This house, while having been altered through the years, still retains a sufficient amount of its original fabric that it should be recognized and retained. We are therefore including it for its architectural significance, for its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County area, and for its remaining historic fabric. As such, it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of ilistoric Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey.

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HISTORIC NAME: Peter D. Perry House
LOCATION:


This house was built c. 1792 by Peter D. Perry, when he married Margaret Jersey, on part of a tract set off to him by his father Daniel Perry, confirmed by will of 1820. Peter died in 1831 and left the property to his widow and three sons Daniel, Peter and John. John P. Perry inherited the house and nineteen acres in 1833, when his mother died. He married Priscilla Demarest and lived here until his death in 1876. The homestead was divided between his children John and Ellen. John J. lived here with his mother until she died in 1888 when he sold to James Duncan of New York City on May 22, 1889. He built greenhouses and ran a florist business which was assumed by Michael Baumann. The house was set off and sold to the present owners in 1965.

Peter's father Daniel acquired the land in 1767 from his father's estate and he lived here. The house site is unknown, but it might have been here. - CKT
