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7' DESCRIPTION

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Woodland Park District is located west of downtown St. Paul and just north of the Historic Hill District (listed in the National Register). It is roughly a rectangular area with boundaries at Dale Street to the west, Marshall Avenue to the north, and Arundel Street to the east. For the most part the southern boundary follows the southern property lines of residences south of Dayton Avenue. Near Kent Street, the boundary swings down to Selby Avenue to include four buildings. The major streets run east-west so that the majority of the buildings have a north-south axis.

The District is made up of 68 buildings constructed between 1880 and 1924. All but one of these is residential, the exception being the Dayton Avenue Presbyterian Church. Forty-eight percent of the extant buildings were built during the 1880s and only eight percent after 1910. Roughly thirty percent are either brick or stone with masonry bearing walls. The larger proportion, seventy percent, are of wood frame construction. Of these, sixty percent are sided in wood clapboard, twenty-four percent have been resided with asphalt or asbestos, and the remaining sixteen percent have been stuccoed. Twelve distinct styles can be recognized in the district, the predominant one being Queen Anne with more than one-fourth of the buildings in this category.

Marshall Avenue is a one-way street with traffic flow to the west. In 1971 houses on the north side of Marshall between Kent and Mackubin Streets were razed to make room for the construction of the Martin Luther King Center which now occupies the entire block. The Housing and Redevelopment Authority of St. Paul is presently planning to fill in the vacant lots on the north side of Marshall Avenue between Arundel Street and Mackubin Street with houses compatible with those across the street. The south side of Marshall Avenue between Dale and Arundel Streets remains residential with the majority of buildings constructed as single family dwellings.

Dayton Avenue is a one-way running east. The majority of buildings on this street were built as single family dwellings. There has recently been considerable interest in renovating and restoring structures along Dayton Avenue, especially at the node of Datyon Avenue and Kent Street.

Selby Avenue is a busy two-way thoroughfare with a high concentration of commercial buildings. The four buildings facing Selby which are included in the District are multiple-unit residential buildings.

The buildings in the Woodland Park District have been divided into four categories: (1) Pivotal buildings - those which are considered to be excellent examples of an architectural style between 1880 and 1910. (2) Supportive buildings - those which are contemporary in period and compatible in style but do not represent outstanding architecture. This category also includes buildings whose original integrity has been changed by alteration and/or or state of disrepair. (3) Non-contributive buildings - non-contemporary and not of similar size, mass, or materials. (4) Intrusion - a building which detracts from the overall historic character of the District.

These three nearly identical buildings were designed by Herman Kretz between 1894 and 1895 on the corner of Marshall Avenue and Arundel Street. They were designed as six-unit residences in the Richardsonian mode. Each has a rusticated front facade and and a three-storey wooden porch with columns and spindlework.

The Kenilworth is unique in having rounded corner bays rather than towers flanking the three-storey front porch. This building also differs from the others in the doorway detail where polished granite pilasters with carved sandstone capitals are found on each side of the entrance.

The rusticated front facade of the Lansmere features two rounded corner towers capped by a bracketted cornice with decorative frieze. The doorway to this building is situated under an arch which is supported by polished granite columns.

The Elmwood has two polygonal towers flanking the three-storey porch. In this building, polished granite columns support the entrance lintel.

Captain J.W. Jacobs House: 492 Marshall Avenue

This two and one half storey Queen Anne house was constructed in 1891 by J.H. Healy, a builder who specialized in catalogue designs. Half way up the side of the building runs a wide horizontal band of scalloped shingles. The shingle treatment is repeated in the front gable. The horseshoe shaped entrance portico supports an elaborately carved pediment. Curved brackets run under the eaves.

William Marshall House: 496 Marshall Avenue

This house immediately west of the Captain J.W. Jacobs House was also built in 1891 by J.H. Healy. Although not identical, the two houses share enough of the same detailing to be considered as twins. It is a Queen Anne of two and one half storeys which repeats the elevation of the Captain Jacobs House. Shingle banding can also be found in this building as can the shingled front gable. The most obvious repetition is the ornately carved pediment above the half-front porch. The house features a polygonal corner tower and a secondstorey spindlework portico. William Rainey Marshall was governor of Minnesota

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from 1866 to 1870. Prior to this he was in real estate and was the developer of Marshall Avenue as part of the Mackubin and Marshall's Addition to St. Paul in 1856. This house was built for him and was his last home in Minnesota before moving to California.

233-235 Mackubin Street, 237-239 Mackubin Street, 512-514 Marshall Avenue

These three Mission style buildings were built at the corner of Mackubin Street and Marshall Avenue between 1907 and 1908. They are of stucco with a polychrome banding of brick running around the base. Basically rectangular in plan, these two-unit buildings are identical except for the treatment of the front facades.

