health sanitarium. Its investor's included several business leaders from Waukesha, Milwaukee and Chicago. For example, Waukesha investors included Henry Blair, Dr. Wilbur O. Carrier of Carroll College and Andrew I. Frame. Those from Milwaukee included Frederick Pabst and Charles Pfister. (B)

The hotel offered a full range of recuperative and theraputic activities including curative baths, a swimming pool, gymnasium and solarium. Golf, tennis and lawn games were also available. The furnishings were plush throughout and it was seen, at the time, as the logical hotel to replace the Fountain Spring House which closed the year Resthaven was built. (A, B).

Unfortunately, Resthaven was built too late to be successful. The Springs Era was dying and the weathy visitors stopped coming in large numbers. Resthaven began to have financial trouble from the beginning. After only ten years, the owners tried to sell the hotel but were unable to. In 1919, the hotel was sold to the Veteran's Administration as a recuperative hospital and later a tuberculosis hospital. The hospital was closed in 1958. After several years of vacancy, the building became the home of the New Tribes Bible Institute which it remains at present. (A/B)

Architectural Significance:

Resthaven is a large scale structure, sited on the crest of perhaps the most prominent hill in Waukesha. The scale and siting contribute to the building's significance as a visual landmark in the community. (continued below)

Architectural Significance (continued):

In addition to its importance as a visual landmark, the design of Resthaven reflects a classical influence, well suited to the monumental scale of the building. Apparently the Classical Revival style was employed for a number of the large sanitariums erected in Waukesha in the early twentieth century (Waukesha Springs Sanitarium-razed; Grand View Health Resort-500 Riverview Avenue-43/9). Resthaven is a significant example of this period of construction, and retains a greater amount of integrity than Grandview Health Resort, the only comparable structure.

In addition to the original hotel, a one-story outbuilding made of corrugated metal is attached to the east side of the building. Three small, one-story detached buildings lie to the east of the main hotel. And a large metal-sided butler-type building lies directly north of the hotel. None of these buildings contributes to the significance of the nominated property.
