Today this structure consists of two main sections, the first section being the original residence of the Eisenbeis family, consisting of four stories and basement, and the second section having been added by the Jesuit Order in 1928. The walls in the original building are one foot thick and constructed of brick, and roofed with slate. The original building has three turrets across the front and suggests a Rhine castle.

The Eisenbeis residence consisted of a basement, three floors and attic, all of sturdy construction, with finely crafted hardware, redwood and oak paneling and tile fireplaces. The ornate woodwork and carved fireplace mantels were done by German artisans.

As one progresses to the third floor, it can be seen that the 12-inch thick walls continue upward; but as you ascend to the attic and enter the turret, you can observe that the walls are 18 inches thick, and, looking up into the turret, that the main timbers measure 40 feet in length.

This property was purchased by the Jesuit Order in 1925, and the second section was added and the entire combined building was given a uniform coat of stucco.

Under the Jesuit Order the building became completely self-sufficient, with laundry, paint shop, store room, plumbing shop, electrical shop, and a place for wood working and metal working, each equipped with all the necessary tools to do these many things. The Manresa Hall Library was a highly specialized one, with many works in Latin, Greek and many modern languages.

The steam heating plant is a marvel in itself, having been equipped with many safety devices, and is a low pressure steam plant serving approximately seventy radiators.

An elevator was installed in 1928, at a cost of \$3,400.00 and today would cost between \$35,000. to \$40,000.

At the end of the second main section is the chapel, with its leaded stained glass windows and 18-foot ceilings. The side altars in the chapel were used for saying individual masses. The main altar was constructed of Italian marble.


This building was sold late in 1968 to Mr and Mrs Joshua Norris, and is in the process of being remodeled into an Inn.

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## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Charles Eisenbeis, a master baker from Prussia, was the first Mayor of Port Townsend. He arrived here in 1858 and opened a shop to manufacture crackers and ship's bread. Mr Eisenbeis platted real estate tracts and erected business blocks, including the first stone building on Water Street, in 1873. He also built the Mount Baker block in the center of the city. He was interested in a brewery, brick yerd, lumber mill, wharves and banks, and a great hotel on the hill, which never was occupied, owing to the financial crash.

At the peak of the boom in 1892, Mr Eisenbeis erected his four-story (with Basement), brick and stone residence roofed with slate.