At 233-235 Mackubin Street, the two-storey enclosed front porch is punctuated by rectangular openings on both levels. A tile pent roof extends out from the front and sides of the lower level porch. The parapet and quatrefoil window reflect the Mission influence.

The building at 237-239 Mackubin Street has a two-storey enclosed porch with arched openings supported by squat columns on the first level. The floor of the second storey porch projects slightly outward to give the effect of a balcony. The columns employed here repeat the rhythm of the openings below. A parapet rises above the porch with a quatrefoil window.

At 512-514 Marshall Avenue, the two-storey front porch has rectangular openings on the first level with a tiled pent roof running the full length of the porch. Above is the second storey porch with arched openings. This building also has the Spanish Mission parapet with quatrefoil window.

D.W. Lawler House: 546 Marshall Avenue

Designed in 1889 by John H. Coxhead, this brick residence is an example of the Queen Anne style in its use of a variety of materials. It has a corner polygonal tower with windows linked by horizontal stone banding. The wooden front porch is broken into a one-storey section sheltering the entrance and a two-storey section with intricate spindlework. Scalloped shingles are found on the portico pediment and on the rounded front dormer. On the side of the building is a horseshoe shaped window at stairwell level. Daniel W. Lawler who built the house was mayor of St. Paul from 1908-1910.

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A: Bettingen House: 569 Marshall Avenue

This house was built in 1889 in the Queen Anne style. It features a corner tower with onion dome and finial. The tower is decorated with scalloped shingles and once rose above a first storey porch. Scalloped shingles can also be found in the front gable and in wide horizontal bands running along the sides of the building. A shell ornament is located above the middle gable window. The builder of this house, John H. Nickel, constructed a similar house immediately to the west.

L.J. Gates House: 573 Marshall Avenue

Built in 1889 by J.H. Nickel, this house reflects the same basic plan as the A. Bettingen House. It is a Queen Anne of two and one half storeys with a tower rising above the front porch. The tower is shingled and topped with an onion dome and finial. The projecting front gable is decorated with shingles and has a subsidiary gable with vertical siding and leaded glass windows.

F.T. Schroth House: 580 Marshall Avenue

The design of this Georgian Revival house built in 1909 is attributed to John Fischer. It is essentially a two and one half storey rectangular frame building faced in clapboard with a cross gable roof. The wrap-around porch has short fluted columns supported by square sandstone plinths. The gables are prominent and framed with heavy decorative modillions. Within the gables are Palladian windows. The original carriage barn is still extant.

Dayton Avenue Presbyterian Church: 217 Mackubin Street

The Dayton Avenue Presbyterian Church is located on the corner of Dayton Avenue and Mackubin Street. Designed in 1886 by Gilbert and Taylor, it is an excellent example of the Richardsonian style. It is built of rusticated sandstone in a cruciform plan with two cross gables and a corner tower. Entrance is through the stone archways of the two corner porticos. This arch pattern which consists of columns supporting a semi-circular arch is repeated in the openings of the bell tower. The tower has a copper capped spire and pinacles. The sanctuary of the church is unbroken by supporting pillars. It was designed to seat 850 people. The educational unit was added in 1911 after the plan was agreed to by Cass Gilbert. This addition incorporated half-timbering and the same rusticated sandstone as found in the church.

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J.W. Bishop House: 193 Mackubin Street

The Bishop House is the only example of the French Second Empire style in the District. It is located on the corner of Mackubin Street and Dayton Avenue. Although unrestored at this time and missing the original front porch, it still retains much of its original character. It is a two and one half storey frame building with mansard roof. Special features include carved front doors and stained glass in two of the bays. The window surrounds are ornately carved and include decorative friezes above the windows. Carved pediments top the dormers. The roof line is accented with bracketing and a decorative frieze. Also intact is the front section of the original limestone fence which once surrounded the property. Constructed in 1882, it is the oldest documented building in the District. It was built by General Judson Wade Bishop who fought with Ulysses S. Grant in the Battle of Missionary Ridge in 1863.

Woodland Terrace: 550-556 Dayton Avenue

This Richardsonian eclectic rowhouse was designed by B.J. Buechner in 1888 and has recently been restored. It is a three-storey brick building containing five units, one of which takes in the corner tower and faces onto Kent Street. The Dayton Avenue facade is given vertical emphasis by the use of recessed entrance ways and second storey porches. The building is noteworthy in its use of materials. Cast iron ornamentation decorates the many gables and cupolas, and the brickwork itself is patterned, especially at the third storey. Stone banding runs across the building and ties it together horizontally. The roof is of slate.

