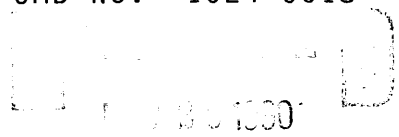

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The Albert Goodin House is a two-story brick, four bay, residence with a two-story rear ell built ca. 1835. The house was originally built in a hall-parlor plan but was remodeled in the late 19th century into a central passage plan residence. The house retains much of its original Federal influenced detailing and woodwork.

The house has a stone foundation, gable roof of asphalt shingles, three interior wall brick chimneys, and exterior wall surface of six-course common bond brick. This bond pattern is consistent on all facades with the exception of the main or east facade which is of Flemish bond. On the main facade is a two-story full width shed porch added ca. 1915 with tapered frame posts on brick piers. At the roofline of the porch attached to the columns are large brackets. This porch rests on a hollow core concrete foundation and has a concrete floor. A similar but smaller porch is located in the ell on the rear facade.

On the main facade are two primary entrances. The west door is an original five panel wood door with a fluted surround and bulls eye corner blocks. The east door is set within an entrance which appears to have either been added at this location or placed within an enlarged window opening in the mid-19th century. This entrance contains a ca. 1920 glass and wood door and above the door is an original two light transom. On the west and east facades of the ell are secondary entrances with original four panel wood design doors. Windows are ca. 1900 two-over-two rectangular wood sash and above the windows is original jack arching. A brick staircase on the rear facade leads to a cellar beneath the house.

The interior of the house retains much of its original detailing. Doors are original five panel design and have fluted surrounds and corner blocks. In the west pen on the first floor is a reeded Federal style mantle with sunburst designs. In the east pen on the first floor is also an original mantle with Doric motif pilasters. The central staircase appears to have been added in the late 19th century and has a milled newel post and square balusters.

The house is sited on a large farm in the western section of the county and faces the old Hodgenville and Elizabethtown Turnpike (Now KY 64). At the rear of the house is a ca. 1920 garage which is included as a non-contributing outbuilding. To the north of the house are modern outbuildings which are excluded from the property's boundary.

On the northwest face of the house, at the point where the chimney separates the upper slopes of the roof, are decorative patterns in the brick. These assume a lozenge form and are unusual features on houses in the region.

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PROPERTY TYPE: Rural Residence, 1820-1860

The Albert Goodin House is significant for its architectural design and as one of only four ante-bellum brick residences remaining in the county. The house was built ca. 1835 and despite alterations to the residence, it retains much of its original design and detailing.

This residence was built on lands which were originally owned by early settler Samuel Goodin. Samuel Goodin and his family settled along the Rolling Fork River on the western edge of Nelson County in 1779. In 1781, Goodin built a fort for families in the area which became known as Goodin's Fort. Goodin later purchased property in Larue County and moved to a "plantation" of over 1,000 acres by the early 1800s. Goodin died in 1807 and his son, Albert Gallatin Goodin, built this brick residence on the Goodin lands ca. 1835. Albert Goodin owned a large amount of land in this section of Larue County and had nine children. His son, John Weakley Goodin, was born in 1866 and inherited the land and house which belonged to his father. In 1900, John Goodin sold the house and eighty acres to George Smith and built a new residence on another section of his property. The house continues to be the center of a large farm in the northwestern section of the county.

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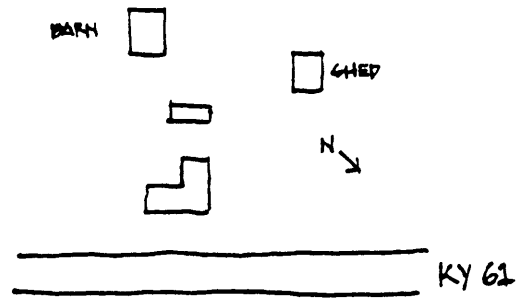
Verbal Boundary Description: The boundary for the Goodin House is shown as part of lot 16 on accompanying Larue County Tax Map 11. The property is bounded on the north by a driveway, on the east by the western right-of-way of KY 210, on the west by a fenceline, and on the south by a line which extends fifty feet from the south facade of the house.

Boundary Justification: The boundary for the Goodin House includes all property which presently remains from the house's period of significance. There are no associated outbuildings, structures, or sites associated with the property's period of significance and the boundary is drawn to exclude 20th century buildings to the west and north.

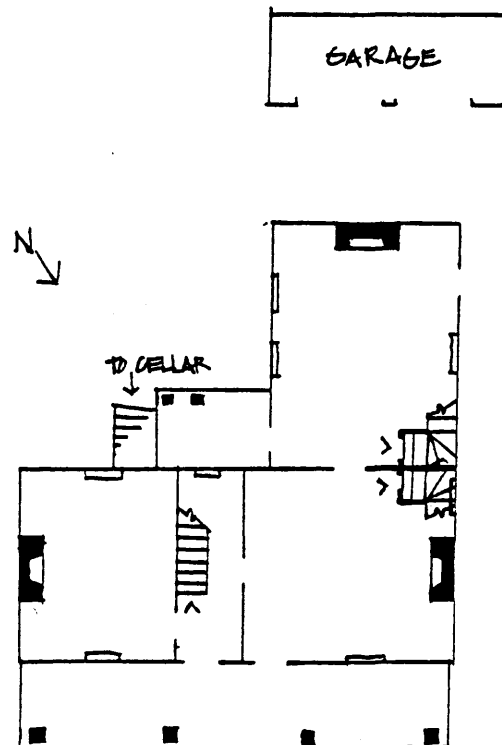
