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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The O.A.E. Blyberg House sits prominently atop a hill on the west side of a city block that is otherwise unbuilt upon. The site is well-adorned with trees and slopes steeply to the east. The house has a rubble-stone foundation, though this has been smoothly finished with concrete. Exposed rubble-stone is used in several retaining walls on the property. A two-bay, two-level garage/carriage house is built into the hillside southeast of the house. It is of frame construction on a masonry foundation.

The house was built of locally-produced, cream-colored brick in 1884. It is in the Italianate style, with an irregular two-and-a-half story plan. The low-hipped roof is decorated at the eaves with heavy brackets with pendants. Several pedimented gabled dormers accentuate the irregular roof. On the north, west, and east sides, these dormers have segmentally-arched, double hung windows.

The north side also has a larger dormer with Palladian windows and a balcony with a curved spindle railing. A south side dormer with Palladian windows is faced with fish-scale patterned shingles.

Windows in the house are tall and rectangular, set into slightly arched openings. Sills are of dressed stone. Raised brick coursework marks the major blocks of each facade. A frame porch extends around the front half of the house. Square porch columns support a second-floor balcony. The balcony has a simple railing and roof sections supported by turned columns.

Major additions were made to the house in 1901-02. These include the second story at the rear of the house, dormers on all but the north side, the second-level balcony on the east and west, and a single-story room on the east side. All additions merely extended existing architectural motifs. The house is in excellent repair and well maintained.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Architecturally and historically the O.A.E. Blyberg House is perhaps the most important residence in Pelican Rapids. early period of the city's development, no other house is as well designed, built, and preserved. The house reflects the success and importance of its original owner. O.A.E. Blyberg came to Pelican Rapids in 1871 when the town was first getting started. Prior to moving to the new town, he served as a store clerk in Sauk Centre, Minnesota. He opened the first store in Pelican Rapids, and his log building was one of the first three struc-Not only was he the town's first merchant, but tures in town. he served as the first postmaster (until 1886) and built the first frame house in Pelican Rapids. His entrepreneurial activities extended to opening a drugstore and, more importantly, to land speculation and development. Blyberg's three plat additions to Pelican Rapids added greatly to the area of the city and included a major portion of the commercial district. His early success as a merchant and speculator is reflected in his 1884 house.