James W. Lusk House: 557 Dayton Avenue

This house designed by D.W. Milland is an excellently restored Stick style house. Built in 1884 the two and one half storey building is of irregular plan. The decoration is provided by banding which frames and links the windows horizontally. The wrap-around porch exhibits sawed ornamentation and latticework. Above the decorated porch pediment rises a second storey spindlework porch. The original carriage house is presently being restored.

Philip Reilly House: 565 Dayton Avenue

The Philip Reilly House, built prior to 1885, combines Italianate massing with Eastlake decoration. It has recently been restored and features a wraparound porch with spindlework and sawed ornamentation. Curved brackets decorate the eaves, and the front gable features a decorated bargeboard with a pendant truss. The truncated hip roof is topped by finials.

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Dayton Avenue Rowhouse: 568-574 Dayton Avenue

Designed in 1904 by Louis Lockwood, this two and one half storey fourunit brick rowhouse has recently been rehabilitated. It provides a good example of a rowhouse in the Georgian Revival mode. The building plan is symmetrical with two cross gables at either end of the roof and pedimented dormers in between. The cross gables feature broken pediments within which lie three round-headed windows accented by keystones. Stone lintels define the door and window openings.

Adolph Rank House: 606 Dayton Avenue

The Adolph Rank House was built prior to 1885 in the Stick style. The plan is irregular featuring a square tower with pyramidal roof. Horizontal and vertical banding emphasize the window areas, the gables, and the corners of the building. Diagonal stick can be found in the front and the side gables. Classical detailing is expressed in the decorative frieze on tower and porch as well as the porch columns and broken pediment of the front window.

Adolph Kalman House: 611 Dayton Avenue

This two and one half storey brick building was designed in the Richardsonian style in 1890 by William Thomas. Stone banding and lintels define the window areas. The porch features two archways. Patterned brickwork is found on the parapeted front gable and decorates the porch and bay. A three-storey side tower is capped by a conical roof. The house retains its original brick carriage house.

Selby Place: 551-553 Selby Avenue

This four-unit Stick style rowhouse exhibits a symmetrical plan. The centrally placed wooden porch is flanked on either side by a two-storey bay. The horizontal and vertical banding define the bays, gables and dormer, and also the corners of the building. The bracketing found under the eaves emphasizes the window placement. It is also used above the porch and lower bay windows. The building was constructed in 1887 and is now being restored.

Kent Square: 555 Selby Avenue

This 1885 brick Queen Anne has recently been restored. It is a double house which occupies a corner lot. The two facades facing the street feature spindlework porches, a two-storey corner bay with second storey porch, and bracketing under the eaves and across the gables. The gables themselves are decorated with scallopped shingles.

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Trott/Birch House: 579-581 Selby Avenue

Designed by Herman Kretz and Company in 1890, this house is the only one in the District employing Chateauesque detailing. It is a double house of symmetrical plan. Executed in red brick, this building rises three and one half storeys and is capped by a steep truncated intersecting hip roof of slate. The verticality of the building is emphasized by the dormers which are placed directly above the windows of the lower floors. The finials of the dormer gables further suggest verticality. Basket-arch hood molds can be found over the first and third storey windows.

8 SIGNIFICANCE

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Woodland Park District is significant in its representation of the major architectural styles in vogue in Minnesota between 1880 and 1910. Twelve distinct styles can be recognized in the buildings of the District, some having been executed by prominent local architects and others by catalogue builders.

The Woodland Park District is made up of the Selby, McClung, and Vanmeter's Addition (1857) and portions of the Mackubin and Marshall's Addition (1855) and the Woodland Park Addition (1870). These first two additions were platted early in the history of the city of St. Paul when speculation in real estate was at its peak. This period was followed by the panic of 1857 and depressed real estate value. It was not until after the Civil War when the money market was easy and the railroads were being built that people began moving into the District in any numbers.

As the city of St. Paul grew, the population pushed up St. Anthony Hill, the river bluff upon which the District is located. Certain areas along the edge of the bluff, namely Summit Avenue, were considered very fashionable ever since Henry Rice, one of St. Paul's leading citizens, built his home there in 1870.

The eastern end of Dayton Avenue where it met Summit also attracted many prominent St. Paul families. It had had some notable residents even before the Civil War, but with the economic boom of the 1870s, many of the city's wealthy built large homes in the area. It was only a matter of time until the population expanded further westward, especially down Dayton Avenue. The Woodland Park Addition was bought at this time for \$9,000, platted and sold five months later for \$20,000.

