#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Fort Sanders Historic District is **roughly** seven-by-six blocks in size and contains approximately 400 buildings. It is located adjacent to the downtown area and the University of Tennessee campus. Although a few houses are built on double lots, most are located on single lots. The majority of these range from 50 to 75 feet in width.

Developed primarily between 1880 and 1920, the Fort Sanders Historic District contains a mixture of architectural styles prevalent during the late Victorian and Second Revival periods. The Queen Anne and Bungalow influences are the most widespread. Houses are generally of wood frame construction with brick or weatherboard veneers and two stories in height.

The majority of buildings within the district were built for single family residential use. Today, several homes have been converted to rooming houses and apartments. Some buildings are used as neighborhood groceries, laundries and restaurants. The district also includes a firehall, a private school and three churches,

The buildings are in a variety of conditions, from excellently maintained to deteriorated. Some of Fort Sanders older residents have been joined by a group of new residents to form the Fort Sanders Community Improvement Association, which is active in revitalizing the area as a viable, attractive inner-city residential neighborhood.

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#### Fort Sanders

The Fort Sanders Historic District is located in close proximity to the campus of the University of Tennessee. Indeed, the neighborhood once stretched south of Cumberland Avenue where the center of the campus is now located. Because of this proximity and the growth of the university, development has occurred within the center of the proposed historic district. This is particularly true in the area bordered by Highland Avenue to the north, Laurel Avenue to the south, 15th Street to the east and 17th Street to the west. Development has also occurred in the area bordered by Highland and Bridge Avenues to the north and south and 12th and 13th Streets to the east and west. New construction in the former area includes a high-rise apartment complex, three-and-four story brick and concrete block apartment buildings and a three-story parking garage. The latter area contains several parking lots and apartment houses built within the last twenty years.

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

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Fort Sanders, which takes its name from the site of an important Civil War battle, is a residential neighborhood that has played an extremely significant role in the history of Knoxville. First developed in the 1880s, it was an exclusive surburb of the city and a model of residential architecture in the late Victorian Period. Its proximity to the downtown business district and to the University of Tennessee campus was influential in making it the home of scores of prominent merchants, professionals, civic and governmental leaders, and professors. This strategic location continues to make Fort Sanders a dynamic community today.

The neighborhood's namesake was a temporary earthen structure built to the west of the city by Union Army engineers in 1863 to defend Knoxville (which, like most of East Tennessee, had strong pro-Union sympathies) from Confederate attack. It was originally named Fort Loudon, but was renamed in honor of General William Sanders, who died on November 18, 1863 in a preliminary skirmish with General James Longstreet's troops west of the city on Kingston Pike. That skirmish gave General Ambrose Burnside's men time to complete the fort, located at the crest of a hill near what is now the corner of 17th Street and Laurel Avenue. Following a brief siege, Longstreet attacked at dawn on November 29, 1863. In a battle that lasted only 20 minutes, eight hundred thirteen Confederate soldiers were killed, wounded, or captured. The battle assured Union domination over East Tennessee and cost the South a strategic railroad link to Richmond that was sometimes called "the lifeline of the Confederacy." Ruins of the fort were still extant in the early twentieth century; however, neighborhood growth resulted in residential development on the fort's site. One of the fort's trench lines, which eroded over time into a gully, is now 17th Street. The battle site has been commemorated by two markers, one erected by the Tennessee Historical Commission and one by the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

Fort Sanders' development as a residential neighborhood began more than twenty years after the Civil War battle. On early plat maps the area was represented as two different parcels, and development in some ways followed this pattern. White's Addition, original the estate of one of the sons of Knoxville's founder, James White, began at the Tennessee River and extended north to Laurel Avenue. The area north of Laurel Street along Highłand, Forest, and Grand Avenues was known as Ramsey's Addition (after the decendants of another pioneer family). Both parcels extended from Second Creek (approximately 10th Street) to Third Creek (approximately 23rd Street). However, early residential development in White's Addition stopped at what is now 17th Street. White's Addition was the more exclusive development. There,many of Knoxville's prominent and influential citizens, such as wholesale grocer Martin Luther Ross and Tennessee attorney general George Pickle, built grand Victorian mansions at the turn of the century. According to the late historian and artist Russell Briscoe, Knoxville's elite moved to Fort Sanders from Summit Hill (abutting downtown) to escape pollution from a nearby ore smelting operation. Ramsey's Addition developed as a middle class and lower middle class



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neighborhood primarily housing workers with the Southern Railway, the Knoxville Cotton Mill, and the Knoxville Woolen Mill. Some of the residents of Ramsey's Addition, however, were notable businessmen, professionals, and industrialists, such as marble producer J.J. Craig Jr. and real estate developer Barnabas Braine. The homes, although somewhat smaller than those in White's Addition, reflect many of the same architectural characteristics.

