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The Connor-Bovie House, 22 Summit Street, Fairfield, is a well preserved building of the late Greek-Revival Architecture, with an Italianate influence in the supports over the windows. The gables are pedimented with dentil molding. There are doric pilasters on the corners of the building.

The windows on the facade of the building are six over six lights. There are two windows on the first floor facade and three windows on the second floor. The central second floor window, above the portico, is framed with sidelights.

The main entrance to the house is a portico supported by square columns of the doric order. The door is framed with sidelights. To the sides of the portico are pilasters which rise to the cornice and frame both the portico and the central window on the second floor.

The house is finished with clapboards and is painted brown with a small amount of yellow trim. The house sets on a granite foundation. There is an ell to the left of the main structure, presumably built as a carriage house. (The house on the opposite side of the street was once a part of this property, being the servants quarters).

The interior of the house for the most part is in its original condition. The present owners intend to preserve its originality.

There is a large central chimney which has a fireplace on each side as well as a black iron stove set into the chimney.

The woodwork throughout the house is either stained or painted. That which is painted, has a white hand-rubbed finish, presumed to be the original. There is no evidence of paint chipping which would suggest more recent coats of paint.

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This particular house is significant not only for its architecture and state of preservation but it was also the home of two prominent citizens of Maine.

William Connor, a wealthy lumber baron of the 19th century in Fairfield, Maine, and one of six prominent partners in the Fairfield Land and Mill Association, had this house built in 1856-58. The Fairfield Land and Mill Association owned six saw mills on the Kennebec River in Fairfield, as well as extensive land holdings elsewhere in Fairfield.

William Connor was also the father of Seldon Connor, a Brigadier General during the Civil War, and Governor of Maine for three terms, 1876-78. The elder Mr. Connor married Susan Bryant in 1830, and it is noted in William Bryant's diary, Susan's father, that, "1858-Sept. 17, myself and a part of William Connor's family moved into his new home." "1858-Sept 30, all moved in and the old house cleaned."

Mr. William Bryant's diary covered events from 1822-1867. He was a resident of Nye's Corner (Fairfield), and one of Bryant's sons worked logging lumber for William Connor.

Lumbering contributed greatly to the growth of Fairfield during the nineteenth century, and Mr. William Connor's part in the growth was of great importance. Unfortunately, lumbering declined in the early twentieth century, and many fortunes were lost through gambling. All of the homes along High Street, which runs parallel to Main Street (Summit Street is a cross street between Main and High) were the Mansions of the lumbering barons, such as Totman's, Nye's etc..

However, the Connor-Bovie House remained in the Connor family through inheritance until 1939 when two surviving spinster sisters and descendants of William Connor, Rosamond Connor and Mabel Conner sold the house to William T. Bovie on July 19, 1939.

William T. Bovie, M.D. was an inventor as well as surgeon. Dr. Bovie, in 1927-28 invented the first surgical current generator. He developed pioneer methods for therapeutic use of radio-active substances,

electro coagulation in neuro-surgery of cancer cells, first in the brain, later in the rectum area. His invention of the "so called" electric knife which cauterized without surgery, referred to as bloodless surgery, is still being used today. It was a very important invention, especially in the field of cancer tumors, etc.. Today, the knife is rod-shaped through modern modification, however, the initial invention was that of Dr. Bovie. It is difficult to find many references to Dr. Bovie, being eccentric, he preferred money for his invention rather than the publicity.

Dr. Bovie, inventor of the Bovie Knife, died in 1958, but is survived by his wife, age 91, in a Waterville Nursing Home, and a son, living on the coast. Mrs. Bovie has many early pictures of the house, among other important materials, and she is available to speak, if further information were desired. It must be noted, however, that the Bovie's lived in destitution in this house before it was sold in the 1960's to Robert Brown.

Another significant event connected to the Connor-Bovie House, is that it was the first electrified house in Fairfield, 1888.
