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#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Southwestern Bell Telephone Building is a detached commercial structure with one story and a raised basement floor. It is approximately 50' x 65' with a parapeted flat roof and buff brick wall finish laid in the common bond.

Front, or south side, raised basement portion has one opening with louvered metal cover and three 3/3 double-hung metal windows. First story contains four 6/6 double-hung metal windows and metal double door front entrance topped with a six pane transom. Above entry doors is a louvered aluminum vent.

The raised basement of west side consists of four 3/3 double-hung metal windows and the first floor has seven 6/6 double-hung metal windows.

Rear, or north side, openings consist of two metal panel doors leading to basement floor and one metal panel door in first floor. There are also three 6/6 double-hung metal windows in first story. Two outside stairs are located in rear, one to basement and the other to the first floor. Both have metal pipe handrails.

Decorative features include several Art Deco elements. Twenty-three wall pilasters separate openings on all sides (eight on east, five on west, four on rear, and six on front). Sixteen of these wall pilasters extend above the terra cotta cornice giving an overall vertical emphasis to the building. Accentuating the verticality of the building is a square-shaped tower on the northeast corner. Each of the sixteen extended pilasters are topped with stepped crowns featuring floriated and fluted terra cotta ornamentation. The transomed double door entry is surrounded with terra cotta elements in geometric, floriated, and fluted designs. Further Art Deco features consist of numerous metal sash-type windows in straight-headed openings, floriated terra cotta spandrel-like elements above and below first floor windows, limestone belt course delineating the two floors on east, south, and part of the west walls, and limestone slip sills and brick soldier-coursed lintels.

Alterations are minimal and all have been completed in the last ten years. Aluminum storm screens have been placed over first story windows, an aluminum vent replacement over entry doors, and brick walls in rear and approximately two-thirds of west wall have been painted white.

The building currently serves as a telephone switching station and has remained in the ownership of Bell Telephone Company for more than 56 years.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Southwestern Bell Telephone Company Building is architecturally significant because it is the only Art Deco style structure in Stroud.

Constructed in 1929, the nominated property reflects the verticality and decorative motifs of the Art Deco vocabulary, commonly used on commercial buildings in the 1920s. Twenty-three wall pilasters lend vertical emphasis to the building, sixteen of which are topped with stepped crowns featuring floriated and fluted terra cotta ornamentation. These projections as well as a square-shaped tower on the northeast corner and long rectangular-shaped, straight-headed openings enhance its verticality.

Highlighting the double door entrance is the low-relief terra cotta ornamentation in various geometric, floriated, and fluted motifs. Additional Art Deco features consist of the floriated terra cotta spandrel-like elements above and below first floor windows and numerous metal sash-type windows.

Although modest in Art Deco detailing, the Southwestern Bell Telephone Building has retained its architectural integrity for more than 56 years and stands as the only Art Deco building in this small Oklahoma community.