Whereas the wealthy and prominent lived on or near Summit Avenue, the Woodland Park District attracted professional people, owners of small businesses, clerks, and skilled laborers. One of the first residents was Edward Webb, a lawyer who built at 482 Marshall Avenue in 1867 and lived there until 1890. The house has since been razed. John M. Carlson, the building contractor who built the second State Capitol, was another early resident of the area. In 1871 he built a home for himself at 486 Dayton Avenue which is no longer extant. He later built four other houses across the street on the north side of Dayton Avenue which are still standing.

Another early property to be acquired in the District was the lot on the northwest corner of Mackubin Street and Dayton Avenue. This was purchased in 1871 by the Presbyterian Churches of St. Paul for the purpose of establishing a Mission Sunday School and Church on St. Anthony Hill. The church fathers had assumed correctly that the city would expand into this area and that there would be a need for a church. It was to be the first church of any denomination to be built on the Hill. A wooden structure was completed in 1873 and replaced in 1886 by the present sandstone structure.

In 1882 General Judson Wade Bishop acquired six lots and built a large home which still stands on the corner of Dayton Avenue and Mackubin Street. General Bishop, a veteran of the Civil War, engaged in railroad construction and later was the president of the St. Paul Trust Company. By 1885 when the Hopkins Insurance Atlas was printed, there were 44 residences within the District, 18 of which are still extant. This was the year that the District saw its greatest building boom.

Settlement and building in the area continued through the turn of the century, slowing during the Depression years of 1893-1897 and all but stopping in 1910 for lack of vacant land. The Great Depression of the 1930s changed the life style of many families in the District. Because of the financial situation, some people had to share their living space with other families and some houses stood vacant.

Following World War II there was an acute housing shortage, and many houses in the area were divided up into smaller units to accommodate the growing population of the city. Rapidly growing suburbs also attracted many people. These factors caused a rapid turnover of people and homes which resulted in an unstable community. Because a single family home suddenly became a cut up residence, people who had once known their neighbors no longer knew who lived next door.

During the 1950s and 60s, some large family houses were being abandoned because few people were interested or able to maintain them as single family residences. Some of the subdivided homes served as boarding houses or multiple-family dwellings. Organizations looking for community based centers purchased several large homes.

The introduction of urban renewal and the construction of Interstate 94 in the 1960s further changed the physical, social, and economic character of the area. It was in response to these conditions in the late 1960s and early 1970s that organizations within the general area were created for the purpose of restoring homes and stabilizing the area. Since 1975 alone, eleven buildings in the District have undergone restoration or rehabilitation.

Therefore, it is not appropriate to hold an on-site inspection, per se, until we have the information upon which to offer our comments.

The Council, however, is willing to attend an information gathering session in St. Paul to give the city guidance in making its determination of effect (Part 800.4(b) of the Procedures) and preparing a preliminary case report. Due to the extenuating circumstances surrounding this case, we will be willing to meet as soon as possible; however, it must be made clear that this is outside of the normal review process established in our Procedures, and that no final comments can be forthcoming from the Council in advance of a preliminary case report.

Dear Mr. Young:

Your "Historic Preservation Certification Application," Parts 1 and 2 was received on July 29, 1983. This office has determined that the property listed above contributes to the historic significance of the Woodland Park Historic District.

If subject to depreciation under section 167 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, this property qualifies as a "certified historic structure" for purposes of the Tax Reform Act of 1976 and the Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981.

We have reviewed Part 2 of the application for the structure listed above and have determined that the rehabilitation does not meet the Secretary of the Interior's "Standards for Rehabilitation." Specifically, the rehabilitation is not in conformance with Standards: 2, 3, and 6.

The change in the historic dormers' configuration and materials, and the addition of two inappropriate dormers altered the building's historic appearance. The existing dormers, one on the south and one on the east, had hip roofs, three double-hung windows each, and were sided with painted wood shingles. Rehabilitation of these dormers introduced a new appearance the building never had, by changing the roofs from hips to gables, installing palladian windows with casement windows, and using unpainted wood lap siding.

The two new dormers on the west elevation continued the use of inappropriate detailing, with gable roofs, palladian windows, and unpainted siding.

Photographs of the north elevation were unavailable for review, but the use of new unpainted wood lap siding in the gable end is unacceptable. Unpainted exterior wood was not historically used in this district. Also, the plans of the existing building and the photographs taken after the work was finished show that one window in the gable end of the north elevation was removed, and new siding obscures the fact that the window ever existed. We have enclosed for your information a copy of the U.S. Department of the Interior regulations which outline (on the last page) the process for appealing this decision. Should you wish to enter an appeal, your letter to the Preservation Assistance Division, National Park Service, Washington D.C. should address the concerns raised in our letter, including any additional factors related to the project that you feel deserve consideration.

