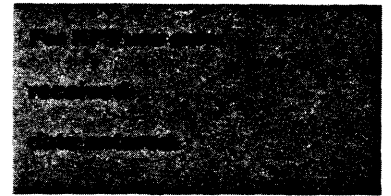

FOUNTAIN SQUARE COMMERCIAL AREA: Laurel and Prospect District

The intersection of Laurel and Prospect Streets currently contains three buildings, all of which are contributing. Except for the addition to 1335-39 East Prospect Street, the buildings were constructed during the 19th century and before the street railway was extended along Prospect Street to State Avenue. 1413 East Prospect Street was one of the first buildings to be constructed and is the most architecturally significant of the group. Historically the intersection had commercial buildings at all four corners, but recent construction has led to the demolition of the buildings on the north side of Prospect Street.

These buildings represent some of the earliest commercial ventures along Prospect Street east of the main intersection. Used primarily as groceries, bakeries and saloons, these buildings served the adjacent neighborhood. Location along Prospect provided easy access to transportation and delivery of wholesale goods. The buildings were also built and operated by persons of German heritage.
