DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The three-story, fourteen-room brick Dodge House was built in 1869 at a cost of \$35,000. The architect was W. W. Boyington of Chicago. The mansard roof is pierced by four chimneys. A short flight of steps leads from a brick patio and ornate iron foundation through double black walnut doors into a spacious hall. Black walnut woodwork is featured throughout the house, along with stucco medallions, bronze hinges with silver butts, and many family or contemporary pieces.

Most of the alterations in the original design of the house were made in 1907-08, when Dodge retired from business and returned to live permanently in Council Bluffs. The original Victorian porch, which had run along the west side of the building, was replaced by a much more imposing porch. It ran along both the west and north sides, featuring wooden columns with arches between the corner columns on a solid, low brick railing. The porch floor was red tile and the metal roof had wood wainscoting underneath.

On the south side of the house, the back porch was removed and the present screen-enclosed porch was installed with a sleeping porch above for the second floor bedroom. Another sleeping porch was built above the solarium, also on the south face of the home. New maple floors were installed in the entrance hall, library and dining room which still remain.

In 1950 the Dodge family sold the home and it became an apartment house for thirteen years. In 1963 the City of Council Bluffs purchased the building and began restoration. Minor interior alterations were corrected and the whole restored to the period of Dodge's occupancy. A brick floor in the basement and a brick patio with iron foundation on the lawn are the two non-historic additions. The Dodge carriage house, built in 1871, is still standing and in use as a garage and custodian's residence. It and the third floor of the Dodge House are unrestored. In a more recent structure is a dilapidated garage, due to be removed shortly. The entire Dodge House property consists of about four acres extending east into the bluffs. Except for a small lawn and brick patio, it is given over entirely to natural vegetation.

1869-1916 (Period of occupancy) STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Grenville M. Dodge was the chief engineer of the Union Pacific Railroad, 1866-1869. More than any other single man, Dodge was responsible for completing the first transcontinental railroad in 1869. That same year he completed work on his Council Bluffs home, which remained his until his death in 1916.

Biography

Grenville M. Dodge was born in 1831 and began his involvement with railroads at the age of twenty. In 1861 he volunteered his services to the Union Army and distinguished himself as a field commander. It was as an engineer that he proved most valuable, however; in three days he built a bridge 14 feet high and 710 feet long across the Chattahoochee River. His skill in building bridges and replacing Confederate—with Union—gauge railroad kept Sherman's huge army supplied during its epic march to the sea, and effectively cut off the Confederate armies from their supply centers.

Dodge left the army in May 1866 as a Major-General. He immediately entered upon his duties as chief engineer of the Union Pacific Railroad. On May 10, 1869, the first transcontinental railroad was completed. In one year 568 miles of road were located, built, and equipped. The completion of this stupendous project was the fulfillment of the great ambition of Dodge's life. Throughout his life his surveys alone totalled over 60,000 miles. For half a century he was active as projector, builder, financier and director of railroads in the West and Southwest and was called by some the ablest railroad lobbyist of his time. Certainly, he was one of the greatest builders.

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The Dodge house is located on the Southeast corner of Third and Story Streets. At the intersection of the eastern curb of Third Street with the southern curb of Story Street, proceed east for 400° to the top of the bluffs; thence 200° southerly to a point; thence west for 400° to the eastern curb of Third Street; thence proceed northerly along the eastern curb to the point of origin. This boundary encloses the house within the original lot.
