invention of powered saws. The distinguishing trait of this house type is the L-shaped plan of the home, with the short leg of the ell always facing the street. Other traits include a shed roof over the main entry, a cross-gable roof, overhanging eaves, and narrow corner boards and window heads (White 2003:17-18). One example of an L-Cottage was identified during the survey: Resource 832.

#### Foursquare

The popularity of the foursquare house ranged from 1870 to 1940 (Gottfried and Jennings 1988). The basis of this two to two and a half story house is a block form consisting of two floors with two sets of two rooms arranged side by side. This arrangement is commonly referred to as a foursquare floor plan. A hip roof or gable roof, which may or may not feature dormers, caps the structure. Usually, a full-width, one story porch with a hip, shed, or gable roof shade the front of these houses which are located in both urban and rural settings nation wide. Foursquare houses may lack stylistic embellishment or feature detailing from either the Italianate or Craftsman styles. There are twelve foursquares in the district.

Many of the foursquare houses identified are clustered on the semi-circular portion of 6th Avenue South and along 55th Street. Three of these, located on 6th Avenue South just north of the Seaboard Railroad tracks (Resources 297, 298, and 300), are fine examples of this type. Resource 297, with its side gabled roof with clipped gables, exhibits a number of Craftsman details which lends charm to this home. Indeed, many of the foursquare homes in the district are outfitted with Craftsman accoutrements.

#### French Eclectic

French Eclectic architecture, also called French Revival, represents a type of domestic architecture popular from around 1920 through the 1950s. This style incorporates and emulates elements of earlier French styles, such as Beaux-Arts, Châteauesque, and Second Empire. Characteristics of this style include brick or stone exterior cladding, quoins, a circular tower with a steep conical roof, flared eaves, massive chimneys, French windows and doors, and occasionally faux half timbering (Harris 1998:137).

Only one lone example of the French Eclectic (Resource 494) was identified during the survey, but ranks as one of the finest homes in the district. Built in 1935, this stone veneer residence at 5401 7th Avenue recalls French Normandy styling. Configured in an "L" shape, the home features a large, round turret or tower with an arched doorway. The gable ends feature draping shingles, meant to give the impression of a thatch roof typical of vernacular French and English

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country homes. This high style home was no doubt designed by an architect, possibly Brook B. Burnham, who is known to have worked within this style at approximately the same time.

#### Italian Renaissance Revival/Mediterranean

Typically houses of this type are architect-designed landmark buildings modeled after Renaissance period Italian palaces. They generally have a low pitched hip roof or flat roof and are usually symmetrical. Other identifying features include tile roofs, arches above first floor windows and doors, widely overhanging eaves supported by brackets or modillions, and recessed porches and loggias. The exterior material is almost always stone (McAlester and McAlester 1991).

Mediterranean is an imprecise term that refers to buildings that incorporate a number of stylistic elements from the architecture of the Mediterranean world, namely Spanish Colonial Revival, Mission Revival, Italian Renaissance Revival, and Italianate. Standard features include stucco finish, red tile roofs, and prominent arches (Harris 1998:211).

The home located at 5509 6th Avenue South (Resource 308) represents the blending of both of these styles. The dominating feature of this symmetrical home is the projecting entry porch with its arched opening accentuated by simple columns. The French doors that provide entry to the home have an arched header, which encases a fanlight window. This home has a flat roof with parapet and balustrade. All of these elements are features of Italian Renaissance Revival architecture. Generic Mediterranean stylistic elements include the red tile overhangs above the front windows and the stucco finish of the exterior. This home may have been designed by Birmingham architect George Turner, who built a number of homes in this style in the Hollywood subdivision of Homewood and the Highlands subdivision in Tuscaloosa.

Resource 436 is also classified as a Mediterranean Revival residence. It features a flat roof with ceramic tile, brick veneer, a symmetrical façade, and a terrace with a wrought iron balustrade.

#### Spanish Eclectic

Spanish Eclectic, also called Spanish Colonial Revival, is a style loosely based on various phases of Spanish Colonial architecture. Often asymmetrical, these homes often exhibit a stuccoed exterior wall surface, wall tiles, highly decorated compound arches, occasionally ornate carvings around the windows and doors, a long covered porch or arcade, wrought iron balconies or balconets, occasionally a tower, a red tiled roof or sometimes a flat roof, and prominent arches over windows and doors (Harris 1998:309).

The two Spanish Eclectic examples (Resources 154 and 642) identified during the survey are small, asymmetrical homes. The home located at 5328 5th Terrace South (Resource 154) has a flat roof with red tile coping, battered porch walls, low arched openings, and the exterior is finished with a warm, cream colored stucco. At one time the home at 5629 6th Avenue South (Resource 323) was Spanish Eclectic but was refinished with permastone sometime during the 1950s or 1960s. This unfortunate modification excludes this home from the Spanish Eclectic category.

#### Tudor Revival

Tudor Revival architecture derives from late Medieval English cottages and manor houses (McAlester and McAlester 1991). Tudor Revival characteristics include multi-gable roofs which are often steeply pitched, end porches, arch spans above doors and windows, porch supports, and interior passage ways, an entry vestibule, and faux half-timbering. Tudor Revival architecture came into vogue in the late nineteenth century and continued to be popular into the mid 1930s. Tudor Revival mansions and cottages, which share the same distinction as Victorian and Craftsman houses and cottages,

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were popular during the 1920s and on into the 1930s. The collection of Tudor Revival residences in the district contains 56 Resources.

Tudor Revival residences within the surveyed district come in a variety of forms and building materials. The prevalent construction material, of course, is brick. However, stone is used to varying degrees, from the voussoirs of an arched entry (Resource 200) to extensive exterior cladding (Resources 578 and 728). Tudor Revivals also come in a range of sizes as well, from diminutive cottages to more expansive homes. Perhaps the smallest of all is at 5144 6th Avenue (Resource 269), with its extremely steep pitched roofs and angular lines. Next door, though, at 5148 6th Avenue (Resource 271), is a more typical Tudor Revival cottage, with the tell tale characteristic of the sweeping roofline that encloses the arched entry porch.

Built around 1925, the Tudor Revival cottage at 5633 6th Court (Resource 401) is an outstanding example of the picturesque qualities of this style. Primarily built of brick, the front facing gable features faux half-timbering and a white stucco finish, emulating old English vernacular architecture that made extensive use of wattle and daub and structural half-timbering. The steeply pitched roofs of medieval times reflected the need to quickly remove rainwater from the thatch roofs. Historical functional aspects of the style were now transformed into quaint ideals of Arts and Crafts lifestyles. The front facing chimney and arched wooden door further recall these aspects.

The cottage home at 5424 7th Avenue (Resource 500), also built around 1925, is an unusual example of this style. Although appearing to exhibit a more regular plan, the home features two front projecting extensions, the gable on the left covering an open porch, and the one on the right encloses a portion of the interior. Upon first glance the faux half timbering of these gables appear identical. However, as the gables vary in size so does the complexity of the decorative timbering.

Two wonderful examples of this style (Resources 578 and 728) appear to have been either built by the same contractor or pulled from a pattern book. Both of these homes stand at almost two stories and feature the extensive use of stone veneer, primarily for the first level and chimneys. The second floor wall gable and wall dormers are clad in stucco and faux half timbering. Both homes feature the same massing, proportion, and similar detailing.

Finally, perhaps the most exceptional of these Tudor Revivals is the Miller-Hungerpiller Home at 5343 7th Avenue (Resource 492). Completed in 1937, this beautiful one and a half story brick home was designed by Birmingham architect Brook B. Burnham. Configured in an L shape, with the main entry at the interior corner, this home features wonderful detailing. The bricks, of contrasting red and dark colors, are lain in a herringbone pattern above the doorway, and the dark bricks highlight different building features, such as the stair risers. High above in the chimney, the dark bricks are lain at an angle that simulate a grouping of chimney stacks, a feature typical of Tudor and Old English styles. Stone is used to accent window sills, and copper gives the composition richness nearly unequalled in the neighborhood. The bay window, an important aspect of Tudor design but heretofore absent within the neighborhood, is of richly detailed wood, copper, and stone, and set upon a brick base. Faux half timbering is used within only one gable, and shed dormers further contribute to the aesthetic qualities of this fine composition.

#### Pyramidal Roof Form

While pyramidal roof houses are a very common manufactured form, they actually have their origin in the pre-manufacturing era. In Alabama Folk Houses (1975) Eugene M. Wilson states that the pyramidal roof house was introduced to Alabama in the mid nineteenth century. By the later quarter of the nineteenth century this form became a staple of both industrial and agricultural housing. Quite prevalent in Birmingham industrial company towns (White

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1981), the walls and floor plan of a pyramidal roof house form a square or rectangular block. Covering this block is a steeply-pitched hip roof, resembling a pyramid. Pyramidal roof cottages are typically one to one-and-a-half stories in height. Seven examples of the pyramidal roof house are in the Woodlawn Highlands district.

#### T Cottage

Another cross gabled Victorian form is the T cottage. The plan of the T cottage when viewed from above forms a T shape. The typical T cottage features a three bay facade with a central entry bay placed next to a front projecting bay window. T cottages may or may not have Victorian detailing. Five examples of a T cottage are located in the neighborhood. They are largely clustered along 5th Avenue South.

#### Shotgun

Shotguns, which are relatively small in size, can be quickly and easily mass produced, making them an attractive type of house for landlords who want to economize on space and construction costs. Consequently, shotguns were quite popular in early twentieth century agricultural and industrial operations. One source believes that shotgun cottages originated in Haiti or Africa, first appearing in New Orleans in the early 1800s (Jakle et al. 1989). The form of a shotgun is simple: it is one room in width and several rooms deep with a front gable roof, and may feature a shed or gable roof porch. There are typically no hallways in shotguns; rather, doors permit access from one room to the next, and are aligned in a straight line so that a shotgun could be fired straight through the house. It is from this door arrangement that this house derives its name.