We received your letter dated September 2, 1983, with disappointment and wish to bring to your attention some relevant facts regarding the rehabilitation of our home.

It has always been our intention from a professional and civic point of view to have our residence in this historic district which members of the firm of Lilyholm, Young and Gleeson work so diligently to create. For this reason when the opportunity arose to purchase this house from the City of St. Paul and rehabilitate it to the standards required, we welcomed the opportunity with enthusiasm and thoroughly investigated all the implications and requirements of the national, state and local standards in place at that time regarding certification for historic structure.

This home was completed prior to the Tax Treatment Extension Act of 1980. The plans prepared for the rehabilitation and the actual construction were approved and monitored by the appropriate agencies including the Minnesota Historical Society and various departments of the City of St. Paul. We assumed at that time, because of the implications and the interfacing of the programs with the various Federal acts that our investment would be appropriately protected to receive the benefits of any tax laws with respect to historic preservation as this was essential to our being able to achieve this objective financially.

Let us refer you again to our statements with respect to the history and goals outlined in our original application in that we were actively involved since the mid 1970s in preserving this house in its immediate environment during the rehabilitation in these few blocks of the district. We were able to achieve our objectives and the objectives of the City and the State Historical Society through the use of the "312 Program" and the "5-Year Property Tax Relief Program" which dovetailed with our income level and this firm's expertise in renovation. All the approvals required by the State Historical Society and the City of St. Paul were received with respect to this district.

We are prepared to paint the unpainted wood lap siding as outlined in your letter with the understanding that the original home was painted pink due to the unusual pink hues of the brick. Pink, being the only appropriate color with this brick left me with one alternative - the natural color of sealed redwood. I, along with Charles Nelson of the Minnesota Historical Society, have reviewed the present materials and our conclusion is that it is appropriate as is. I feel that the other items mentioned in your letter do not justify a denial in that in our professional judgment they perform corrective and enhancing elements in character with its style of architecture and quite in keeping with the house and its immediate neighborhood. The changes in the dormers were necessitated due to structural deficiency in the original design which could not be corrected effectively without compromising the interior structure.

It seems unfortunate that we are being penalized in retrospect of the changing tax laws and since some of the issues would appear to be professional judgments it is our desire to appeal the denial as outlined in your letter of September 2, 1983.

To that end we are sending a copy of this letter together with a copy of your letter to the Director of Heritage Conservation and Recreation Service, U. S. Department of Interior, 440 G St., N.W., Washington, D.C. 20243, as required for the appeal process.

We are transmitting the above cited tax project file as requested. Since the owner has requested an appeal hearing of our denial of his "Request for Certification of Rehabilitation," we would like to address specific points concerning the denial.

The rehabilitation work on this building was completed prior to our receipt and review of Part 2 of the "Historic Preservation Certification Application." The property owner worked with local review commissions and the Minnesota State Historical Society, but did not submit a request for preliminary certification to the National Park Service.

It is our opinion that the change in the dormer configuration, from a hip roof to a gable roof, and the change in dormer windows, from three double-hung windows per dormer to "Palladian" windows with a fixed canter pane of glass flanked by casement windows, drastically alters the building's appearance. Although gabled dormers and "Palladian" windows may exist within the Woodland Park Historic District, the district in which the building is located, this building clearly did not have either of these features. In addition, the use of casement windows of the type installed in the dormers apparently has no historical precedent within the district.

The alteration of the existing dormers included the removal of painted wood shingle siding and replacement with wood lap siding with a natural finish. Although lap siding is commonly found in the district, the building did not have this type of siding. Also, unpainted wood is not historically found within the district.

The owner did not provide "before" photos of the north (rear) elevation, therefore, it is difficult to evaluate changes to that elevation. However, from the floor plans it appears that one window was removed and obscured by siding.

Two dormers were added to the west side elevation. These dormers have the same inappropriate detailing as the altered existing dormers. These new dormers further change the building's highly visible roof, thereby changing the building's overall appearance.

Because of the cumulative effect of these changes, we feel the project should be denied.

STAFF COMMENTS:

The National Register nomination recorded the historic name for the property at 579-581 Selby Avenue as the Trott/Birch House (Section 7, page 6). Additional research conducted for the Historic Preservation Certification Application Part 1- Evaluation of Significance, reveals that the building was designed and construction by local architect/building Herman Krentz for Charles Otis who operated the property as a boarding house during the period of significance. Therefore a more appropriate historic name for the property is the Boarding House.
