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Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Fire Station #12 was constructed c. 1926-1927 in the Tudor Revival style in the suburban community of Woodlawn. The fire station is an L-shaped masonry building with a two-story residential section with a high hipped roof with multiple dormers and a one-story garage wing with a double gabled roof. Located at the intersection of the two wings is a two-storied tower with a conical shaped roof. The main pedestrian entrance is a small arched opening in the tower, while the double garage entrance is located on the side elevation. There is a chimney covered with stucco with a stone cap.

The tower features three original wood framed windows with staggered placement: two show 2-over-2-over-2 panes; the other is a smaller 2-over-2 pane. There are sets of four wood window frames on each story of the office section of the building, and three single windows on the garage section of the building.

The Tudor Revival influences of the building include: the asymmetrical facade with a dominant tower; the polychromatic mixture of stone, brick and stucco; extensive use of stone for the lintels, chimney cap, and door surround; the wide, rounded garage openings highlighted by a thick band of stone; and the use of multiple bands of windows.

#### INTERIOR:

The interior has plaster walls and ceilings, wood trim and arched entrances in the second floor residential area, as well as the first floor garage. The original fire pole remains. The garage has its original concrete flooring with brick walls and columns, and an arched entrance.

#### INTEGRITY:

The building has retained its original integrity as an early twentieth- century fire station. The building has retained its original wood window frames, original garage doors, and original downspouts and drains. Interior modernization includes c.1920 linoleum flooring and dropped ceiling. The building remains in use as a fire station.

### CRITERION C: ARCHITECTURE

Built in c. 1926-1927, Fire Station #12 is architecturally significant as the best remaining fire station with Tudor Revival influences, and is one of the best examples of the suburban stations built in the late 1920s. Built in the mid-to-late twenties, it is a fine example of the station type constructed in Birmingham's suburbs. It has a strong residential character prominent for this style of fire stations, and is one of the finest works of architecture of all of the extant fire stations in Birmingham. It is one of only two remaining stations appointed with quarried stone; and is one of five adorned with tower. Unlike nearly all of the other fire stations, it does not occupy a corner lot; rather, it sits next to an alley and its garages have direct access onto 57th Street South while its primary facade sits back from Woodlawn's primary thoroughfare, lst Avenue South.

### CRITERION A: COMMUNITY PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

Fire Station #12 is locally significant as one of the best examples of Woodlawn's community development which planned its commercial areas, public and governmental structures, and residential enclaves as a cohesive unit. Built during the same period of much of Woodlawn's commercial and residential development, it remains important as part of the area's growth as a municipality. It is only a few blocks from Woodlawn City Hall which also fronts lst Avenue South and is situated just off the main commercial strip of lst Avenue (Woodlawn City Hall NRHP 6-30-88).
