

Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The A.B. Baca House is a one-story, rectangular dwelling with two small additions at the rear corners. It is constructed of adobe which has been plastered and painted white. The distinctive style of the exterior plastering, called emborregado, consists of a wooly texture with an approximately six-inch smooth border around each wall. The green-painted metal roof is hipped and topped with a gable. A hip-roofed dormer window is centrally placed on each facade. The front porch is supported by three square posts and has a latticework balustrade and a spindlework frieze. It is under the main roof and covers more than half of the main facade. The large, original wooden windows are 1/1 and double hung.

A stone wall about eighteen inches thick and three feet high extends along the present street line. North of the main house is a small, flat-roofed, white painted building which is rented as an apartment. This building is actually a trailer to which rooms were added. It was first placed on the property during World War II, (May Baca).

The house has been little altered. A porch on the rear was made into a room before 1920, (May Baca). The original plaster is still in place and has recently been repainted. The house is now divided into two apartments, one for each of A.B. Baca's daughters-in-law, May and Piedad Baca. The house was originally further set back from the street. Several yards of land northeast of the low wall which now bounds the property were donated for the School of Mines Road. The A.B. Baca House is well maintained and well represents its historic associations.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

Located just southwest of the San Miguel Church neighborhood, this dwelling represents an elaboration of the adobe hipped box which was a popular building style in that neighborhood in the late Territorial and early Statehood periods. As such it is an example of the adaptation into the adobe tradition of an imported plan and stylistic features. However, this home of a prominent local politician is exceptional for its special plastering, gable-on-hip roof, and distinctive wooden porch.

The house was built in about 1910 for A.B. (Abdenago) Baca, Sr. (May and Piedad Baca, interviews). Abel Trujillo and Jesus Martinez contracted to make the adobes and erect the house. Trujillo, a stone mason, also constructed the low stone wall in front of the property. Abran Vigil, a local carpenter and blacksmith, did the interior woodwork. The house was plastered by Pablo Vasquez of Mexico whom Baca found on the Socorro Plaza. In place of lath Vasquez drove small pieces of rock into the adobe walls. He smoothed and squared the edges and gave the rest of the wall a texture that is reminiscent of sheep wool. Vasquez also plastered five other houses in Socorro. (Barbaras, 2-3)

A.B. Baca, was the son of Francisco and Juanita Baca who owned a cattle ranch near Socorro. In about 1865 Francisco Baca took his family to Topeka, Kansas, for a safer environment and better schools. They remained there until the death of Juanita in 1879 when the remaining family members returned to New Mexico. Like his better-known younger brother, Elfego Baca (1865-1945), A.B. Baca was active in Republican politics. He served in such local posts as deputy sheriff of Socorro County and county assessor. Baca lived in the nominated house until his death in about 1918.

The house is architecturally significant as an example of a well-maintained, late-Territorial, hip-roofed, cubic adobe dwelling. It combines local craftsmanship with a plan, roof design, and decorative elements brought from the Midwest. As such it illustrates the continuing influence on adobe architecture, in the aftermath of the mining boom, of imported styles brought by the railroad. The house was placed on the New Mexico State Register of Cultural Properties on June 20, 1977. The Period of Significance, 1910, is the date of construction.