In 1888 the entire area between Second Creek and Third Creek was incorporated as the City of West Knoxville. This spurred increased residential development, particularly in White's Addition. The area was annexed into Knoxville in 1897. West Knoxville's north-south streets had been numbered consecutively, beginning with First Street at Second Creek; upon annexation, the streets were redesignated to correspond to Knoxville's street numbering system. Today numerous bronze street markers embedded in the sidewalks and bearing the earlier street names of West Knoxville are still visible.

As the City continued to expand westward over the next generation, Fort Sanders lost it exclusiveness to newer residential developments. With the onset of the Depression, the character of the neighborhood underwent a change. Many of the mansions too large for one family to maintain became boarding houses or apartments. Renting out portions of smaller homes also became a common practice. In the 1950s and 1960s, as the University of Tennessee expanded, many of the mansions in White's Addition were destroyed, and the remainder of Fort Sanders became a housing resource for the increased population of students. Owner-occupancy declined and the condition of the housing stock deteriorated. However, the 1970s saw a renewed interest in preserving the rich architectural tradition and residential character of Fort Sanders. A number of significant properties have been restored as owner-occupied dwellings. In view of declining energy supplies, the convenient location and urban setting of Fort Sanders have once again made it a popular residential locale. It has tremendous potential to develop as a vibrant and unique community in a historic setting, serving a heterogenous mixture of students, faculty, homeowners and downtown workers.

Fort Sanders, a combination of White's and Ramsey's Additions, has been one of Knoxville's most important residential communities since its initial development in the 1880's and 1890's. The close proximity to the University of Tennessee and downtown Knoxville has added through the years to the continued viability of the neighborhood.

The Fort Sanders district includes two of the original churches, a school (although the original structure has been replaced), medical facilities, a fire station and a small commercial area reminiscent of the "Mom and Pop" grocery, in which commercial structures are presented at a scale compatible with the residential character of the neighborhood. Multi-family units, many dating from the early development, coexist with single family residences.

The structures encompassed in the boundaries of the Fort Sanders Historic District typify the architectural diversity prevelant at the turn of the century. White's Addition, an exclusive residential development by 1880, contains some of Knoxville's best examples of Queen Anne and Second Revival Period architecture. Although the structures in Ramsey's Addition are of a smaller scale, these houses share the same functional and expressive features as the larger homes in the area---decorated gable ends, stylized ventilations, ornamental half-timbering and relief decoration. Another common thread is the front

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porch, which occurs on most of the houses in Fort Sanders.

The district as a whole is a diverse mixture of architectural styles including variations of Queen Anne, Shingle, Neo-Classical, and Bungalow. The influence of other architectural styles such as Italiante and Richardsonian Romanesque is present to a lessor degree. A few shotgun houses, indicative of working class architecture, are included along the northern boundary of the district.

The rhythm, which is established by uniform setbacks, is further enhanced by the "uphill-downhill" configuration of the neighborhood. The larger, more elaborate structures are located on the uphill; the smaller, less elaborate structures are found on the downhill.

Many of Knoxville's most prominent and influential citizens have lived in Fort Sanders. Those most prominent in the early business development were Martin Luther Ross, a candy manufacturer and wholesale grocer who built the house at 1415 Laurel in 1894. His son, William Cary Ross, became an active financier and industrialist. Matthew McClung, a member of Knoxville's prominent McClung family and partner in Cowan, McClung, and Company, a wholesale dry goods store and notions firm, built the house at 1625 Clinch in 1907. J. Patrick Roddy, Sr., founder of the Coca Cola Bottling Company which served a large part of East Tennessee, resided at 1803 Clinch. Max B. Arnstein, who founded Arnstein Department Store (Knoxville's first skyscraper), lived at both 1403 Laurel and 1625 Laurel. The latter is no longer standing.

Captain William Rule, who lived at 1604 Clinch Avenue, was editor of the Knoxville Chronicle and founder and editor of the Knoxville Journal. Rule was twice elected mayor of Knoxville and wrote A Standard History of Knoxville, published in 1898.

Knoxville industrialists who made their home in Fort Sanders included John James Craig, Jr. (1415 Highland), president of John J. Craig Marble and Minerals, one of the largest quarries and marble dealers in the South; George Helms (1511 Laurel), president of King Mantle Company; and W.J. Savage (1323 Highland), manufacturer of mill machinery and conservationist; Weston Miller Fulton (1202 Clinch Avenue), invented the sylphon, a seamless metal tube which could be used as a billows. The sylphon is a forerunner of today's thermostat.

