Description of physical appearance & significant architectural features:

(Include additions, alterations, ancillary structures, and landscaping if applicable) The Clarkston Tithing Granary is a one story frame building with a gable roof and a shed roof porch on the south side. It is constructed in one of two major ways that granaries were typically built in Utah. Many granaries were built with a balloon frame that had an interior wall that served to form a crib for grain or corn storage, and occasionally had an exterior wall of drop siding. The Clarkston Tithing Granary by contrast was built of $2 \ge 4$ boards that rise in even rows, lap over one another and are spiked at the corners. This type of construction is referred to as false timbering, and was used in the construction of granaries in Utah between about 1890 and 1920. A door is centered on the broad side of the building, the south facade. Drop siding was used on each of the gable ends, and there is a door into the top half story of both gable end sections. A pulley above each of the doors served to haul up the material to be stored in the granary. The shed roof porch on the south side of the building was formed by extending the roof line, and it is supported by braces that are also constructed of stacked one inch boards. While the construction technique, false timbering, has been documented in other parts of the state, Panguitch for example, the rectangular form with its characteristic entrance on the broad side and shed roof porch, according to current surveys, is specific to the Cache Valley area. Granaries (See Continuation Sheet)

Statement of Historical Significance: Built c. 1905, the Clarkston Tithing Granary is historically significant as one of 28 well preserved tithing buildings in Utah that were part of the successful "in kind" tithing system of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (LDS or Mormon church) between the 1850s and about 1910. Tithing lots, which usually included an office and several auxiliary structures, were facilities for collecting, storing, and distributing the farm products that were donated as tithing by church members in the cash-poor agricultural communities throughout the state. Tithing offices were a vital part of almost every Mormon community, serving as local centers of trade, welfare assistance, and economic activity. They were also important as the basic units of the church-wide tithing network that was centered in Salt Lake City.

The Clarkston Tithing Granary was built c. 1905, probably at about the same time as the construction of the nearby tithing office, which was demolished in the late 1950s. This part of the block was owned by the LDS church and was used as the tithing lot where all the farm products that were donated as tithing were stored. This granary is the only building or structure that remains from the tithing yard. The tithing office, which was located on the corner to the west of the granary, was demolished around 1957, the scales for weighing wagons were removed at an unknown date, and corrals and other granaries that may have been part of the tithing lot are no longer there. A frame building in the center of the block behind this granary is reportedly the old Relief Society Granary. 1 During the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, the Relief Society, the women's organization of the LDS church, took upon themselves the responsibility for collecting and storing grain for emergency or welfare assistance. That program was separate and distinct from the tithing program, therefore that building and others like it around the state are not included in the Tithing Building Thematic Resources nomination. (See Continuation Sheet)

Clarkston Tithing Granary Description Continued:

in the southern part of the state which are built of false timbering construction are generally square with pyramid roofs. The Clarkston Tithing Granary was painted. It has received no major alterations, is in good condition, and therefore maintains its original integrity.

Clarkston Tithing Granary History Continued:

The design of the Clarkston Tithing Granary is a specific type of granary that is found in other northern Utah communities, especially in Cache Valley, but which was possibly a standard design approved and issued by the LDS church from its headquarters in Salt Lake City. Although no direct reference to the Clarkston Tithing Granary has been found in correspondence from the Presiding Bishopric's Office, which administered the tithing program, a letter pertaining to a granary of similar construction in Garland substantiates the assumption that this was a standard design. It included the following description:

> We prefer that you follow the granary plan sent you herewith, and known as granary No. 6, built of 2x4 lumber, spiked and set on three parallel foundation walls, which we find the best style of granary for tithing purposes."²

That description, though not very detailed, fits the Clarkston Tithing Granary, as well as the Lewiston Relief Society Granary, and is very similar to the Lewiston Tithing Granary. A number of other such granaries featuring walls made of 2x4s stacked on top of each other have been identified in farmyards in Lewiston and other northern Utah communities, indicating that it was a popular type whose origin was not solely the LDS church.