The shotgun collection consisting of Resources 692 through 697 is located on 48th Street at the very edge of the district. City directories indicate that these dwellings housed African American workers. These shotguns typically feature an interior chimney, weatherboard siding, a front door with four vertical lights and three panels, 4/4 double hung sash windows, wood columns, and an open rail balustrade.

#### Colonial Revival

Colonial Revival architecture, as the name suggests, incorporates elements from its colonial antecedents. However, they are more the result of the free interpretation of their prototypes. They are usually much larger and architectural details are often exaggerated. The prototypes for this style are generally those located in the English colonies, and does not include examples such as Dutch Colonial, Spanish Colonial, or French Colonial. Colonial Revival homes may also feature elements not found in the colonial prototypes. These homes often feature a prominent portico or pediment above the entrance, a cupola, a classical cornice, splayed lintels, wall dormers, slate roofing, symmetrically arranged windows, fanlights and sidelights around the door, and occasionally a Palladian window. Within the Colonial Revival style are two general types: the Georgian and the Federal. The Georgian Style was popular between 1700 to about 1780 in the American colonies along the Atlantic coast. The Federal Style refers to a style that was popular during the early days of the young Republic, from approximately 1780 to 1820 (Harris 1998). The district's representatives from this architectural classification include 10 resources.

Most of the examples in the surveyed district are not purely Colonial Revival, but rather incorporate colonial detailing into their overall composition. However, the residence at 5201 7th Avenue (Resource 458), built around 1925, is a fine example of this style. Small and symmetrical, this home features a circular columned portico, flanking triple windows that are read as one unit, and sidelights.

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The residence at 5101 8th Terrace (Resource 662), built sometime in the late 1930s, is a modern example of what is known as a three-quarter Cape house, a variation of the standard Cape Cod house. The Cape Cod house developed on Cape Cod, Massachusetts during the 1700s. It is generally a one and a half story rectangular home with a pitched, gable roof. Modern examples have dormers. A three quarter Cape house has two windows on one side of the central entry and one window on the other (Harris 1998:47). A particularly interesting aspect of this home is the door, which is surmounted by an entablature, complete with triglyphs and metopes, supported by fluted pilasters.

One of the largest homes in the entire surveyed district recalls Colonial designs of the Mid-Atlantic region and Pennsylvania. Located at 5340 8th Avenue (Resource 598), this "L" shaped home was built in 1935 on a double corner lot. Designed by prominent Birmingham architect D.O. Whilldin for Oliver H. Rogers, of the Rogers Electrical Company, the house incorporates a number of unusual electrical features. Largely free of adornment and somewhat rectilinear, colonial details can be found such as the elliptical fanlight above the main entry and the extensive use of wall dormers that feature Adam-inspired decoration.

#### Massed Plan Cottage

The term "massed plan" pertains to the form of a dwelling. According to A Field Guide to American Houses (McAlester and McAlester 1991), a massed plan is a generic house form featuring a floor plan of two or more rooms deep and two or more rooms wide. Dwellings designated as such typically lack specific bay and room arrangements and stylistic embellishment that would classify them as another more specific typology. The massed plan cottages identified in the Woodlawn Highlands survey are, for the most part, two rooms deep with two or more rooms wide and are topped by a side gable roof. As the no frills appearance of these houses suggest, they were meant to satisfy the most basic of housing needs. Thirty-nine examples of massed plan cottages are situated within the boundaries of Woodlawn Highlands.

#### Minimal Traditional Cottage

The minimal traditional is essentially a massed-plan cottage with residual Colonial or Tudor Revival details, such as pedimented stoops and porches, pilasters and columns, steeply pitched gables, and vestibules with or without archways. One hundred minimal traditionals constitute this category.

For this study, there are two time frames for the minimal traditional cottages. The first begins in the early 1930s and ends at the outbreak of World War II. This period coincides with the advent of the National Housing Act (1934), which was created during the Great depression to spur a sluggish housing market by providing low-interest, long-term mortgages for home buyers through the Federal Housing Administration. Resources 265, 378, 537, 602, 604, 606, 616, 640, 641, 648, 650, 652, 655, 657, 667, 669, and 732 represent the minimal traditionals from this era. With steeply pitched cross gable roofs, a front facing gable or pediment, shallow inset porches or stoops, 4/1 and 6/1 double hung sash windows, and partial brick and stone cladding with weatherboards, these residences appear to bear slight resemblances to Craftsman, Colonial, and Tudor Revival homes.

The second time period begins after World War II and extends into the late 1950s. These minimal traditionals are generally smaller than their 1930s antecedents in terms of height and square footage. While the 1930s minimal traditionals are one and one half story in height, the post-war models tend to have only one story; consequently, the pitch of the gable roofs is not as steep as those of the forerunners. The post war minimal traditionals also seem to have lost references to Craftsman and Tudor Revival designs; however, residual Colonial revival details, including door treatments with columns or pilasters and pedimented stoops, remain in the picture. These elements are particularly noted in several minimal traditionals built circa 1947 on 9th Avenue South. They include Resources 672, 673, 674, 676, and 677.

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### Quonset

A quonset hut is a prefabricated building that was developed during World War II. It is semi-cylindrical in shape and is usually constructed of corrugated steel fastened to arched steel ribs which, in turn, are attached to a concrete slab floor. First used at Fort Davis in Quonset, Rhode Island, these buildings have served a variety of uses from storage to barracks (Harris 1998:268). Following the war many Quonsets were then sold as surplus and are found throughout the United States. Often, as is the case with the Woodlawn Highlands, Quonsets were used as modest domiciles.

The lone example of a quonset hut in the district, located at 5100 5th Avenue (Resource 16), is an example of a three quarter type.

### Ranch

Originating in California during the mid-1930s, the Ranch home is loosely based on Spanish Colonial precedents with influences from Craftsman and Frank Lloyd Wright's Prairie styles. The ranch is a one story home with a wide façade and features a low pitched roof with broad eaves, giving the home a sprawling appearance. Other exterior features include large picture windows, ribbon windows, and decorative features such as shutters and iron or wood porch supports. The interiors generally feature a rambling, open floor plan, often centered around a massive fireplace. During the post World War II era the ranch home became the dominant style in the country and persisted through the 1970s. Generally built on large lots in outlying subdivisions, the ranch home is reflective of the national trend towards increasing use of the automobile. Literally built in the tens of millions, the ranch is probably the most ubiquitous house type in America (McAlester and McAlester 1991). Smaller, more compact versions tailored for smaller city lots are often called ranchettes (White 2003:87-88).

Most of the ranch homes identified during the survey are centered in the newer sections of Woodlawn Highlands, namely around 9th Avenue and along 56th Street south of the Seaboard Railroad. They come in a variety of sizes, roof types, and exterior cladding materials. The district features 41 ranches. The ranchette count has 15 examples.

### Split Level

The split level home became popular during the mid 1950s and persisted at least through the end of the 1970s. It is essentially a multi story modification of the ranch house, and retains the horizontal lines, overhanging eaves, and low pitched roof. The split level home consists of a two story unit with a one story wing placed at mid-height, creating a series of stairs on the interior (McAlester and McAlester 1991). Only one example of the split level is located in the historic neighborhood: Resource 877.

### Contemporary

The Contemporary style is a loose term applied to any number of house types built from the 1940s and on through the 1980s. Also categorized as modern architecture, contemporary homes were generally architect-designed houses and were reflective of contemporary trends in the architectural world. Flat roofed homes with no decorative detail, often called American International, are generally a derivation of the International Style. Gabled types, like the Contemporary home at 5343 9th Avenue South (Resource 687), were influenced by the earlier Craftsman and Prairie styles. These homes often featured overhanging eaves, low pitched roofs, exposed roof beams, heavy piers, expansive windows, and various combinations of exterior cladding (McAlester and McAlester 1991; Harris 1998:74).

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Neo-Bungalow

Two houses identified during the survey, recently constructed, were built to appear as a Craftsman bungalow. Both have a front facing gable, front porch, and have minor traits that further simulate the bungalow look, and allow the homes to blend in with the architecture of the neighborhood as a whole. The developers of these two homes should be commended for being sensitive to the architectural integrity of the neighborhood; however, these houses are considered non-contributing due to their recent construction.

The neo-bungalow count includes among others Resources 393 and 874.

Apartment

An apartment is a group of rooms designed as a self-contained dwelling, a group of which forms an apartment building (Harris 1998:10). Four apartment buildings were identified during the survey. Two of these (Resources 33 and 36) are modern constructions along 5th Avenue South. The other two (Resources 798 and 799) are historic apartment buildings erected during the late 1920s. Although small compared to the larger buildings found on Birmingham's Southside, these nevertheless provided an alternative mode of housing for many of the workers who lived in the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood.

Garage Apartment

There is one example (Resource 205) within the district where a garage and/or the space above has been converted to living space.

Duplex

A duplex, also called a double house, is a pair of semi-detached houses that have a symmetric plan on either side of a centerline, with each unit having its own entry (Harris 1998:100). There were four examples of duplexes identified in the surveyed district. Oftentimes, a bungalow or other home would be divided up into separate living spaces. The duplex located at 528-530 56th Street South (Resource 802) was erected sometime during the late 1920s.

Triplex

A triplex is a building, usually a house, that provides living space for three families. Each living unit has a separate entrance. One triplex was identified in the district. Resource 797 is a modern construction, erected sometime in the last forty years.

Fourplex

Built circa 1950, Resource 775 contains four units in one building. It has a two up/two down floor plan: there are two apartments upstairs and two apartments downstairs. A hip roof of standing seam metal caps the building while bricks sheath the exterior. The façade of the upper floor has three metal casement windows. A central opening pierces the façade of the first floor. A faux leaded glass door occupies this opening. On either side of the door are metal casement windows.

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Civic Building

One civic building (Resource 582) was identified. Built in the late 1980s or early 1990s, Girls, Inc. was erected on the site of the Minnie Holman Elementary School.