Tennessee Attorney George Pickle (1633 Clinch) and State Representative Richard DeArmand (1416 Clinch) built houses in Fort Sanders. Lewis Hopkins Spilman (1525 Laurel), special circuit judge, and Charles H. Brown (1308 White), Knox County Chancellor, were also residents of Fort Sanders.

Fort Sanders proximity to the University of Tennessee made it a natural and desirable dwelling place for university faculty. In 1905, Thomas Jordan, dean of the college, resided at 1312 White Street. His neighbors at 1302 and 1308 White Street were also faculty members; C.D. Schmitt, a professor of mathematics, lived at the former address while Captain Andrew Nave, a professor of military science and tactics, resided at the latter address. Another professor, Charles Perkins, lived at 1547 Clinch. In 1887, W.W. Carson, a professor of mathematics and founder of the chair of civil engineering at the University, constructed a residence at 1310 Clinch Street. In 1903, Carson built the first structure in White's

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Addition west of 17th Street at 1705 Clinch Street.

Many of the homes in Ramsey's Addition along Highland, Forest and Grand provided housing for workers at the cotton and woolen mills, located north of the neighborhood, as well as workers at the railroad yards and terminal, located northeast of the neighborhood.

The Fort Sanders neighborhood is the setting for one of the outstanding American novels of the 20th century, <u>A Death in the Family</u> by James Agee. In the book, Agee describes the neighborhood as it existed in 1915; at one point he outlines a walk from downtown Knoxville to Forest Avenue, and many of the Landmarks on the route are still evident today. The novel's concluding scene takes place at the ruins of the old Civil War Fort.

"They were working and breathing rather hard, for they were walking westward up the steep hill toward Fort Sanders...
They were standing at the edge of Fort Sanders and looking out across the waste of briers and of embanked clay...

Agee spent his boyhood in a home at 1509 Highland Avenue. (The Agee home is no longer in existence). Agee's father, like the father in the novel, died in an automobile accident in 1916, when Agee was 6 years old.

A Death in the Family was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for Literature in 1957. A play based on the novel, All the Way Home, won the 1960 Pulitzer for Drama. Several scenes appearing in the motion picture version of All the Way Home were filmed in Fort Sanders.

Agee immortalized the neighborhood in another work also, a short essay called "Knoxville Summer, 1915". His description evokes the essence of life in Ramsey's Addition--as seen through the eyes of a small boy:

"It was a little bit mixed sort of block, fairly, solidly lower middle class, with one or two juts apiece on either side of that. The houses corresponded; middle-sized gracefully fretted wood houses built in the late nineties or early nineteen hundreds with small front and side and more spacious backyard and trees in the yards, and porches... There were fences around one or two of the houses, but mainly the yards ran into each other with only now and then a low hedge that wasn't doing very well.... The men were mostly small businessmen, one or two very modest executives, one or two worked with their hands, most of them clerical, and most of them between thirty and forty-five".

Two churches built in the late 19th century to serve Fort Sanders growing population remain in the neighborhood, Ramsey Memorial Church (1538 Highland) and Fort Sanders Presbyterian Church (16th and Laurel) which now serves as a theatre.

Despite educational and commercial development which has occurred in the past forty years, Fort Sanders has maintained its identity as a distinctive urban neighborhood. The last ten years has seen a renewed interest in preserving the character of the area, which is derived from its architectural resources.

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have been modified to retain that area which preserves a cohesive architectural unity, a strong, distinct feeling of neighborhood, and an authentic feeling of Victorian character. More recent construction surrounding the historic area have limited the boundaries as well. Beyond the eastern boundary of 11th Street is the site for an international energy exposition scheduled for 1982; beyond 19th Street, the western edge of the district, are two hospitals and related office buildings and parking. Forest Avenue serves as the northern border with the exception of small segments of Grand Avenue that have not yielded to industrial use; beyond White Avenue, the southern boundary, is the University of Tennessee main campus and heavy commercialization along Cumberland Avenue. All the borders are somewhat irregular in an effort to maintain the highest architectural integrity.

The nominated property includes 401 buildings and 36 vacant or parking lots. Of the total number of buildings, only 44 do not contribute to the significance of the district. The amount of vacant land has been minimized as much as possible. The boundary is well defined by wide streets in some places and in others by areas in which the architectural character of the buildings varies in age and significance from those buildings included in the district.