According to 36 CFR 60.14 (b), *Relocating properties listed in the National Register*, when a building listed in the register is proposed to be moved it must go through the required review and approval procedures for National Register nominations.

Description of Move

The Clarkston Tithing Granary (NRIS #85000250), located at 10212 N. 8700 West (local address aka, 94 S. 100 East), Clarkston, Utah, was listed in the National Register of Historic Places on January 25, 1985. The granary sits between two modern houses and faces south. The historic integrity of the site has been compromised because of the newer construction and does not retain the original agricultural appearance.

The granary will be moved to a donated piece of property in Clarkston, located at 90 W. Center Street—just a few blocks to the north and west of the current site. (See maps at end of document)

Reasons for move

The current owners plan to sell the parcel on which the granary and residence is located. They are donating the granary to the Martin Harris Chapter of the Daughters of the Utah Pioneers. Because they are not donating the land on which the building sits and because the building is deteriorating, it is important that the building be moved to another site before it further deteriorates or is possibly demolished. One side of the foundation has started to sink into the ground causing the structure to sit unevenly at one corner. Other than this, the granary is in good structural condition, both on the exterior and interior, with all walls and floor still intact.

Appropriateness of New Setting

As noted, the new site is not far from the original site. The setting will remain the same: a fairly flat topography in a mixed residential/agricultural setting that is typical of the rural landscape of northern Utah. The new setting will actually be more appropriate, as it is has better agricultural context, next to other historic agricultural and residential buildings. The original setting has seen encroachment from residential construction since the 1960s. (See photos at end of document)

Although the setting will remain consistent, the orientation of the building will change. The granary faces south on its current site. Once moved, the building will face north. It will retain roughly the same setback dimension from the street as it now does, however.

Effects of the Move on the Structure

The move and new location will have no significant effect on the integrity of the structure. It will be moved as a single structure, rather than being disassembled. The primary change will be to the foundation. It currently rests on a rubble stone foundation. Once moved the building will rest on a new foundation of rock-faced CMU. The height of the foundation will leave the bottom of the structure at a minimum six inches above grade.

Also, the granary has structural indications of a full-width loading dock/platform that ran along the front of the building below the projecting roof. A new platform will be constructed of rough-cut timber and wood planks once the building has been placed on the new foundation. This will aid in providing interpretation of the granary and how it was used. It will also provide accessibility to the interior which is intended to be used as a local history museum with artifacts from the granary's era.

Effects of the Move on Archeological or Historic Resources at New Location

There were no archeological or historic resources discovered at the new location. This property has been used for agricultural purposes many decades, so the ground has been previously disturbed. The new site is an open parcel of land with no former of existing buildings on it.

Impact on Historical Significance

Although the Clarkston Tithing Granary is both historically and architecturally significant, the move of the building to a new nearby site should not impact its significance. The building is one of only two Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints tithing granaries listed in the NRHP in Cache County (the Lewiston Tithing Office and Granary (NRIS #85000252) being the other). Most tithing facilities—especially agricultural buildings—in Utah have been lost over time, but the Clarkston Tithing Granary remains in very good condition and is an iconic building representing an important early religious/agricultural function in Utah's history.

The building will be moved to a new setting a few blocks from its current site. The setting will be almost exactly the same as its current location (except for building orientation), so the integrity will be retained. It will be placed on a concrete block foundation and retain the same elevation. But this will help protect the building and make it more useful as a potential museum. In this regard, the building should still be considered an eligible building and should retain National Register significance.

Thank you for your memo of May 3, 2018, regarding the proposed move of the Clarkston Tithing Granary in Cache County, Utah.

In accordance with Federal Regulations 36 CFR 60.14(b), the National Register approves the proposed move of the historic Clarkston Tithing Granary. Based on the information provided by your office and found in the original nomination file, the National Register has determined that the property will not suffer an appreciable loss of integrity as a result of the move.

The building's current site has lost integrity as a result of modern residential development and is threatened by potential redevelopment. The new site--located a short distance away and still within proximity to the historic "center" of the community, as was common for the property type-will provide a setting more compatible with the historic granary, on an open lot, amid more scattered period housing with agricultural outbuildings.
