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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Blazo-Leavitt House of Parsonsfield, Maine, built between 1812 and 1817, is a very fine rural example of a Federal style residence.

The two-story house is of frame (post-and-beam) construction, with hipped roof of very low pitch, four large internal end chimneys (and one in the ell), clapboard siding, and granite foundation.

The facade, which faces south, is five bays wide with a central entrance. This entrance consists of a single door flanked by sidelights and surmounted by a fanlight—all with elaborate tracery. The central bay in the second story is a fine Palladian window. Fenestration on the facade, as elsewhere, is 9/6.

A secondary facade faces east and is equivalent to the south elevation, save that it lacks the Palladian window.

A two-story ell runs from the north (rear) side of the house; this is three bays long with an entrance facing east. Beyond the ell is a long attached carriage house with a pair of large doors beneath an arch and an additional barn door beyond to the north.

The interior of the Blazo-Leavitt house is distinguished by particularly fine woodwork and features intersecting central hallways with arched ceilings.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

This handsome, beautifully finished Federal house was built by Daniel Blazo, son of Amos Blazo, a shipbuilder and merchant from Portsmouth, New Hampshire, who moved to Parsonsfield in 1778. His father, another Amos Blazo, was a Huguenot who emigrated from Bordeaux, France, in 1738.

One of the finest houses of the period in the region, this structure is noted for its woodwork performed, it is believed, by ship's carpenters left unemployed in Portsmouth by the Embargo.

A granddaughter of Daniel married John G. Leavitt, also from an old family, whose grandson, John Greenleaf Leavitt, a distinguished naturalist at Harvard University, was the last of the family to occupy the house.
