DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Old Gaol at York, Maine is a large, striking, one-and-a-half storey gambrel-roofed structure atop a rocky hillock, and is composed of an original stone cell to which was subsequently added wooden sections. The building was erected in four distinct building programs:

1) A single-room stone cell about 1720, now referred to as the "dungeon". Its two-and-a-half foot thick stone walls are lined with vertical and horizontal oak planking on the interior, while the exterior is coursed dressed rubble.

2) c. 1736: The kitchen, the wooden dining room (probably originally a parlor), and a part of the cellar, as well as a pair of rooms to the south, which have adjoining corner fireplaces and a panel partition. The latter is constructed in such a way that it hinges at the ceiling so that it can be swung up to convert the two rooms into one larger one. This panel was added in the 1890's when the building was used as a school.

3) c. 1763: The gambrel roof and the upper floor with its three additional cells and a central room. The southernmost of the three cells is rather comfortable, and speculation has been that this room was used as a debtor's cell.

4) 1799-1806: The second stone cell on the first floor at the former date, as well as the dining room and bedroom on the upper floor, and the small parlor for the gaoler at the latter date in a small addition at the southeast end of the building.

The overall condition of the 76' x 38' gaol is excellent. Its mortised and tenoned post and girt frame supports a broad gambrel roof, covered today with composition shingles, and a modified "salt-box" gable roof over the 1806 southeast addition. Two dormers with shed roofs, on the east side interrupt the gambrel, as well as two large brick chimneys straddling the gambrel's ridge. A third, small, square, brick, chimney services the southeastern 1806 addition.

Aside from the stone section of the building laid in coursed dressed rubble (west wall), the rest is composed of clapboards of varying widths with lapped joints. There are two entrances, both from the east, each doorway there having a plain architrave. Windows throughout the building have wooden double-hung sash, with various muntin patterns, and all are without shutters.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Old Gaol at York Maine is an excellently preserved and rare example of a substantial colonial prison building. Constructed in four distinct building programs between 1720 and 1806, the structure has been altered very little and clearly illustrates the atmosphere of a type of building that few people ever see, particularly the interior.

Each stage of growth can be traced, from the earliest 1720 stone cell to the 1806 parlor for the gaoler. Begun about 1720, The Old Gaol served its incarceration function for over a century-and-a-half, until at least 1879. Although not the first gaol built in Maine, it served all of the Province until 1760, and continued in service to the town for another century. Altering its function to some degree at least, the building served as a schoolhouse during the 1890's, and in 1900, at the instigation of William Dean Howells, came to be used as a museum when a long term lease was obtained by the Gaol Committee of the Old York Improvement Society, and The Society for the Preservation of Historic Landmarks. The Gaol is still administered by this committee, which keeps it excellently maintained and regularly open to the public.

The cellar of the Old York Gaol has been gradually filled in, and no longer exists. Finally, one should note that many of the gaol's original fittings survive, and add to the genuine atmosphere of one of the oldest of the few surviving colonial gaols. Its hinges, pintles, bolts, latches, and locks, are all period reminders of the century and a half when this building served as an important colonial "house of correction." CONTINUATION SHEET

The Old York Gaol and its "yard" occupy about 1/4 to 1/2 acre at the southeast corner of the junction of Maine Street and Lindsay Road in the town of York. Happily, in 1770 the Court of General Sessions of the peace, meeting at York on July 10, moved that a committee be appointed to fix and ascertain the limits of the prison, and pursuant to that motion, a verbal description of the boundary of the gaol soon followed. A copy of the transcript of that definition is enclosed with this form and should serve to define precisely what will now be outlined approximately.

The Old York Gaol surmounts a hillock at the junction already mentioned. The northern limit of the property is U.S. Route 1A, Maine Street. The western limit is Lindsay Road. At the back of the gaol (the south side) near a point in Lindsay Road, is a stone marker, a remnant of an old stone wall. This may be seen in one of the official photographs along with this form, and is the same stone marker mentioned in the boundary specified in 1770. It is from this point that the southern and eastern limits of the property were and are, measured. Behind the gaol is a small woodlot separating it from the next most northerly house on Lindsay Road. East of the property is the York Hospital, the nearest evidence of which is a paved parking lot adjacent to the gaol property. A building stands adjacent to the property at the northern edge of that eastern limit. The barn and the barber shop mentioned in the 1770 description have disappeared from where they once stood near the stone wall on Lindsay Road, and the only other building on the site is a modern wooden outhouse just southeast of the gaol, for the use of the many tourists who visit the gaol each year.

Pursuant to the foregoing direction & Appointment We have Viewed & Measured the Ground Contiguous & Adjoin--ing to the Goal in York & unanimously agree to Repott that the Limits & Bounds of the Said Goal Yard be as follows Viz^t Beginning at the Northerly Corner of the Stone Wall on the South West Side of the Country Road lead--ing from the Court House in York to Wells which Corner is opposite to the Garden of the late Doct.^r Alexander Bulman deceased & from the Corner of the Said Stone Wall to run North Seventy Degrees West by the Nedle Six Rods and Six Links to a Stone Set into the Ground then South Sixty Six degrees West three rods & fifteen Links to a ledge or Flatt Rock Marked with the Letter.Y. then South Thirty Seven Degrees

West Six Rods & Eight Lincks to a Corner of the Stone wall being the Northwest Corner of Lands Now imporved by Moses Safford. Then South Fifty Degrees East by Lands Improv--ed by Said Safford Six Rods & thirteen Links to Lands heretofore Alexander Bulman's Deceased then North East or thereabouts as the Goal Yeard & fence Adjoining thereto now Stands to the Corner of the Stone Wall first Mentioned within which Limits & Bounds are Included the Goal a Small Barn

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Barn now Improv.^d by the present Goaler Robert Rose a Barber Shop Standing very near the Corner of the wall first Mentioned Built Some Years Since by the Said Robert & a Shed lately Built by the Said Robert Near to the Flat Rock aforesaid Marked with the Letter.Y.

The foregoing Report being Seen & understood by the Said Court of General Sessions of the Peace is Accepted & Aproved & It's THEREUPON Ordered That the Bounds and Limits of the Said Goal Yard be & hereby are Ascertain--ed & Established Agreable to the Report aforesaid & that the Clerk of this Court forthwith Transmit a Copy hereof to the Goaler or Keeper of the Said Prison to the end and Intent the Presoners that are or Shall be in the Custody of the Said Goaler or his Successors in Said Office May fully know & be Acquainted therewith--
