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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The 1903 Reedley Opera House Complex is a brick commercial building situated at the southern corner of 10th and G, in the heart of the downtown area. The complex was L-shaped in design, some 150 feet long, with the Opera House forming the base of the L. The remainder of the building contained a bank, a drug store, and a harness shop. A porch canopy once extended along 10th Street and G Street, but was removed at an unknown date. A curved parapet over the Opera House section was removed in 1950. Other major alterations have been reversed, re-creating the historic appearance to a high degree.

The building is composed of two distinct units. The Opera House forms the base of the L and has its own individual treatment of the facade. The broad central segmentally arched entrance is flanked by narrow segmentally arched windows. The edges of the facade are articulated by shallow piers which rise above the parapet and are capped by metal finials. A shallow arch in the center of the parapet has been removed but is scheduled for reconstruction. The parapet steps down to create a lower roofline in the commercial section to the left of the Opera House. This long expanse of wall is punctuated by segmentally arched windows and three doorways indicating the division into two shops in the central portion and the bank at the far end. The bank occupied the northernmost corner. The main entrance was angled across the north corner; the segmentally arched doorway was flanked by two shallow piers rising into metal finials and enclosing a small half-round parapet. The G Street side was treated in a similar manner, but with two large segmental arches instead of a doorway.

The brick in the structure consists of five distinctive colors ranging from tones of orange to deep red, and highlighted with many that are black. This brick was made in Reedley. Some of the brick came from the Gosling's brick store after the 1902 fire. The building has double and triple coursed supporting arches over the doors and windows. The original star patterned iron thresholds are still in each doorway. Distinctive tin decorative finials flank the entrance to the bank and the Opera House rising on three-foot supports. Two of the three curved masonry parapets still exist at the roofline of the building. The Opera House sign is located on the parapet above the entrance flanked on each side by two matching medallions.

In the basement of the Opera House is the 1903 carbide generator that was used for lighting until electricity came in 1907. Two frames of these lighting fixtures were found in the basement also.

The structure has been altered by the removal of the main parapet arch over the Opera House sign when a bond beam was added in the 1950s. The tin finials on top of the building were replicated by a tinsmith to match the ones in the historic photos. The main street frontage windows had to be restored back to the arched original appearance by removing a large square window. The building was sandblasted and coated with two coats of sealer. Many of the original windows were broken and have been replaced with stained glass. The metal canopy shown in the old pictures has been removed. Several of the original doors and windows have been bricked in, and some new doorways cut into the interior walls.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The 1903 ReedleyOpera House Complex remains one of the finest examples of turn of the century brick commercial architecture in the local community. The building was designed and built by an important local entrepreneur, Jesse Jansen, after a fire destroyed downtown Reedley. It is located in the heart of downtown, and will play a major part in the current city revitalization program. This Opera House Complex not only contained a theatre, but from the beginning integrated commercial functions including the town's major banking facility. The Opera House's portable seating made possible theatrical performances with an audience capacity of over 300, and could be transformed quickly to a dance hall, church, boxing arena, or box-supper social hall.

Mr. Jansen, a native of Denmark, was born August 21, 1855. He followed the sea until he reached a captain's rank, then left it all for the "Land of Promise", the gold country. In Placer County, he settled into farming, a venture that led him to move to Reedley in 1889, the world's largest grain shipping capital. He became a grain agent, and soon added a real estate and insurance business. In 1902, there was a fire that burned all the buildings in the main two blocks of town. This entire area was all wooden structures except one brick structure; Mr. Jansen bought the brick from this damaged building and began the construction of his building. He organized the merchants to rebuild with brick. The paper has the following account: "The rebuilding of the old brick store was a doubtful proposition for sometime after the fire, but that public spirited citizen, JESSE JANSEN, came to the rescue by purchasing the lots and erecting the Opera House Block. There is very little doubt now as to Reedley's future. We have weathered the gale and from now on its plain sailing." Mr. Jansen put in his own waterworks for the downtown area. In 1913, when the city was incorporated, it bought out his waterworks and added the new city hall next to the Opera House.

The Opera House served the community in its original purpose until the silent movies entered the scene in 1912. The first performance on the stage was by a traveling company doing "Uncle Tom's Cabin". With numerous traveling professional performances and local events, the Opera House was the cultural and social gathering place of the area. The paper lists some of the following activities: operetta, community plays, recitations, political speeches, grand balls, square dances, dance and piano recitals, dance lessons, band concerts, town meetings, box-suppers, and boxing and wrestling exhibitions. The high school graduations were also held there as well as the "chautaqua" meetings. The churches held revivals there frequently. The Catholic Church used it every Sunday for four years, and the priest heard confessions out of the same booth used for ticket sales.