Commercial Building

This category consists of non-residential buildings for commercial and/or retail enterprise. Many of these resources are newer, non-descript aluminum or concrete block buildings that house a variety of private businesses. However, some vestiges of the once vibrant commercial area survive. These buildings are easily distinguished from their modern counterparts. Some of these buildings have interior partitions to divide the floor space into individual stores, which is reflected on the exterior of the building by the number of storefronts. These storefronts usually consist of an entry door, large plate glass windows, and a transom. In the case of two story examples, the second floor was generally used for office space. The commercial buildings in the district include Resources 1, 2, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 13, 15, 29, 30, and 31.

Resources 6, 7, and 8, located along 5th Avenue South, are all part of a one story brick commercial building containing three storefronts. Built around 1940, this simple building lacks decorative details like its neighbor, with the exception of the square stone insets placed on each end of the storefront lintel.

The finest non-residential building in the survey area is located at 4915 5th Avenue South (Resource 9). This two story brick commercial building features extensive use of stone inlays to contrast with the red brick. The most striking of these are the use of square inlays on either end of each window lintel, including the diminutive side windows of the first floor. The building also features a stone stringcourse and a pedimented and stepped parapet.

Resource 13 has stood at 4933 5th Avenue South as far back as the 1930s, or even earlier. Records at the Archives Department of the Birmingham Public Library that date to 1938 indicate that this was once a barbeque stand called "The Friendly Inn."

The commercial building located at 5245 5th Avenue South (Resource 31), built sometime in the late 1920s, was once a grocery store. This brick building once had decorative stone dart and lozenge inlays and a brick soldier course, which has unfortunately been replaced with permastone.

Power Station

The building located at 4831 5th Avenue South (Resource 3) was once a power station for the Birmingham Electric Company. Located along Grand Avenue (5th Avenue South), one of the main thoroughfares between Avondale and Woodlawn, the power station was probably erected sometime during the first decade of the twentieth century. Although a simple industrial building, some decoration was applied through the use of brick corbelling, recessed panels within the parapet, and arched lintels above the door and windows.

Railroad Bridge

There is one railroad bridge (Resource 28) located at the very edge of the surveyed district. It carries the Seaboard Railroad over 5th Avenue South. Like its counterparts just to the north, it is a skew deck truss thru plate girder viaduct atop concrete piers. It was built in 1939.

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Religious Building

This category consists of buildings specifically designed and/or used for religious functions.

Three buildings of this type were identified in the surveyed district. The New St. Mark Missionary Baptist Church (Resource 14) was originally a residential bungalow that was converted to a church sometime in the post-World War II era. The Groveland Baptist Church (Resource 40) relocated from outside the district to this site in 1971. Finally, the New Pentecostal True Holiness Church of Love (Resource 711) was built around 1949 as Woodlawn Highlands Baptist Church.

Archaeological Component: Although no formal archaeological survey has been conducted within the district boundaries, the potential for subsurface remains is good; buried portions might contain information that might be useful in interpreting the entire area.

861. 556 60th Street South. Ca. 1947. One story, wood frame minimal traditional with cross gable roof of asphalt shingles, exterior brick chimney, vinyl siding, off center single leaf door, flanking 1/1 double hung sash windows, partial width enclosed porch with shed roof, 1/1 windows, and posts.
862. 557 60th Street South. Ca. 1925. One story, wood frame bungalow with cross gable roof of asphalt shingles, interior brick chimney, vinyl siding, off center single leaf door, flanking double hung sash windows, partial width enclosed porch with gable roof, gable with rectangular louvered vent, triangular knee braces, 1/1 windows, and wood posts on brick piers.
863. 560 60th Street South. Ca. 1947. One story, wood frame minimal traditional cottage with cross gable roof of asphalt shingles, interior brick chimney, weatherboard siding, off center single leaf door with 12 lights, 6/6 and 1/1 double hung sash windows, partial width porch with gable roof, gable with sunburst motif vent, wood columns, open rail balustrade, and brick foundation.
864. 561 60th Street South. Ca. 1925. One story, wood frame bungalow with front gable roof of asphalt shingles, rafter tails, weatherboard siding, off center single leaf door with 12 lights, flanking 4/1 double hung sash windows, full width porch with gable roof, gable with paired rectangular louvered vent, triangular knee braces, paired wood posts on fieldstone piers, and fieldstone closed rail balustrade.

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865. 564 60th Street South. Ca. 1925. One story, wood frame bungalow with cross gable on hip roof of asphalt shingles, rafter tails, triangular knee braces, weatherboard siding, off center single leaf door, pairs of 4/1 double hung sash windows, partial width porch with engaged roof, fieldstone columns, and fieldstone clad closed rail balustrade.
866. 565 60th Street South. Ca. 1925. One story, wood frame bungalow with cross gable roof of asphalt shingles, rafter tails, triangular knee braces, brick chimney, weatherboard siding, off center single leaf door with 15 lights, 4/1 double hung sash windows, partial width porch with gable roof, gable with louvered vent frieze, triangular knee braces, brick columns, and brick closed rail balustrade.
867. 568 60th Street South. Ca. 1925. One story, wood frame bungalow with cross gable roof of asphalt shingles, exposed rafter tails, weatherboard siding, off center single leaf door with diamond light, flanking pairs of 6/6 double hung sash windows, partial width porch with gable roof, fieldstone columns, and fieldstone clad balustrade.
868. 569 60th Street South. Ca. 1925. One story, wood frame bungalow with side gable roof of asphalt shingles, interior fieldstone chimney, weatherboard siding, off center single leaf 12 light door, flanking 4/1 double hung sash windows, partial width screened porch with gable roof, battered fieldstone piers, and open rail balustrade.
869. 572 60th Street South. Ca. 1925. One story, wood frame bungalow with side gable roof of asphalt shingles, triangular knee braces, fieldstone chimney, weatherboard siding, off center single leaf door with panels and nine lights, pairs of 4/1 double hung sash windows, partial width porch with shed roof, rafter tails, paneled and tapered wood posts on fieldstone piers, fieldstone closed rail balustrade.
870. 573 60th Street South. Ca. 1925. One story, wood frame bungalow with clipped side gable roof of asphalt shingles, exposed rafter tails, interior brick chimney, weatherboard siding, central single leaf door with two panels, 4/1 double hung sash windows, partial width porch with clipped gable roof, rafter tails, and triple wood mortise and tenon joined columns.
871. 577 60th Street South. Ca. 1925. One story, wood frame bungalow with front gable roof of asphalt shingles, rafter tails, gable with triangular louvered vent, weatherboard siding, off center single leaf door, 4/1 double hung sash windows, partial width screened porch with gable roof, rafter tails, battered fieldstone piers, and fieldstone closed rail balustrade.
872. 545 60th Place South. Ca. 1925. One story, wood frame bungalow with side gable roof of asphalt shingles, interior brick chimney, vinyl and permastone siding, off center single leaf door with four panels and fanlight, pairs of 4/1 double hung sash windows, partial width porch with gable roof, beveled joist ends, tapered posts on brick piers, and brick closed rail balustrade.
873. 568 60th Place South. Ca. 1947. One story, wood frame minimal traditional cottage with cross gable roof of asphalt shingles, exterior brick chimney, vinyl siding, off center single leaf slab door with metal security screen, 1/1 double hung sash windows, partial width porch with gable roof, and open frame iron posts on brick piers.
874. 570 60th Place South. Ca. 2000. One story, wood frame neo-bungalow with front gable roof of asphalt shingles, composite siding, off center six panel door, flanking 6/6 double hung sash windows, partial width porch with gable roof, wood columns, and open rail balustrade; detached garage. NC.

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875. 571 60th Place South. Ca. 1950. One story, wood frame massed plan cottage with side gable roof of asphalt shingles, asbestos shingle siding, off center six panel door, flanking 2/2 double hung sash windows, and concrete block foundation.
876. 572 60th Place South. Ca. 1925. One story, wood frame bungalow with front gable roof of asphalt shingles, interior brick chimney, vinyl siding, off center single leaf wood slab door with security screen, 1/1 double hung sash windows, partial width porch with gable roof, gable with covered vent, tapered wood posts on brick piers, wood columns, and open rail balustrade.
877. 575 60th Place South. Ca. 1955. Two story, wood frame and concrete block split level with cross gable roof of asphalt shingles, asbestos siding, second floor with 8/8 double hung sash window, first floor with off center single leaf six panel door with stoop, 6/6 and 8/8 double hung sash windows, and iron open rail balustrade.
878. 576 60th Place South. Ca. 1947. One story, brick veneered bungalow with side gable roof of asphalt shingles, off center single leaf door, 2/2 double hung sash windows, partial width porch with gable roof, and brick columns; detached concrete block garage.
879. 600 60th Place South. Ca. 1950. One story, wood frame cross hip roof cottage with gable on cross hip roof of asphalt shingles, asbestos shingle siding, off center single leaf door with metal security screen, casement windows, partial width inset porch with engaged roof, wood post, iron open rail balustrade, basement with garage door.
880. 601 60th Place South. Ca. 1950. One story, wood frame massed plan cottage with side gable roof of asphalt shingles, vinyl siding, off center single leaf wood slab door, casement and 2/2 double hung sash windows, iron open rail balustrade.
881. 604 60th Place South. Ca. 1950. One story, wood frame massed plan cottage with gable on hip roof of asphalt shingles, asbestos shingle siding, off center single leaf door with four panels and fanlight, casement windows, and metal awning.
882. 608 60th Place South. Ca. 1950. One story, wood frame cross hip roof cottage with roof of asphalt shingles, asbestos shingle siding, off center single leaf door with three stepped lights and stoop with post, 1/1 double hung sash windows, and iron open rail balustrade.
883. 616 60th Place South. Ca. 1950. One story, concrete block minimal traditional with cross gable roof of asphalt shingles, off center single leaf door with three stepped lights, casement windows, partial width porch with shed roof, wood posts, and open rail balustrade.
884. 620-624 60th Place South. Ca. 1950. One story, concrete block duplex unit with cross hip roof of asphalt shingles, two off center single leaf doors, 1/1 double hung sash metal frame windows, iron open rail balustrade.
885. 521 61st Street South. Ca. 1925. One story, wood frame bungalow with front gable roof of asphalt shingles, gable with sunburst motif vent, aluminum siding, exterior brick chimney, off center single leaf door with metal security screen, flanking pairs of 2/2 double hung sash windows, partial width screened porch with gable roof, gable with sunburst motif vent, brick columns, and brick closed rail balustrade.

