DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The original Biggin Church was probably completed ca. 1711. The structure burned ca. 1755, and another church was built soon thereafter. This church was damaged by fire by British troops during the American Revolution but was repaired. The structure was burned again in the late 1800s. For years the ruins served as a local brickyard for the area. This practice has ceased since the graveyard is again being used.

The church was a small brick structure, measuring approximately 30' x 60'. The brickwork was executed in English bond, although repair work was apparently executed in miscellaneous bonding.

At the present time only portions of two walls remain. One wall was the end of the building and featured one window on each side of a door. The other wall was apparently the main entrance facade. One large portal with a Gibbs surround is flanked by two windows on the left. (Two windows were also located to the right.) All the windows are arched and feature radiating brick voussoirs.

Quoins are located at the corner of the structure, and a water table was executed with rounded bricks.

<u>Surroundings</u>: The church is located amidst an early graveyard. This cemetery is again being used.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Biggin Church Ruins are the remains of the parish church of St. John's Parish, Berkeley. The church was established by an act of the South Carolina Commons House of Assembly in 1706 which divided the colony into ten parishes. Despite calamities throughout its history, Biggin Church was used through the mid-19th Century. The surrounding cemetery is still being used.

In 1712 the Honorable John Colleton gave three acres for the site of the parish church; however, according to Frederick Dalcho's <u>Historical Account of the Protestant</u> <u>Episcopal Church in South Carolina</u> (1820), Biggin Church was completed in 1711, just five years after the parish of St, John's Berkeley was created. In 1756, a petition was presented to the Commons House of Assembly requesting that a new church be built to replace the church that had lately burned. This request was approved.

During the American Revolution, ammunitions were stored in the church by British troops who,upon leaving,set the church on fire. According to Dalcho, the church was repaired shortly thereafter.

During the War Between the States, the church was again damaged. According to a report made in 1868,

Previous to the war no Parish in the Diocese was better prepared to take care of its clergyman. It owned a rice plantation which rented for twelve hundred, sometimes for fifteen hundred dollars per annum, and about ten thousand dollars in stocks. It owned a winter parsonage and a summer residence for its ministers, in a healthy position. But almost all this has gone, Biggin Church was much injured and its walls defaced; all the pews, the desk and chancel rails were torn down and burnt. The congregation is not revived, except by a monthly service.<sup>1</sup>

The church was again burned in the late 1800s. It has not been rebuilt since that time. Although only portions of two walls remain, there is evidence that originally Biggin Church was designed with a degree of sophistication. Notable architectural details which remain include a Gibbs surround at the main portal, quoins at the corner, radiating voussoirs over the windows, and a rounded water table--all executed in brick.
