

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Kiels-McNab House is a Greek Revival raised cottage of frame and brick construction. It is composed of two main blocks, both of which are rectangular. The front section, which has a gabled roof and two end-interior chimneys, is joined to the rear section of the house which projects approximately two feet on the left of the building. The roof of this rear section is divided into two halves. On the left as one faces the facade the roof is gabled, on the right it is hipped.

The ground floor is constructed of brick and the upper, or main floor, of overlapping white pine board six inches in width. A raised portico across the front of the cottage is supported by six pillars of stuccoed brick faced with ornamental stone. These pillars are joined by flat arches. Six steps on either side lead from the ground level to a central landing and from there six central steps lead to the porch. Six small round Doric columns support the roof the portico which features a dentiled entablature. Bannisters along the stairs are similar to ones which connect the columns of the portico.

A central single door is hardwood with four inset panels and has four lights on either side. The four front windows are floor length with four panes per sash, each measuring 26 x 15 inches.

The interior of the ground floor consists of a sitting room and a bedroom along the front. A dining room and a serving hall in the rear are divided by a central hall which has brick walls and floor. The enclosed stairs rise from this hall with a plain handrail which runs up on a side. The kitchen was separate and to the rear.

The main floor consists of an entry hall, two parlors, two bedrooms and a rear hall where the stairs are located. An unadorned ceiling medallion is located in the front hall. The two front parlors open into this hall with panelled doors each 3 1/2 feet wide, making a seven foot opening on each side. The two bedrooms on the back open into the front parlors and the rear hall. The fireplaces in the front parlors have evidently been reworked as they are colored glazed tile and have more elaborate mantels. Other fireplaces are small, and brick faced. Hearths are plaster on brick and the mantels are grooved with pilaster effects. All ceilings are 16 feet high and all interior walls, except those in the ground floor hall are plaster on lathe.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE


The Kiels-McNab House served as the residence of two Eufaulians who played significant roles in the early history of this city: Elias M. Kiels, a prominent leader in the radical reconstruction movement and John McNab, an early banker.

Kiels, a native Alabamian known to have been living in Eufaula as early as 1837, constructed this cottage as his home in 1840. Later, after the Civil War, he constructed a more elaborate brick structure using this house as a model. Unfortunately, this later structure did not survive.

Prior to and during the Civil War, he served as Tax Assessor of Barbour County. In 1870 he ran for the office of the Judge of the City Court of Eufaula on the Republican ticket. During his period he became a leader of the radical reconstruction element and became involved in the bloody election riots of November, 1874, when his young son was killed. Subsequent to the congressional investigations which followed the riot, he left Barbour County and never returned.

In 1880 the property was purchased by John McNab, an early settler who came to Eufaula in its earliest days and became one of the richest and most influential citizens. A banker, churchman and Intendant of the town, he played a very conspicuous role in the financial history of the town. His bank, The Eastern Bank of Alabama, was chartered in the 1850's.

The cottage remained in the McNab family until 1973, when it was purchased from his grandson, Eugene Britt Doughtie, by the City Water Works and Sewer Board of Eufaula for restoration as offices.



#### Original description submitted with 1973 nomination:

The front section, which has a gabled roof and two end-interior chimneys, is joined to the rear section of the house which projects approximately two feet on the left of the building. The roof of this rear section is divided into two halves. On the left as one faces the facade the roof is gabled, on the right it is hipped.

The ground floor is constructed of brick and the upper, or main floor, of overlapping white pine boards, six inches in width. A raised portico across the front of the cottage is supported by six pillars of stuccoed brick faced with ornamental stone. These pillars are joined by flat arches. Six small round Doric columns support the roof of the portico which features a dentiled entablature. Bannisters along the stairs are similar to ones which connect the columns and are urn-type. The main floor consists of an entry hall, two parlors, two bedrooms and a rear hall where the stairs are located. An unadorned ceiling medallion is located in the front hall. #### Addendum to original description:

During the move, the following changes were made to the house. The flat arches of the ground floor were converted to arched openings, the round columns of the porch were exchanged for square ones and the balusters were replaced with simple rectangular ones. These last two changes are probably appropriate for the original period of construction for the house.

The present lot was vacant when the house was moved to it.

**Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)**

POLITICS & COMMERCE

The Kiels-McNab House is significant for its associations with two prominent Eufaulians who played important roles in the early history of the city; Elias M. Kiels, a leader in the radical reconstruction movement, and John McNab, an early banker. Although McNab's Bank (NRHP) still stands, no other structure associated with Kiels exists.

In 1973, the Kiels-McNab House was listed on the National Register at its location on Barbour Street, but was delisted when it was moved to its present location in 1974. At the time of the move, the house was located directly across from Avondale Cotton Mills and adjacent to a trailer court and a quick food market. It was set fairly close to the sidewalk. On its new site, .6 of a mile from the original site, the house is located on a high knoll set back from the street (see photographs for comparison).