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886. 525 61st Street South. Ca. 1947. One story, wood frame bungalow with front gable roof of asphalt shingles, asbestos siding, partial width enclosed porch with engaged roof, gable with rectangular louvered vent, off center single leaf slab door, flanking fixed six pane windows. Multiple additions, window replacements, and porch modifications alter the design, workmanship, and materials of the historic integrity of the cottage. NC.
887. 527 61st Street South. Ca. 1925. One story, wood frame bungalow with gable on hip roof of asphalt shingles, scroll work rafter tails, exterior brick chimney, aluminum siding, off center single leaf door with 12 lights, flanking bands of 6/1 double hung sash windows, partial width porch with engaged roof, gable with sunburst motif vent, scroll work rafter tails, brick columns, and brick open rail balustrade with I shaped balusters.
888. 531 61st Street South. Ca. 1925. One story, wood frame bungalow with front gable roof of asphalt shingles, rafter tails, brick chimney, weatherboard siding, off center single leaf door with 12 lights, flanking 8/1 double hung sash windows, partial width screened porch with gable roof, gable with sunburst motif vent, rafter tails, brick columns, and brick open rail balustrade.

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VIII. Statement of Significance

The Woodlawn Highlands Historic District is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places based on Criterion C in the area of architecture. This district contains locally significant architecture. The Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood represents a fine study in the eclecticism of Craftsman architecture with 556 bungalows. These bungalows run the gamut in terms of architectural embellishment, featuring a wide variety of sunburst motifs, porch support types, cladding materials, decorative wood and masonry work, and window and door types. Although present in far fewer numbers than bungalows (56 compared to 556), the Tudor Revival cottages and houses in the district are equally impressive. These 1920s and 1930s residences bear trademark characteristics, including steeply pitched multiple gable roofs, irregular massing, side porches, entry vestibules, prominent chimneys, and arch work; however, each Tudor plays rather creatively within the genre. These eclectic residences make use of a liberal assortment of semicircular, segmental, and pointed arches, brick, stone, and board siding, metal, slate, and shingle roofing, and stucco, half timber, and shingle work for their individual touches. Other Academic Revival styles featured in the historic district include Italian/Mediterranean, Spanish, and French Eclectic. Ceramic tile and draping shingle roofs, stone and stucco clad exterior walls, arched doorways, and a corner turret are among the salient details from the houses bearing this revival architecture. The Woodlawn Highlands Historic District also has representative collections of minimal traditionals and ranches. The pre-World War II minimal traditionals have residual Craftsman, Colonial, or Tudor Revival details, such as pedimented stoops and porches, pilasters and columns, steeply pitched gables, partial brick and stone cladding with weatherboards, and vestibules with or without archways. For post-World War II minimal traditionals in the historic district, the gable pitch is low and the references to Craftsman and Tudor Revival designs are all but gone; however, residual Colonial Revival details, including door treatments with columns or pilasters and pedimented stoops, remain in the picture. Woodlawn Highlands' ranches sport a wide façade and feature a low pitched roof with broad eaves, giving the home a sprawling appearance. Other exterior details include large picture and ribbon windows.

Historical Context

The history of the Woodlawn Highlands Historic District is inextricably linked with the history and development of Woodlawn. Woodlawn and Woodlawn Highlands lie between Red Mountain and Flint Ridge in Jones Valley. This area is located at the southwestern end of the Appalachian Mountains. A series of parallel ridges and valleys characterize this region. The fertile soil and abundant timber lands of the valley floors first attracted settlers into the area in 1815. Following the Huntsville and Georgia Roads into the area, families of English, Welsh, Scottish, and Irish descent settled throughout the heavily forested valleys and hills. Among these were the Hawkins, Riley, Eubank, and John Smith families who settled near what is known today as Woodlawn, named for the Obadiah Wood family. In 1819, when Jefferson County was created, the United States government began auctioning property in 160 acre quarter sections.<sup>1</sup>

The Obadiah Wood family migrated to the area near Huffman in 1824 from South Carolina. In 1838, Edmond Wood purchased 400 acres on the Georgia Road where Woodlawn, an area formerly called Rockville and later Wood's Station, is located today. The Wood plantation encompassed the area between 47<sup>th</sup> Street on the west, to 65<sup>th</sup> Street to the east, Village Creek to the north, and Red Mountain to the south. This property was then transferred to his son, Obadiah Washington Wood, who is credited with establishing the first post office, general store, and sawmill there, as well as donating land for four churches and a school. Named Wood's Station after the Woods family, this community came to feature a handful of stores and the Alabama & Chattanooga Railroad, which was built in the early 1870s to link Birmingham to the region's vast mineral deposits. In addition to the Alabama & Chattanooga Railroad (later the Alabama Great Southern), three more railways were completed through the community.<sup>2</sup> In 1886, the name was changed to Woodlawn, and in 1891, was incorporated under a municipal government. The Woodlawn community remained a sparsely populated agricultural area throughout most of the nineteenth century, as did most of the county.<sup>3</sup>

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The rise of Birmingham as an industrial center is of particular note to the development of Woodlawn and Woodlawn Heights. The City of Birmingham was established in 1871 at the crossing of two rail lines: the South & North Alabama Railway, funded by the state to develop its mineral regions, with the recently completed Alabama & Chattanooga Railway. At this crossing, located a few miles east of the county seat of Elyton, the new city was surveyed and platted in a recently cleared old cornfield. Named for its industrial counterpart in England, the new city was based on the grid system with square blocks and straight, 100 foot wide roadways. Included in the plan were spaces reserved for parks, a cemetery, churches, and the railroad reservation. The city was developed by the Elyton Land Company (later the Birmingham Realty Co.), a real estate firm which held options on 4,000 acres of land at the crossing. Envisioned as a great industrial center by John T. Milner, chief engineer for the South & North Railway, much of the early development of the city was characterized by speculative land deals and rather crude infrastructure, complete with saloons and brothels, marking Birmingham as a boomtown in every sense of the word.<sup>4</sup>

The key to Birmingham's success was its mineral foundations. Recognized as early as the 1830s, the city is located in a limestone valley adjacent to iron ore rich Red Mountain, with the Warrior and Cahaba coal fields in close proximity. Also readily available was Dolomite, used as flux in the iron and steel industry, and shales and clays for the brick and tile manufacturing industries. In 1880, the first pig iron was produced at Alice Furnace No.1, ushering in the economic boom of the 1880s. During this time eleven furnace companies, including Sloss, began operation, as well as the Birmingham Rolling Mills and the Birmingham Foundry and Car Manufacturing Company. During these boom years Birmingham was nicknamed "the Magic City." By 1890 Birmingham had a population of 50,000 and was the largest city in Alabama.<sup>5</sup>

By the turn of the century there were at least 90 towns thriving in the Birmingham district, ranging from small mining towns to larger industrial centers, such as Pratt City, Thomas, Bessemer, and Ensley. At the latter site, the largest battery of iron furnaces in the world was completed in 1889, and by 1910 Ensley rivaled Birmingham in industrial importance. In 1886, the Tennessee Coal, Iron, and Railroad Company (TCI) entered the Birmingham marketplace, and by 1891 had control of the industrial operations at Bessemer and Ensley as well as at other sites throughout the district. In 1907 TCI was absorbed by the United States Steel Corporation. For decades to come, TCI was to be the largest employer in the Birmingham District.<sup>6</sup> City Directories indicate that TCI provided employment for Woodlawn and Woodlawn Highlands' residents.<sup>7</sup>

Between 1873 and 1903 the city limits of Birmingham were expanded five times, with 32<sup>nd</sup> Street as its easternmost limit. Immediately to the east of these limits was the community of Avondale, platted so that the blocks were merely an extension of the Birmingham grid, and East Birmingham. The land beyond the eastern limits of the city was relatively level, providing an area suitable for the location of heavy industries and extensive spur tracks from the main railroad trunk lines. A planned industrial suburb, East Birmingham, and other communities such as Kingston and Avondale grew around these expanding industries. One of the earliest major industries in this area was the Avondale Mills. Built in 1897 near the west side of Woodlawn, it was the city's most important textile mill. The mill provided jobs to blue and white collar workers in the surrounding area, including Woodlawn Highlands. Other industries included the Smith Gin Company, which was later absorbed by the Continental Gin Company, and the Avondale Stove Foundry. By 1900, there were 283 manufacturing industries in the Birmingham district.<sup>8</sup>

Of particular importance to the growth of Woodlawn was the development of the streetcar. The first dummy car line, a steam-powered light rail service, began operation in 1885, and by 1887 the East Lake Dummy Line connected Birmingham with Woodlawn and East Lake. A second dummy line, the Birmingham & Gate City Railway, also began service through Woodlawn that same year. In 1897 and 1898 the lines were electrified. Streetcars were ideal for connecting the city center with surrounding suburbs and municipalities, facilitating the transfer of professionals and laborers throughout the district.<sup>9</sup>

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By 1890 Woodlawn had been transformed into a rapidly growing streetcar suburb of Birmingham. As with other towns throughout the district, the development of the iron and steel industry and associated endeavors meant that housing was needed for the scores of people who flocked to Birmingham on a daily basis. In addition, churches, places of business, hotels, boarding houses, and the like, were also needed to support the populace. In 1904, there were 1,921 homes built in Birmingham alone. In order to develop and meet the demand for new home lots in the Woodlawn area, the Woodlawn Land and Improvement Company was founded in 1888 and the Woodlawn Realty Company began operation in 1907.<sup>10</sup> For the Woodlawn Realty Company and other developers, an expanse of wooded land between the Alabama Great Southern Railroad and Red Mountain represented prime real estate development. This land came to be known as Woodlawn Highlands.

