Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The S. K. Whiting house is a three-story mansard-roofed mansion. The main portion is square in plan, with a one-and-one-half story ell projecting from its rear wall. The central bay of the facade (facing the street) is a very shallow pavilion which terminates in a mansard observatory at roof level. The main entrance is at the pavilion's base, and is enclosed by a large portico. The portico has doubled outer posts standing on short pedestels, which are connected with the house by decorative wooden railings.

The windows on all elevations are 2/2 and arranged regularly, two flanking the central pavilion on both stories of the facade, and two on each story of the side walls. An exception is at the bottom of the left bay of the east wall, which holds a shallow bay window. Doubled 1/1 windows stand above the portico. Each roof bay holds a round-headed dormer window with a small finial attached to each hood. The main windows are enclosed in the thin decorative frames.

Iron cresting caps the pavilion, and simple modillions support the eaves. All walls are clapboarded and framed by beveled cornerboards with decorative rosettes. The roof is similarly framed.

The ell is clapboarded and roofed in the same manner as the house.

The interior is arranged symmetrically around a central hall, with double parlor to the right, sitting room and dining room to the left. The present owners have restored the interior to approximate the original. Notable features are the original hanging gas lamps in each downstairs room, all slightly oriental in design; crystal doorknobs on all doors and shutters (interior shutters exclusively); and black walnut woodwork throughout. Bedrooms occupy the second floor, and the third (mansard) story contains a ballroom.

The interior of the ell has been remodeled, but originally held a kitchen, pantry, refrigerator room, woodshed, and privy. The second story was the maid's quarters and a storage chamber.

A clapboarded, mansard-roofed barn stands detached and to one side of the house. A carriage-house once stood behind this, but has since been demolished.

8. Significance



Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Samuel Kidder Whiting House in Ellsworth is probably the finest Second Empire style building in Hancock County, and one of the major Second Empire houses in the Penobscot Region outside of Bangor. The house is unusually well-preserved, the interior being among the best-restored of any accessible to the public in eastern Maine.

Samuel Kidder Whiting (1853-1917), an Ellsworth dry-goods merchant, commissioned the house at the age of 18 (1871), and lived there until his death. The second owner was Benjamin B. Whitcomb, a lumber operator and the town's largest employer during and after World War I.

The house is sophisticated and probably architect-designed, for a virtually identical but slightly more expensive house stands on West Broadway in Bangor (Charles P. Brown House, c. 1871-72). The only architect practicing in Bangor at the time was George Orff, and the restrained but elegant character of the plan is wholly in keeping with his style. Orff was a major Maine architect, and this is the largest commission attributable to him outside of Bangor.
