Description The Confederate Memorial Gates in Maplewood Cemetery in Mayfield is a series of three poured concrete gates that were erected on the west side of the cemetery. The gates now run south to north, approximately 600 feet apart. The southern-most gate is now the main gate. This gate is made up of two stuccoed posts two feet wide and ten feet high, 27 feet apart. There is a curving iron gate. The gate has a metal banner with metal letters the south side of the gate which reads: "The United Daughter Mem." The north side reads: "of the Confederacy -orial" When the gate closed it would read: "The United Daughters of the Confederacy Memorial." On the posts are two bronze plaques the southern-most one reads: "Confederate Veterans 1861-1865;" the southern-most one reads: "World War Veterans 1914-1917." Approximately 285 feet north of these gate is a second set of gates. These gates are 25 feet apart. They are ten feet tall and three feet wide. There are bases on top that once held lights. Approximately 330 feet north of the center gates is a third set of gates. This is a set of four gates: two interior gates approximately ten feet tall and two feet wide. Like the other two pair these are also stuccoed. Approximately ten feet from each of the ten foot posts is a six foot stuccoed post. The larger posts are connected to the smaller ones with a curving iron fence.

Statement of Significance The Confederate Memorial Gates at the Maplewood Cemetery meets National Register criterion A and is significant within the context of "Civil War Monuments in Kentucky, 1861-1935." The Confederate Memorial Gates were erected in the Maplewood Cemetery in 1924 by the Mayfield Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy. This was the second monument that they erected in Mayfield. It was their third choice for a monument, the decision was based on cost. This memorial included gate posts, plaques and iron gate. There may have been a fence between the posts, but the UDC minutes do not address that. This is an excellent example of the property type "functional monuments." This monument was created to be both a memorial to the Confederate soldiers of Graves County and a civic improvement. This is one of six functional monuments erected across the state and one of two gates. This monument was erected in the later years of the monument building era, as were all of the functional monuments. The United Daughters of the Confederacy Memorial Gates are not as elaborate as the gate in Hickman, but demonstrate the ongoing support by the UDC for the perpetuation of the memory of the Confederacy.

**Verbal Boundary Description -** The Confederate Memorial Gates whose boundaries form a buffer of ten feet centered on the gates posts but including the space between the posts approximately 600 feet from the south most gate to the northern most located on the west side of Maplewood Cemetery in Mayfield, Graves County Kentucky.

**Verbal Boundary Justification** - The area associated with the monument is restricted to the ground on which the monument sits and a small buffer around it. The setting outside such a restricted area is not seen as critically important to maintaining an integrity of association. Because the focus of the multiple property submissions is the significance of the monuments, their proposed area of listing will reflect that they have been considered by-and-large, in isolation from their surrounds.