The 1887 *Atlas of the City of Birmingham and Suburbs* (Beers, Ellis, and Co.) contains one of the earliest maps of the Woodlawn area (Figure 1). The Georgia Road, later Grand Avenue and 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue South, was the main road between Avondale and Woodlawn. Originally the road was a continuation of 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue in Avondale, which ran adjacent to Avondale Park. It then continued in a northeasterly direction, crossing the Alabama Great Southern and the Georgia Pacific tracks and then connected with Woodlawn Avenue. This old road has been a constant presence in the development of the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood. Scattered along this road were several houses and a railroad depot, most of which are no longer extant. Facing the railroad tracks on the map is a large rectangular tract of land, with a sizeable home reached by a circular drive that belonged to Reverend J.C. Armstrong. This was to be the future site of the Woodlawn Infirmary.

At the time the Beers, Ellis, and Co. published the *Atlas of the City of Birmingham and Suburbs*, plans to subdivide the wooded highlands were already underway. The first recorded plat in the district was recorded in 1886. In July of that year, F.M. Wood and M.G. Wood subdivided their land from around 48<sup>th</sup> Street South and to the east of the Woodlawn Road (later called Grand Avenue and now 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue South). M.G. Wood, whose home is shown on the 1887 Beers *Atlas*, conducted a survey that called for at least 21 lots facing the Woodlawn Road, Renfroe Avenue (6<sup>th</sup> Avenue South), and Sterrett Avenue (7<sup>th</sup> Avenue South). The latter two roads were to be 50 feet wide. Two Victorian era cottages at 4925 and 4929 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue South (Resources 11 and 12, respectively) were built on Lots 1 and 2 of Block 1 of this subdivision, and although difficult to correlate to present day maps, may be the same as two homes shown side by side on the 1887 Beers *Atlas*. Regardless, these two homes are among the oldest in the district.<sup>11</sup>

In 1888, the Montgomery and Parks subdivision consisted of the lands of Mrs. M.E. Montgomery, Mr. W.W. Montgomery, and Mrs. M.N. Parks (Figure 2). This survey delineated sixteen blocks on both sides of what was later called Grand Avenue and extending to First Avenue North and to the Alabama Great Southern Railroad (formerly the Alabama & Chattanooga). To the east, this subdivision abutted the land of Rev. J.C. Armstrong, shown on the 1887 Beers *Atlas*. This subdivision included what was to be Cooper Avenue (5<sup>th</sup> Court South), Betts Avenue (5<sup>th</sup> Terrace South), and Wood Avenue, which never materialized due to later development by the Woodlawn Realty Company and the construction of the Seaboard Air Line Railroad, which bisects the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood.<sup>12</sup> These latter streets and railroad officially fell within the bounds of Woodlawn Highlands.

Construction in the Montgomery and Parks subdivision began shortly after it was platted. Circa 1890, a Queen Anne style cottage was built on Lot 15 Block 12. The Beers *Atlas* and the Montgomery and Parks plat map shows that the cottage (Resource 39 at 5417 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue) was adjacent to the Townley residence and home of Mrs. L. Montgomery. While the fate of the Townley and Montgomery homes is unknown, Resource 39 is still present in Woodland Highlands.

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In May of 1891, Otto Marx and J.L. Yancey joined the Woodlawn real estate market by subdividing some land into 6 blocks, with the Alabama Great Southern tracks to the north, the Rev. J.C. Armstrong land to the west, and between what was to become Mattie Street (56<sup>th</sup> Street South) and Rosalie Street (57<sup>th</sup> Street South). First Avenue (now 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue South) was delineated as paralleling the railroad tracks, followed by 2<sup>nd</sup> Avenue (5<sup>th</sup> Court South) and 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue (5<sup>th</sup> Terrace South). However, all but Blocks 1 and 2 were vacated in 1909 and acquired by the Woodlawn Realty Company for their 4<sup>th</sup> Addition to Woodlawn.<sup>13</sup>

In 1897, a Ms. Susie C. Gibson subdivided her land into twelve lots between the Alabama Great Southern tracks and what were to be LaRosse Street (59<sup>th</sup> Street South) and McPherson Street (60<sup>th</sup> Street South). This oddly shaped block was continued with William T. Folsom's survey in 1903, creating the wedge shaped configuration of today as well as part of the triangular shaped block between 60<sup>th</sup> Street South and 60<sup>th</sup> Place South.<sup>14</sup>

Most of the dwellings built on these lots were folk Victorian and Queen Anne forms, with hipped or cross-gabled roofs with simple Victorian detailing. Many of these are referred to as Victorian T-cottages. Vestiges of late nineteenth century dwellings still remain in the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood, primarily along 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue South where the first lots were surveyed in the late 1880s. Resources 11, 12, 32, 38, and 39 are among them. Perhaps one of the oldest homes in the neighborhood is at 5301 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue South (Resource 32). It is one of several homes drawn on the Montgomery and Parks survey of 1888, most of which are no longer extant. Located at the corner of Grand Avenue (5<sup>th</sup> Avenue South) and First Street (53<sup>rd</sup> Street South), it was not given a lot number, as with several other preexisting homes. The occupant was noted as being a carpenter.<sup>15</sup>

Several more Victorian era dwellings are clustered on the west side of 56<sup>th</sup> Street South, just south of the railroad tracks. Resources 796, 800, 806, 807, 808, and 809 are among these. Homes in this area can be seen on the 1908 USDA Soil Map of Jefferson County (Figure 3). However, it appears that this area was not formally platted until 1909 and 1922. In 1892, the Dennis-Marberry home, a Victorian era cottage with some Greek Revival details, was erected at 5620 5<sup>th</sup> Court South, one of the first to be built in the newly platted Marx and Yancey Survey of 1891.<sup>16</sup> In all, 13 houses represent the late nineteenth-century development of the Woodland Highlands Historic District. These include Resources 11, 12, 32, 38, 39, 69, 93, 103, 124, 796, 805, 806, and 808.

During the first decade of the twentieth century, Birmingham was the fastest growing city in the country. Woodlawn was a thriving suburb with a population of 3,750 and at least 65 business establishments, as well as several churches, Masonic lodges, and schools. The prosperity and civic spirit of Woodlawn culminated in 1908 with the construction of the Beaux-Arts style City Hall (R.E. Posey, Architect). Attracted by the convenience to the central business district of Birmingham and points beyond by an extensive streetcar network, potential homeowners flocked to Woodlawn and its neighborhoods, especially Woodlawn Highlands.<sup>17</sup>

By 1904, the four trunk lines that border and bisect the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood were completed. These lines were part of the nine trunk lines that served Birmingham. Entering Jones Valley through Red Gap at Irondale, then coursing its way through Gate City, Woodlawn, Avondale, and then the railroad reservation in Birmingham, the Alabama Great Southern, built in 1870, was paralleled by the Central of Georgia and the Southern Railroad tracks. The Central of Georgia line had been built sometime in the late 1880s, and in 1894 the Southern Railroad had absorbed the Georgia Pacific railway line, which had been built in 1884. These three tracks are grouped together and form the northern boundary of the district. In 1904 the Seaboard Air Line tracks, which bisect the district into northern and southern parts, had been completed.<sup>18</sup>

By 1908, it had become clear that Birmingham lacked the population and tax base it needed to provide improved city

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services and attract more industry. The "Greater Birmingham" movement to annex surrounding cities was approved in the Alabama legislature, where Birmingham was well represented, including the governorship and lieutenant governorship. On 1 January 1910, Birmingham annexed a number of surrounding cities, including Ensley, Pratt City, Elyton, Wylam, West End, Avondale, Woodlawn, East Lake, and North Birmingham, giving Birmingham a 245% size increase and putting the city in the echelon of "over 100,000" metropolitan areas, giving the city national recognition.<sup>19</sup>

Headed by J.B. Gibson, Jr., the Woodlawn Realty Company acted on Birmingham's expansion and need for more real estate. Located in the Woodlawn commercial district, this real estate company was formed to develop Woodlawn and the surrounding neighborhoods, such as Woodlawn Highlands. In 1909 and 1910, major portions of Woodlawn Highlands were platted for the Woodlawn Realty Company's 4<sup>th</sup> (May 1909), 5<sup>th</sup> (November 1909), and 6<sup>th</sup> (December 1910) additions to Woodlawn. These additions filled the remaining undeveloped land between the Alabama Great Southern, Central of Georgia, and the Southern Railway Company tracks to the north and the Seaboard Air Line Railroad to the south and extended as far east as 59<sup>th</sup> Street, or what is now 61<sup>st</sup> Street South. It also included the remaining land fronting Grand Avenue between 51<sup>st</sup> and 52<sup>nd</sup> Streets South. This represented the first large scale development of the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood, and encompassed over one third of the area of the proposed historic district.<sup>20</sup>

Clearly the demand for lots in the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood was great, with three major expansions within two years of each other. Similar real estate trends were occurring throughout the Birmingham district with the development of neighborhoods in and around Highland Avenue, including the two ellipses of Rhodes and Hanover Place, Avondale, Norwood, East Lake, Roebuck Springs, Anderson Place, Phelan Park, and Glen Iris. In addition, the Jemison Company, founded by Robert Jemison, Jr. in 1903, was developing subdivisions such as Mountain Terrace (Forest Park), Westleigh (Central Park), Ensley Highlands, and Corey (Fairfield). Construction entries in the *Manufacturer's Record*, a weekly trade journal published in Baltimore, reflect this unprecedented period of residential construction in 1908 and 1909.

It was during this era that the skyline of Birmingham changed dramatically with the construction of a number of modern skyscrapers in the central business district. Between 1903 and 1913 nine of these buildings were erected and soon Twentieth Street began to be referred to as Birmingham's "Grand Canyon." The center of this district was the intersection of 20<sup>th</sup> Street and 1<sup>st</sup> Avenue North, termed the "Heaviest corner on earth" where four skyscrapers rose on each corner. The Birmingham Terminal Station (P. Thornton Marye, Architect), completed in 1909, was considered the finest in the south. Industrial expansion continued as well, and by 1910 Birmingham produced 795 different products and millions of tons of coal, coke, and pig iron, as well as steel.<sup>21</sup>

By 1911, the roads in the Woodlawn Realty Company's 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup>, and 6<sup>th</sup> Additions, all located in the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood, had been cleared and graded, as depicted on the 1911 *Kelley's Map of Birmingham, Alabama* (Figure 4). An identical configuration is found on the 1914 *Grefenkamp's Map of Birmingham, Alabama* (Figure 5). In March of 1915, the Woodlawn Realty Company platted a 7<sup>th</sup> addition to Woodlawn, largely centered on Fairmount Avenue (now 7<sup>th</sup> Avenue South) and between what is now 48<sup>th</sup> and 51<sup>st</sup> Streets. The people who purchased lots and built their homes in these subdivisions included a mixture of professionals and laborers. House types ranged from simpler homes, such as shotguns and hall-and-parlors for laborers to larger Craftsman homes and American Four Squares for the professional classes.<sup>22</sup>

The 1911 *Kelley* map is interesting for its depiction of the new streetcar line that ran along Grand Avenue (5<sup>th</sup> Avenue South) on the edge of the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood. The commercial area of Woodlawn was already served by the East Lake and the Gate City streetcar lines, operated by the Birmingham Railway, Light, and Power Co., the primary streetcar operator in the district. These lines followed First Avenue North out of the central business district and traveled for several miles out to East Lake. The new line that was to follow Grand Avenue was actually an inter-urban railroad, a

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rail system that never really developed in the south as it did in the north. Named the Tidewater Railroad, this company began in 1907 though it appears to have endured a number of proposals, incorporations, reorganizations, and conflicts over franchising. It was originally envisioned to connect Chattanooga, Gadsden, Birmingham, Tuscaloosa, Mobile, and Dauphin Island. Construction was finally underway in the spring of 1911, and by February of 1912 the tracks between Avondale and East Lake had been completed, though it did not open for service until March of 1913. The Tidewater, which also served Ensley, Pratt City, and Fairfield, struggled due to inefficiency and poor management, and was never completed as planned. In 1924, a short connection between the B.R.L. and P.'s Avondale (# 16) line, which ended at 41<sup>st</sup> Street, with the Tidewater line was completed. This allowed B.R.L. and P. streetcars to continue from Avondale to a new terminus at 54<sup>th</sup> Street.<sup>23</sup>

During this period more industry began to locate in the Woodlawn area and local businesses expanded their operations, providing employment opportunities for some of the people living in Woodlawn and Avondale. Some of these industries, largely clustered along the railroad, included the Bullard Car Door Equipment Company, the Woodlawn Lumber Company, the J.P. Leak lime and cement block dealer, and the White Blakeslee Manufacturing Company. Most employment opportunities, however, were still located outside the city at such places as Avondale Mills and east side furnaces like Sloss-Sheffield and Vanderbilt.

The four years leading up to the entry of the United States into World War I was a time of unrivalled growth in the city of Birmingham. By May of 1912 building permits and construction costs exceeded the total for the year 1911. In the January 1914 issue of the *Jemison Magazine*, the year 1913 was characterized as one of "unprecedented progress in the Birmingham District." It further states that "Vast sums were invested in new enterprises, building activity was far greater than during any previous year ... the population of the city grew approximately ten thousand, and similar increases were shown along all lines of endeavour." Construction costs and building improvements were \$ 3, 813,079 in 1912, which doubled to \$ 6,222,157 in 1913. This cost differential was hailed as prophetic of the growth of the Birmingham District in the coming years. This period of growth is reflected in the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood by Woodlawn Realty Company's 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup>, 6<sup>th</sup>, and 7<sup>th</sup> additions to Woodlawn, which were platted during this period.<sup>24</sup>

Although World War I had an unfavorable affect on residential construction, the war effort was a boom for Birmingham industries. U.S. Steel's new production facilities at Fairfield joined those of Ensley, and large blocks of worker housing were built at several 'model' villages. The architectural and construction industries were initially slow to recover after the war.

The arrival of the "Roaring Twenties" ushered in an unprecedented era of prosperity and growth for the Birmingham district, one in which much of the physical landscape and built environment of the city as we know it today was formed. The city had high hopes for the future, and city leaders predicted Birmingham would surpass Atlanta and New Orleans as the south's largest metropolitan area. The city itself had a population of 110,054, with over 300,000 people living in the metropolitan area. In the 5 May 1921 *Manufacturer's Record* it was estimated that new homes were started at the rate of ten a day, with 3,000 dwellings being erected in a year. Birmingham was unquestionably the leading industrial city in the south, producing millions of tons of coal, pig iron, and steel. In addition, industrial diversification resulted with over 1,600 different products being produced in the city. Rail transportation was unequalled, with nine trunk lines and ninety three passenger trains serving the city. Birmingham was poised to gain national recognition as one of the country's leading metropolitan areas.<sup>25</sup>

During the 1920s, much of the land in the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood south of the Seaboard Air Line tracks was developed in three major phases. In 1922, the Woodlawn Realty Co. platted their 9<sup>th</sup> Addition to Woodlawn, encompassing a number of lots along 8<sup>th</sup> Terrace South and a partial resurvey of the company's 7<sup>th</sup> Addition. In

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November of 1923, a large tract of land, south of and largely paralleling the Seaboard Air Line tracks, a new development called Ridgway was platted. Developed by the Seminole Investment Co. and the Birmingham Trust and Savings Company, Ridgway encompassed eleven blocks along 6<sup>th</sup> Court South between 54<sup>th</sup> and 58<sup>th</sup> Streets, and along 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> Avenues South as well as 7<sup>th</sup> Court South between 52<sup>nd</sup> Street and 53<sup>rd</sup> and 54<sup>th</sup> Streets.<sup>26</sup>

The Seminole Investment Company appears to have been intimately linked with the Woodlawn Realty Company. In the 1917 city directory, J.B. Gibson is listed as president of the Woodlawn Realty Company, secretary-treasurer of the Seminole Investment Company, and president of the Woodlawn Lumber Company. In 1920 the Woodlawn Realty Company offices was located at 5505 2<sup>nd</sup> Avenue South in the Woodlawn commercial district. By 1925, city directories indicate that Gibson was president of the Seminole Investment Company, which had an office address of 5505 1<sup>st</sup> Avenue South. Apparently the Seminole Investment Company succeeded the Woodlawn Realty Company and occupied their old office. Gibson's son, J.B. Gibson, Jr., lived in the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood at 504 55<sup>th</sup> Street South. He worked as a clerk at the Seminole Investment Company.

In August 1926, another development of the Seminole Investment Company, Ridgway Terrace (sic), was platted. This was the last large-scale subdivision of Woodlawn Highlands until after World War II. This development encompassed the area around 8<sup>th</sup> Avenue South, 8<sup>th</sup> Court South, and 8<sup>th</sup> Terrace South. Most of the lots in the Ridgway and Ridgway Terrace developments, as with those of the Woodlawn Realty Company, were narrow and deep, averaging fifty feet wide and approximately one hundred and fifty feet deep. Almost all of these lots backed up to a rear alley. However, some of the lots, especially those on the corners, were often irregular owing to the terrain. In 1927 and 1928, a J.L. Thornton, who resided at 5316 7<sup>th</sup> Court South, began subdividing some land in the area of 7<sup>th</sup> Avenue, 7<sup>th</sup> Court, and 8<sup>th</sup> Avenues South between 52<sup>nd</sup> and 54<sup>th</sup> Streets on behalf of the Protective Life Insurance Agency. These were officially listed as J.L. Thornton's additions to Ridgway Terrace. The difference between the *Totten's Map of Birmingham* (1921) and the *Whitson's Map of Birmingham* (1932) is quite telling (Figures 6 and 7).<sup>27</sup>

During the 1920s Woodlawn Highlands experienced its greatest period of growth, as did Birmingham as a whole. In 1925 over 7,000 buildings were erected in the city, and by 1927 Birmingham led eighty American cities in home building.<sup>28</sup> This building boom is reflected in the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood by the vast number of bungalows and Tudor Revivals that were built. Approximately six hundred homes were built in the district during the 1920s, accounting for nearly three-quarters of the total number of buildings in the district.

Attracted by the rolling hills and shady, tree-lined streets, many professionals and managers built attractive and finely detailed Craftsman homes and bungalows, the dominant house type of the proposed historic district. Also popular were revival styles that were in vogue during this period, such as Tudor Revival, Spanish and Italian revivals, and Colonial Revival. Many of these homes would have been taken from pattern books, or even mail-ordered. Sears, Roebuck, and Company sold many house kits nationwide, and many of the Woodlawn Highland homes bear resemblance to these and other home manufacturer's patterns.

A few of the homes, however, were undoubtedly designed by an architect. Unfortunately, this information has been lost. The residence at 5416 6<sup>th</sup> Avenue South (Resource 301) strongly resembles some Craftsman homes designed by Sallie and Mewhinney, a Birmingham firm who specialized in residential Craftsman designs. Further down at 5509 6<sup>th</sup> Avenue South (Resource 308) is a Mediterranean inspired home that may have been designed by George Turner, who designed a number of Spanish and Italian revival styles homes in the Hollywood subdivision of Homewood and in the Highlands in Tuscaloosa.

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An article in the 31 May 1925 *Birmingham Age-Herald* featured several of the new homes being built in the Woodlawn area. Among these was the home of Stewart Walker, a bookkeeper with the W.B. Long Real Estate and Insurance Company, at 5328 6<sup>th</sup> Court, and Frank Smith at 5300 6<sup>th</sup> Court (now 5<sup>th</sup> Terrace) (Resource 156), who was manager of the Alpha Press. The residence at 5282 7<sup>th</sup> Avenue South (Resource 468) was built by Frank Kremsel, an auto repairman with the Early Motor Service Company in downtown Birmingham. Finally, the article also featured the new home of Roscoe D. Chandler, a salesman with the W.H. Adams Flour and Grain Company, at 5400 54<sup>th</sup> Street (Resource 493). The attractive bungalow at 5145 7<sup>th</sup> Court South (Resource 520) was built in 1925 by George F. Miller, a salesman for the Dudley Bar Company which produced steel reinforcing bars and accessories.<sup>29</sup>

The Tudor Revival home at 5405 7<sup>th</sup> Court South (Resource 562) was built in 1928 by Ernest Bliss, a clerk at T.C.I. Suffering from tuberculosis, Bliss moved his family to one of the highest spots in the neighborhood, as the industry of Woodlawn was adversely affecting his health, his son recalled when he was young standing on the porch and looking at the industrial smog that covered Woodlawn. Clearly, a residential location away from the pollution was a major benefit of the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood.<sup>30</sup>

Perhaps one of the most important events in the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood, and indeed for much of the surrounding area, was the arrival of the Continental Gin Company in 1924. Formed in 1899 through the consolidation of six cotton gin manufacturing companies, Continental Gin became the world's largest manufacturer of ginning systems. Among these was the Pratt system, perfected by Daniel Pratt in the mid-nineteenth century, and produced by one of the predecessor companies, the Daniel Pratt Gin Company of Prattville, Alabama. One of the companies involved in this consolidation was the Smith Sons Gin and Machine Company, located on 41<sup>st</sup> Street in Avondale.<sup>31</sup>

Prior to 1924, the Continental Gin Company operated several factories, some of which were located in Dallas, Atlanta, Prattville, and Birmingham. In 1920, the H.K. Ferguson Company of Cleveland was engaged to design and build a new, modern plant in North Birmingham that would centralize all operations. By 1923, this site was discontinued and the company's second choice, a 25 acre tract of land in Avondale, was acquired. In 1924, construction began on what was to be a modern, efficient plant incorporating the latest in design and engineering for mass production and functionality as well as vast windows, clerestories, and monitor roofs for illumination and worker safety. In March 1925, the foundry and machine shop were complete and operational. By the end of the year, warehouses and other support buildings had been erected, the new three story corporate headquarters building was under construction, and the production of ginning equipment was in full operation.<sup>32</sup> In addition to the Continental Gin Company, other companies provided professional employment to the residents of Woodlawn Highlands. These included the Connors Steel Company, the Estes Lumber Company, Stockham Valves and Fittings, and the Chicago Bridge and Iron Company.

A perusal of the city directories gives some insight into the occupations of the people who lived in the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood. The Tudor Revival home at 5132 8<sup>th</sup> Avenue South (Resource 577) was built in 1929 by J. August Werner, an electrical engineer with Stockham Valves.<sup>33</sup> The 1928 city directory indicates that S.A. Hill of 4900 6<sup>th</sup> Avenue South (Resource 223) was an employee of the Alabama Power Company and G.E. Alley of 600 49<sup>th</sup> Street South (Resource 703) was a bricklayer. The 1931 city directory lists William A. Hendrix of 5147 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue South (Resource 24) as president of the Reliance Realty Company, while his son, James, worked as a mechanic at Adamson Motor Company. Ernest Hagood of 5509 6<sup>th</sup> Avenue South (Resource 308) was an engineer, while Harry Hendon of 5416 6<sup>th</sup> Avenue South (Resource 301) was an assistant county sanitary engineer. In 1937, the city directory lists Alonzo Abel of 548 55<sup>th</sup> Street South (Resource 772) as sales manager of Elmwood Cemetery, and Robert Hardeman of 556 56<sup>th</sup> Street South (Resource 808) as a switchman.

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It was also during the 1920s that non-residential buildings began to be built in the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood. In 1921 the Woodlawn Infirmary was erected between 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue South and 5<sup>th</sup> Terrace South, and between 55<sup>th</sup> Street South and 55<sup>th</sup> Place South. Built on a long, rectangular block carved out of the Woodlawn Realty Company's 6<sup>th</sup> Addition, the Woodlawn Infirmary began as a private 25 bed hospital that provided medical attention to those who paid a monthly fee. It grew rapidly into a 75 bed hospital, one of the largest in the state with the most up to date equipment available. In 1931, it became the Woodlawn Hospital. It is unclear when the hospital closed, but by the end of World War II it had been converted to Woodlawn Highland Apartments. This two story, brick and stone trim building with a basement was demolished.<sup>34</sup>

By the mid-1920s a small community service node, or commercial district, began to emerge along Grand Avenue that would serve Avonwood and Woodlawn Highlands, reflecting a city-wide trend in the decentralization of business units and an overall improvement of the citywide road network. Already standing was the Birmingham Electric Company substation (Resource 3), which was built sometime during the first decade of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. Interestingly, the 1925 Polk City Directory shows that the 4700 and 4800 blocks of Grand Avenue was a largely African-American community that may have been called Avonwood, reflecting its central position between the communities of Avondale and Woodlawn. At 4720 Grand Avenue was Moss & Walker, a laundry service owned by African-Americans. On the next block, at 4829 Grand Avenue the Hill Grocery Company operated a store, and directly across the street at 4830 was another grocer, D.J. Trucks. Trucks, an African-American, probably operated out of his home as he is listed at the same address in the 1916 city directory. None of these buildings are extant or located within the proposed district.<sup>35</sup> The 1928 city directory indicates that the six shotguns on 48<sup>th</sup> Street (Resources 692-697) were occupied by African-Americans who worked in various jobs. For instance, James McThomas and John McCall at 601 and 603 48<sup>th</sup> Street South, respectively, worked as general laborers. Nathan Bentley at 605 48<sup>th</sup> Street worked as a janitor, and Robert Adams at 607 48<sup>th</sup> Street was a miner.

The Woodlawn Highlands commercial district flourished as the 1920s progressed, spurred largely by the construction of the Continental Gin industrial site and headquarters building, the resultant shift of workers to this area, and the expanding population of the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood. By 1931, one and two story brick commercial buildings, interspersed with older residences, had been erected from 45<sup>th</sup> Street all the way to 53<sup>rd</sup> Street. The city directory for that year indicates the Hill Grocery Company operated three stores on Grand Avenue, one at 4505, another further down at 4913 (possibly Resource 9), and finally one at 5241. Other businesses consisted of two gas stations, a meat market, two pharmacies, Southern Roofing and Heating Co., a branch office of the Birmingham News, and a paint store, and by 1938 a BBQ stand, called "The Friendly Inn" was located at 4933 Grand Avenue.<sup>36</sup>

During the late 1920s, the Birmingham Board of Education embarked on another building campaign. The first campaign of the decade (1920 to 1923) saw the construction of the John Herbert Phillips High School (D.O. Whilldin, Architect), Woodlawn High School (H.B. Wheelock, Architect), and a number of grammar schools and additions throughout the city, including Avondale Elementary (Miller and Martin, Architects). Completed in 1922, the Tudor Revival style Woodlawn High School, with its brick diaperwork, towers, and Gothic arches, served the students of the Woodlawn Highlands Neighborhood. By 1927, the population of the southern Woodlawn neighborhoods apparently justified the construction of a new grammar school.

In March of 1927, several acres of land were resurveyed and 8<sup>th</sup> Court South was built curving around the base of a small hill. Atop this hill, a new elementary school was built, named in memory of the late Minnie Holman Phillips, wife of the former superintendent of schools. Constructed in the Jacobethan Revival style, a popular style at the time for educational institutions, the Minnie Holman School was a two story and basement brick structure with flanking wings that featured brick diaperwork and contrasting stone trim. Designed by the Birmingham architectural firm of Warren, Knight, and

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Davis, the school was built at the same time the firm was drawing the plans for the new Southside High School (Ramsay), West End High School, and several other schools. Sadly, this building was demolished sometime in the 1980s.<sup>37</sup>

The spiritual needs of the Woodlawn Highlands residents were generally served by churches in Woodlawn, and to a lesser extent, Avondale. At 5128 8<sup>th</sup> Court South, where Resource 626 now stands, was the small, brick Ridgway Terrace Baptist Church. Depicted on the 1930 Sanborn Map, it was remodeled into a residence in 1936.<sup>38</sup> It was not until after World War II, circa. 1949, that the church building at 506 51<sup>st</sup> Street (Resource 711) was built. Later the bungalow at 4933½ 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue South was converted to church use, and in 1971, the Groveland Baptist Church (Resource 40) was relocated from its former home at 452 66<sup>th</sup> Street North.

During the latter part of the 1920s, a new mode of housing arrived in the neighborhood. Two apartment buildings, or flats as they were called, were built on 56<sup>th</sup> Street South. A duplex was also built nearby (Resource 802). The apartment building at 516 56<sup>th</sup> Street (Resource 798) is a two story, stone veneer building originally called The Reyland Apartments. It contains four units, each with four rooms, and was built in 1928. The other apartment building, located at 520 56<sup>th</sup> Street (Resource 799), is a two story brick building and was originally called the Oliver Apartments. It had five units which rented for thirty dollars a month in 1938. After World War II smaller apartments and boarding houses were built in the neighborhood. Oftentimes, homes were converted to apartments, such as at 5147 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue South (Resource 24).<sup>39</sup>

By the end of the 1920s, the Woodlawn Highlands area was largely a middle class neighborhood of professionals, merchants, and managers living in attractive Craftsman and Tudor Revival homes. Residents had their own small commercial district, and could easily travel to Woodlawn, Avondale, or downtown Birmingham and beyond via streetcar or the increasingly common automobile for shopping, banking, and other needs. For recreational outings, the Avondale Park and the East Lake Park were located directly on major streetcar routes. Avondale Park was the site of concerts, pageants, and picnics, as well as the Birmingham Zoo and a Carnegie Library. However, major improvements to the park, such as an amphitheater, pavilions, and playing fields, did not come about until the early 1930s as a work relief program. East Lake Park, on the other hand, was considered a resort area adjacent to the man-made lake. One of the favorite city parks among residents, East Lake was the site of picnics, fishing, boating, and other outings. Other recreational opportunities, such as the Birmingham Country Club, the numerous theaters in downtown Birmingham, the baseball games at Rickwood Field, and events at Legion Field Stadium, were only a short streetcar ride away.<sup>40</sup>

On the eve of the Great Depression, the Birmingham district was producing 16 million tons of coal, over 3 million tons of coke, over 2 million tons of iron, and over a million tons of steel, as well as 2,256 different products. The financial crisis and resulting Depression period hit Birmingham especially hard. As a result there was little in the way of capital investment, such as plant expansions. Blast furnaces and mines operated on a periodic basis, and the mills, though they never closed, operated far below capacity. In addition, consumer spending was severely curtailed. In all, over 123,000 people lost their jobs, and this statistic no doubt included some of the residents of Woodlawn Highlands.<sup>41</sup>

By the mid-1930s the severity of the Depression was beginning to ease. Industrial sites began to increase production. Consumer spending and residential construction slowly began to increase as well. Ironically, it was during the mid-1930s that the largest and finest homes in Woodlawn Highlands were erected. Largely clustered around 7<sup>th</sup> Court South, 8<sup>th</sup> Avenue South, and 54<sup>th</sup> Street, these homes feature larger lots and high style architectural details. In addition to these, some smaller, minimal traditional homes were built in the district. In all, approximately fifty homes were built in the district during the 1930s.

The home at 5340 8<sup>th</sup> Avenue (Resource 598) was built in 1935 on a double corner lot, and is perhaps the largest home in the historic district. Built in a Colonial Revival style that recalls colonial homes of the mid-Atlantic region and

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Pennsylvania, the home is "L" shaped with a circular drive. Designed by prominent Birmingham architect D.O. Whilldin for Oliver H. Rogers, of the Rogers Electrical Company at 4613 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue North, the house incorporates a number of unusual electrical features. Whilldin, known for his fine Colonial revival designs, also designed Phillips High School, the Thomas Jefferson Hotel, Legion Field, and a number of Mountain Brook estates.<sup>42</sup>

At 5401 7<sup>th</sup> Avenue South (Resource 494), Dr. Sterling Somerset built a fine stone veneer French Normandy styled home in 1935. Configured in an "L" shape, the home features a large, round turret with an arched doorway. The gable ends feature draping shingles, meant to give the impression of a thatch roof typical of vernacular French and English country homes. Reportedly all of the sandstone used in the construction came from the old artesian wells that Eastwood Mall was built over. This home may have been designed by Brook B. Burnham, who is known to have worked within this style at approximately the same time.<sup>43</sup>

The home at 5343 7<sup>th</sup> Avenue South (Resource 492) was built in 1937 for Walter Miller, the founder, owner, and operator of the Miller Foundry Company. This fine Tudor Revival home was designed by Birmingham architect Brooke B. Burnham, and built by the owner's brothers in law, who were Scottish brick masons. Configured in an "L" shape, the house features intricate brickwork, faux half-timbering, copper awnings, and a galvanized metal roofing product manufactured at the U.S. Steel plant. During the 1930s, when steel production was low, U.S. Steel produced a number of innovative housing products such as steel shingles and steel crimp roofing. The roof of this home is one of these innovations. The decorative iron doors on the front and back entrances were cast at the owner's foundry. Burnham seems to have been a relatively minor architect in Birmingham. In 1936, he joined the office of Harry B. Wheelock, a prominent architect in the city, where he worked until 1940. Burnham, who primarily did residential projects, designed the high school in Sheffield (1921), a fire station in Inglenook (1928), the 10 story Ramsay-McCormick Building (1929) in downtown Ensley, and the Avondale Park pavilion (1931).<sup>44</sup>

The construction of these three homes is reflective of the building revival in Birmingham, and the nation as a whole, in the mid-1930s. Indeed, it was noted with great enthusiasm that in 1935 thirty frame residences and twenty-one brick veneer residences were constructed in the city, one of which was the Rogers House (Resource 598). The total expenditures for new construction was double that of 1934, and with the housing shortage, optimism for the construction industry and building trades for the following years was high.<sup>45</sup>

In the mid-1930s, one of Birmingham's most well-known citizens, nationally famous aviation pioneer and stunt pilot Glenn E. Messer, moved into the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood after purchasing the home at 524 56<sup>th</sup> Street South (Resource 801). Messer, originally from Iowa, became interested in aviation and in 1911 completed his first solo flight. He became nationally famous with his in-flight stunts, reportedly being the first person to change from one plane to another and change from an automobile to a plane. This notoriety also landed him some movie roles. He settled in Birmingham in 1920 where he operated an airfield and the Messer Flying Circus. In 1923, while in Americus, Georgia on business, he gave Charles Lindbergh flying lessons on his newly purchased Curtiss JN4 "Jenny." Lindbergh had only 20 hours of flying instructions and had never soloed before. In 1927, Messer formed the Southern Aircraft Corporation, which produced the "Air Boss" plane that Messer had designed. He managed Messer Field and also operated out of the Birmingham Airport. He later formed the Glenn Messer Company which was based in Woodlawn. Messer continued to live at 524 56<sup>th</sup> Street South until about 1976, when he moved to 5335 8<sup>th</sup> Avenue South (Resource 597), where he remained until his death in 1995.<sup>46</sup>

During the mid-1920s, after a court battle that went to the U.S. Supreme Court, the railroad companies and city initiated a grade-crossing elimination program for major traffic arteries along the downtown railroad reservation. After the completion of this program in 1931, resulting in a series of new viaducts and underpasses on 14<sup>th</sup>, 18<sup>th</sup>, 20<sup>th</sup>, 22<sup>nd</sup> Streets,

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attention turned to other grade-crossings throughout the city. This included the crossings on Grand Avenue near Woodlawn. Evidently, Grand Avenue had become a major traffic artery by this point, enough to warrant the city and the railroads to build three underpasses.

During the late 1930s, the city embarked on a \$1,500,000 grade elimination program, largely funded by the Federal Government. This program included underpasses at Thomas, East Thomas, 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue North, Norwood, and three on Grand Avenue. The paired underpasses for the Southern Railroad and the Central of Georgia line are of the type known as a skew deck truss thru plate girder. They were built by the Virginia Bridge Company using U.S. Steel products. In 1939, the underpass for the Seaboard Coast Line Railroad was built (Resource 28). Erected by the MacDougald Construction Company of Atlanta for \$112,000, this underpass is also a thru plate girder. In order to accommodate the new underpasses, portions of Grand Avenue were lowered, which accounts for the unusually elevated homes and retaining walls in this area.<sup>47</sup>

By the end of the decade, economic growth and new construction endeavors had returned to Birmingham. Construction totals were the highest since 1929, though a large portion of these totals included large tracts of public housing. In Woodlawn Highlands, a few lots in J.L. Thornton's additions to Ridgway Terrace were being resurveyed in and around 9<sup>th</sup> Avenue South. By this time, at least ninety percent of the neighborhood had been developed, as shown on *Pitner's Map of Birmingham* (1938) (Figure 8). The arrival of World War II was the stimulus needed to revive the industry of the Birmingham district. Military orders poured into the city's industries, and many plants went to three shifts a day. Continental Gin Company converted to manufacturing gun mounts and gun shields for the Navy, as well as shells, rockets, and gun sights. The Continental Gin plant at Avondale worked at 95% of its capacity in war production. Called the "great arsenal of the South," the citizens of Birmingham had civic pride in knowing that the city was the second most important bombing target to the enemy behind Pittsburgh.<sup>48</sup>

The end of the war signaled a new period of growth and activity in the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood. In 1946, the Crestwood Addition to Woodlawn Highlands was platted. In April of that year, lots went on sale, beginning at \$1,300. Abutting the J.L. Thornton additions and beginning around 54<sup>th</sup> Street eastward, Crestwood represents one of the largest planned subdivisions of the neighborhood and one of the first post-war subdivisions in the Birmingham area. The total size of the addition was 200 acres and contained an estimated 700 lots. Developed by Jackson Securities and Investment Company, it was noted as being the largest subdivision development since 1928. Crestwood, featuring winding roads and cul-de-sacs, experienced rapid development. Consisting largely of ranch and minimal traditional homes, Crestwood seems to have been completed by the time an aerial photograph of the area was taken in the early 1950s (Figure 9).<sup>49</sup>

Also underway in the late 1940s was the new Avondale-Irondale Highway, otherwise known as the Atlanta Highway or U.S. 78. However, the 1932 Whitson's Map of Birmingham shows the present course of the road drawn in, with dotted lines indicating projected portions. Today this road is known as Crestwood Boulevard. This major artery diverged from 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue South between 46<sup>th</sup> and 48<sup>th</sup> Streets and courses eastward, joining what is now Oporto-Madrid Road. Completed and opened in 1949, Crestwood Boulevard opened up much of the eastern area of the city to further residential development. Later it would become the main route to Birmingham's first enclosed shopping center, Eastwood Mall.

Development of Crestwood, Crestline, and surrounding neighborhoods continued. Undeveloped land to the south of Crestwood Boulevard and extending up the flanks of Red Mountain were quickly becoming enclaves of ranch homes and suburban ideals. The commercial district along 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue South declined, and many businesses relocated. Apartments began to replace some of the older Victorian era homes, or these homes were converted to boarding houses. The service station was demolished and replaced. This trend was to continue into the neighborhood itself. By the 1970s, much of what was Woodlawn Highlands had entered a long and steady decline. During the 1980s, crime and neglect became endemic to the neighborhood. Fortunately, the Woodlawn Highlands neighborhood has entered a period of renaissance

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since the 1990s, with an influx of young professionals and a renewed feeling of civic pride. Property values have increased, and although called Crestwood North by real estate interests, Woodlawn Highlands has entered the new millennium as one of Birmingham's most attractive neighborhoods

Verbal Description

The Woodlawn Highlands Historic District is situated on the east side of Birmingham, Alabama approximately two miles south of the Birmingham Airport. Along with 5th Avenue, the tracks of the Norfolk Southern Railroad form the northern boundary of Woodlawn Highlands. U.S. Highway 78, also known as Crestwood Boulevard, serves as the southern boundary of the district, separating Woodlawn Highlands from Crestview Hills, a subdivision of ranch houses. The west and east boundaries are 5th Avenue and 56th and 61st Streets, respectively.

Boundary Description

The boundaries were defined to include the many subdivisions and associated buildings within the area defined as Woodlawn Highlands. All of these resources were associated with the Woodlawn Highlands Historic District during the period of significance, which extends from 1890 to 1956.
